Publicity is Protection

When Mr. Justice LeBlanc of New Brunswick, who as a royal commissioner is conducting an investigation into the illegal fishing of lobsters, heard the protest of a packer against the publicity given the enquiry, in which it was suggested that the evidence be taken in private, he replied: "This is not a closed chamber. Let the chips fall where they may. I have asked the newspapers to give the evidence all the publicity possible."

As the enemy of disease is sunlight, so the enemy to those, who are false to their trust and who knowingly break the laws, is the placing of the facts before the public gaze. The man who is honest in his endeavor should have no fear of publicity. He should welcome it for it is protection against those who would spread false reports and damaging rumors.

A public informed of the truth is the public man's safeguard against slanderous rumors. The newspapers should at all times publish the facts and as Mr. Justice LeBlanc says, let the chips fall where they may. The publication of facts is what the public expects and to this it is entitled.—Saint John Citizen.

Premier Hepburn's Position

Newspaper opinion throughout Canada and especially in Ontario is almost unanimous in according support to Premier Hepburn for his decisive stand in the Oshawa strike situation. Some editors aver he has taken his political life in his hands, but they are quick to recognize his courage and sincerity in hitting hard and fearlessly at what he feels to be the proper course for his Government and for the welfare of the Province as a whole.

Premier Hepburn is noted for impetuosity, says the Financial Post, and some of his statements and actions in the present industrial crisis in Ontario bear out this trait. These must not, however, cloud the main issues on which there is almost complete agreement, namely:

1. That law and order must be obeyed on Canadian soil.
2. That labor representatives who either themselves personally or the organizations they represent, have defied or broken the laws of other countries are not welcome in this country.
3. That any labor organizations which support or are supported by Communistic agitators, are equally unwelcome in this country.

These are the fundamentals of the Hepburn position and are views with which The Financial Post is in complete accord. Other considerations must not be allowed to cloud the main issues which are equally applicable to all parts of Canada as they are to Oshawa and Ontario.

London Bars Rubbernecks

Probably not many Canadian visitors to the Coronation will take their cars with them, but they should realize before they start that they will have no chance of driving or riding along the line of route. If they have grandstand or other seats booked, probably they will have to start out early in the morning to reach them in good time.

From 1 o'clock on the morning of Coronation day the entire district through which the Royal procession will pass will be closed to vehicular traffic.

This regulation, necessary if risk of holding up the day's ceremonies is to be avoided, adds immeasurably to the worries accumulating on London officials and police, for vehicles which ordinarily would pass through the Mayfair area must be diverted and rerouted through thoroughfares which already will be sufficiently congested because of the throngs of visitors and tourists.

One thing London is adamant upon: There will be no "rubberneck wagons" running during Coronation week. Tourist concerns have protested against this decree, but in spite of their complaints it has been ordered that sightseers must travel either by bus or private car, or walk.

No official estimate of the number of strangers expected in London during the ceremonies has been issued, but as they will be coming from every city, town and village in the United Kingdom, as well as from the Dominions and colonies, the United States and abroad, one million would seem to be a very low figure.

A vague idea of the crowds police will have to handle on the day may be obtained from the fact that, at a recent unannounced rehearsal of the procession which started at 6.30 a.m., the route was lined with people ten to fifteen deep.

In addition, some 30,000 troops must be cared for, and camps for the purpose are being established in London parks.

Finally, the Thames will resume some of its former importance at a water highway, and the river police will have their work cut out to control the crowds of vessels, from liners and yachts to rowing boats, which will throng its reaches from London Bridge to Westminster.

By the end of Coronation week London officialdom will have earned a rest.

Full Court Dress

Ladies attending the ceremony in Westminster Abbey are required to wear full court dress as for a court, but without trains. Feathers and veils must be worn. The veil should not be larger than 45 inches, it is specified, and is to be attached to the base of three small white ostrich feathers mounted as a Prince of Wales' Plume, the centre feather being a little higher than the two side ones, to be worn slightly on the left side of the head. Gloves must be worn and no one may attend in mourning.

Permission has been given by the Earl Marshall, it is noted, for wives of senators and of members of the House of Commons, only, to wear, if desired, morning dress with lace scarf on the head, instead of the dress otherwise prescribed. Hats may not be worn.

Five categories of dress have been prescribed for men. Lieutenant-governors are asked to wear full dress uniform or full velvet court dress; privy councillors may wear either of the above or alternative court dress—evening dress but with breeches and hose instead of trousers. A fourth alternative is provided for provincial prime ministers, senators, members of House of Commons, provincial cabinet ministers and members of provincial legislatures. This consists of a modification of the alternative court dress, with trousers instead of breeches and hose. Senators and members of House of Commons, only, may wear morning dress, or black or dark suits. All other persons are required to wear full dress uniform, full velvet court dress, or alternate court dress.

It is remarked that ladies accompanying persons in morning dress, or black or dark suits, should wear morning dress with a lace scarf, not a hat, on the head.

A supplementary note adds that after further considering the question of dress to be worn by persons from the dominions, His Majesty has been pleased to command that all such persons be given the option of wearing either knee breeches or trousers with white waistcoats and evening tail coats, as an alternative court dress.

The Earl Marshall states that this ruling will apply not only to the coronation service in Westminster Abbey, but also to all other state functions in connection with the service.

