

# Cleveland Indians Use Battery of Moundsmen to Conquer Boston 7-4

## Entry List in Amateur Boxing Championships Swells to Twenty-four

MONTREAL, May 18.—The entry list for the Canadian amateur boxing championships at the Forum on Wednesday and Thursday evenings has been swelled to forty-four. W. A. Fry, secretary of the Central Ontario Branch of the A. A. U. of C., has notified the Y. M. H. A., sponsors of the title tournament, that Lennie Stein, noted heavyweight, and three other fighters had been selected for the tourney.

Dennis White, supervisor of amateur boxing in this province, and Leo Burns, president of the Quebec Branch, who have charge of the entries for the heavyweight class and if they agree to accept last year's champion from St. Catharines, Ont., the Southwestern Ontario Branch will be asked to pass along their O. K.

Bird, who beat out Tommy Osborne, University Settlement, Quebec champion, last year here in the Olympic Trials final, failed to participate in the Southwestern Trials this year, and in order for him to become eligible for the Canadian meet permission from his branch must be given. Officials in charge of the Forum tourney do not expect any difficulty in this respect.

It was doubtful whether Lennie Stein, the Central Ontario Branch heavyweight champion, would come here. However, Secretary Fry wired today saying that Stein would compete. This means that seven would trade blows for the heavyweight crown, one of the largest entries in this division in years. Besides Bird, Osborne and Stein there are Charles Balazs, Ontario; Russel Keillor,

British Columbia's four crown wearer, and Joe Nykluk, Manitoba. Quebec will be strongly represented in the title meet. The eight provincial champions—all Montreal boys—have been entered along with seven additional local ringmen, who were considered by Dennis White and his boxing committee to have entered a crack at the Canadian crowns at stake this week.

Joe Gagnon, flyweight, Harry Hurst, featherweight, Eli Brown, light-heavyweight, and Tommy Osborne, heavyweight, and considered Quebec's four ring aces. They have proven outstanding in past tournaments and are regarded as the chaps to be in their respective divisions.

## FREDERICTON MAY ENTER TEAM IN YORK-SUNBURY BASEBALL LOOP

Possibilities of Fredericton entering a team in the proposed York-Sunbury Baseball League now tentatively set to operate with only two of last season's three teams, Marysville and Minto, were skirted by Charles L. Dougherty, president of the league, who is desirous of presenting the local fans some form of a team to support.

Devon, the third team in the league last year, is not likely to enter a team for another season, it was intimated at a league meeting a short while ago and it is the belief of the league president that both Fredericton and Devon, who have suffered heavily by the inroads of Marysville and Minto, taking players, can still present a well-balanced team to give the strong Minto and Marysville teams sufficient opposition to challenge for league honors.

Tonight Marysville signified its desire to test the strength of the Maroon-clad aggregation when they sent out "feelers" to Saint John for a

doubleheader in the harbor town as an attraction for May 24. All they ask is a \$25 guarantee and a return doubleheader later on in the season. Some definite word is expected late tomorrow.

Under the president's scheme, which will find considerable backing in Devon, it is proposed that the Fredericton team would use the Devon park, one of the finest in the province, for their home games. The thought that either centre would be without senior ball this season is distasteful to the fans, who will otherwise have to turn to the snappy junior ball promised for this season and turn to Marysville for the rest of their baseball entertainment.

Pending word from A. D. Taylor, mentor of the Minto team, Mr. Dougherty will call another league meeting when the league's future will be settled for the season. His scheme has popular support and will no doubt stimulate new found interest for support of a Fredericton-Devon team.

## MARITIMES TO BE REPRESENTED IN BOXING TOURNEY

MONTREAL, May 19.—Around the town, at all the better-known boxing gymnasiums, the Dominion's amateur provincial boxing champions got in their last training licks today for the Dominion championships opening tomorrow night.

Little fellows from the 11-pound class to the heavyweights at 175 and up punched a bag, sparred against those who might be their opponents and generally loosened up, many from train rides from distant parts of the country.

Two of those 'little fellows' Gerald Farren of Saint John, and Carmen Glenn of Minto, N. B., carried the hopes of the Maritime Provinces into the championships.

Farren, one of the favorites in the 11-pound class, comes back to the city where he lost a trip to Berlin last year when he dropped a close decision in the finals of the Olympic trials. Glenn will fight among the 135 pounders.

It looks like the finest allround amateur boxing card put up in a long time, even better than the Olympic trials. The entry list approaches 50, with the probability six will fight it out for the heavyweight crown now worn by George Bird of St. Catharines, Ont.

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## AMERICA'S CUP CHALLENGER IS CRIPPLED

MARBLEHEAD, Mass., May 17.—Harold S. Vanderbilt's hopes of defending the America's Cup yesterday appeared to have been dealt a serious blow by dismasting of his yacht, Ranger, off here Saturday while under tow for Newport, R. I., scene of the approaching international sailing classic.

The big sloop was launched at the Bath, Me., iron works Tuesday. She started for Newport in the face of a brewing storm. The 165-foot spar snapped about 35 feet above the deck and plunged into the sea. Fortunately the great duralumin tube, weighing in its entirety more than three tons, did not fall on deck and no one was injured.

Soon after Ranger was towed into Marblehead harbor a new mast was ordered, but officials of the Bath Iron Works said seven weeks would be required for the task. Meanwhile, Vanderbilt was expected to use a mast formerly employed by Rainbow, the sloop with which he defeated T. O. M. Sopwith's British Challenger, Endeavour I, in 1934.

## "Boy Wonder" Yanked In Ninth Inning After Walking 'Doc' Cramer

NEW YORK, May 18.—Cleveland Indians used six pitchers, including the phenomenal Bob Feller, today while rushing from behind with a ninth inning rally to take the series' opener, 7-4, from the Red Sox at Boston.

Feller, making his first start since his pitching arm became troublesome in St. Louis April 21, was the fourth Indian heaver to go into action, at the start of the last half of the ninth. He faced but one batter, 'Doc' Cramer, and when Bob threw only one strike while passing that slugger, Manager Steve O'Neill yanked him for Lloyd Brown.

"Feller's arm is in perfect shape but he was just a bit wild," O'Neill explained.

Spurgeon Chandler moved another step nearer a regular berth on the Yankee pitching staff when he shut out Chicago White Sox here 4-0 with six hits and thus kept the Yanks within a half game of the league-leading Athletics.

Youthful 'Chubby' Dean kept the Athletics on top of the league by hitting a three run homer in the eighth that gave the Mackmen an 8-7 victory over Detroit Tigers in Philadelphia.

In Washington the Senators defeated St. Louis Browns 7-6, when Walter Millies' ninth inning single broke up a tie.

The Senators scored five runs in a second inning surluge on six hits and a pair of errors.

### Warneke Wins No. 5

NEW YORK, May 18.—Lanky Lonnie Warneke today joined his famous St. Louis Cardinal teammate, Dizzy Dean, as a five-game winner by turning back the Giants, 4-3, in the opening game of the New Yorkers' first Western trip.

In hanging up his fifth triumph, as against one defeat, the tobacco chewing right-hander held the 1936 champion to eight hits and shut them out from the second through the eighth.

Jimmy Ripple, batting in the cleanup spot as Manager Bill Terry shook up his batting order, followed up Joe Moore's first inning double with a home run for the Giants' opening runs. They didn't score again until there were two out in the ninth.

In Pittsburgh the Pirates continued the fast pace that sent them pushing to the league lead as Cy Blanton held the Phillies to six hits and fanned eight to win 2-1.

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
