Thumpers N. L.'s Only Hope to Smash Reign **Of Ruppert Rifles**

As they gaze about for ways and neans to topple the Yankees from their present world series eminence, the National Leaguers would do well to locate a couple of thumpers who can massage left-handed pitchers.

For right there is the key to the National League's problem, even though the Yankee batting power has rather generally received credit for the success of the Runnert Rifles.

The fact is that Lefty Gomez was the hero of the last world series, and that he and the other left-handers who preceded him on the Yankee roster have done more to subdue the National Leaguers than did even the bats of Babe Ruth and Lou Gehria. Since 1925 twelve left-handers have