However, it is said, His Majesty hopes that uniforms, court dress, or evening clothes with knee breeches will be worn whenever possible.

who fall prey easily to the demagogic doctrines of the professional propagandists who have invaded all parts of the Empire in order to carry out their evil designs without offering any constitutional and actual means to solve the problems of the people. Yet another school of thought will urge that all Governments in the Empire should adopt uniform laws and enforce them strictly and with a firm and strong hand. However, every indication amongst the usually well-informed persons in the Canadian Capital seem to imply that a compromise method will prevail and it will be jointly carried out by all Governments.

Then again it is stated that experts will report their findings how means may be found to ameliorate the industrial and agricultural conditions of all sections of the Empire by united effort of the Home Government and the Dominions, and which it is hoped may eradicate the basic conditions which have aided these professional agitators to sway the masses by the virus of false promises through some form of Communism or Fascism. This will involve a number of new laws to improve the economic, social and the other conditions of the great masses, and it is certain that it will lead to the passing of many new laws on these matters throughout the whole Empire in the very near future.

The present Government in Ottawa, as well as others before it have been studying these matters for several years, and new laws would have been enacted by now, but it is no secret that the Federal authorities have been waiting for the adoption of a common policy by the whole Empire, and when Canada's delegates return from London, it is quite likely that the exact plans of campaign against these disintegrating forces will be made public.

In face of the fact that everyone in Canada has gained the impression that Hon. R. B. Bennett will retire from the political field in the near future on account of his health, both Liberals and Conservatives in the Capital hold the opinion that this does not imply that he will leave public life permanently. The Hon. R. B. Bennett, who has been leader of the Tory party for the past ten years, may undertake a temporary retirement and return to the active scene later. This point of view is entertained by persons who are usually well-informed on such matters in the Capital.

This particular section of the city has over one hundred residents within a stone's throw of where these gentlemen were mired. During recent years a building boom has taken place up there and many cosy, comfortable homes have been erected in this section. The people have made an effort to keep their places in good shape. Many of the places boast neat lawns and pretty surroundings. Situated on the pretty hillside, overlooking the elm-shaded city, and the river in the distance, this should make an ideal residential section. But this section is getting a raw deal so far as the roads and streets department of the city is concerned. With a couple of hundred dollars spent judiciously and the right kind of work done by the roads and streets department, Graham Avenue could be made a comfort to the residents instead of a disgrace to the city and a menace to the residents and to all citizens whose business takes them to that vicinity.

It is understood that the residents who live in the section mentioned intend to send in a petition to the City Council asking that something be done before anyone is lost in the mud. We believe that Alderman McCaughey, chairman of the Roads and Streets Committee would not sleep soundly in his bed if he had any idea of the real condition of this street. Dave is a good citizen with a kindly heart and he is responsible—or should be—for his department of the civic administration. Perhaps he had better drive out there tomorrow and look the place over. Washington, where he agreed to remain until settlement was reached.

New Scale Conditions

Monday morning the plant will reopen with the employees working a 44-hour, five-day week, and receiving wage increases of five to seven cents an hour, time-and-half for overtime and recognition of a shop committee elected by the local union. Before the strike they worked a 45 to 50-hour week with straight time for overtime.

Concessions granted the workmen included adoption of a grievance committee to present workers' complaints to the management, and the rights of seniority. The seniority clause provides that long service employees would be the last to be laid off in slack times and the first rehired in rush periods.

Charles Millard, president of the local union, declared "as chief representative of the workers of General Motors" that the employees would return Monday with "no animosity."

"With all sincerity I express my gratitude to Premier Hepburn, his officials and General Motors' representatives for their honest and untiring efforts at the negotiation meetings," he added.

The agreement is made concurrent with the agreement between General Motors Corporation in the United States and the United Automobile Workers of America, dated February 11, 1937, which runs indefinitely or may be modified or terminated after August 11.

Premier Hepburn declared "the true Canadian spirit asserted itself in the final analysis." He thanked the General Motors strikers and Oshawa citizens generally for their "splendid co-operation" in bringing to a peaceful conclusion "the most important strike with which we have been confronted."

"The attention of the people of the North American continent, where we obviously are going through an economic transition period without parallel, was focussed on the Oshawa situation and the fact we have settled pretensions and important issues without any disorder whatever serves as a challenge to those who have been less fortunate," said the premier.

"With the return of prosperity, all peoples must realize that labor shall request and is entitled to a greater share of the increasing profits of industry. To this end, I shall lend the support and assistance of the present administration and hope to attain such objectives in an orderly and constructive way."

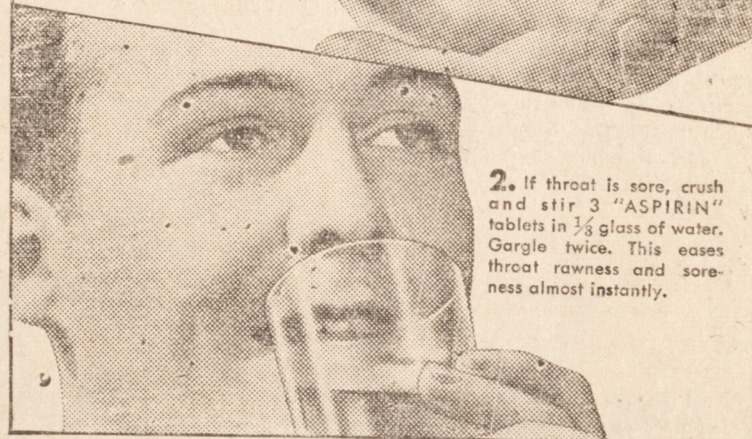

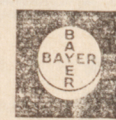
