the work done by the first parish priest, the late Rev. Father Kiernan. There followed the singing of hymns and a further procession. Mr. Duffie then commented on the work done by the late Rev. Father Ryan, especially the building and the dedication of the present church in 1906.

The procession moved again to the slow tempo of hymns, and Mr. Duffie told of the career of Rev. Father Murphy, the only surviving former pastor of the parish, who at present is very ill at his home at Fairville. Again hymns were sung, the procession moved, and Mr. Duffie told of the work of the late Rev. Father Conway. Once again moved the procession, once again hymns were sung, and once again Mr. Duffie spoke, this time of the present priest, Rev. Father Donahoe. The speaker commented on the work the Father has done, especially as regards the formation of both social and study clubs.

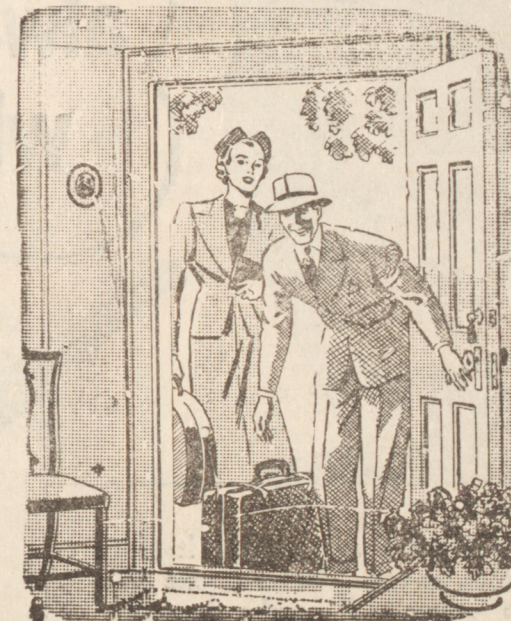
