were human, and although the report circulated in that district, word of the discovery did not reach Fredericton until yesterday. Royal Canadian Mounted Police were immediately notified following the receipt of the report, and an investigation was made this morning.

Louis Burden, whose remains it was at first believed to be, disappeared from the farm of A. L. Slipp of Queensbury, where he made his home, about six years ago. No trace has been found of the missing man, and the finding of the bones immediately gave inhabitants of the district the belief that they were those of the man who had disappeared.

Dr. Robertson stated that the skeleton had been exposed to the elements for many years.

FIRST AND LARGEST DEER SHOT THIS SEASON

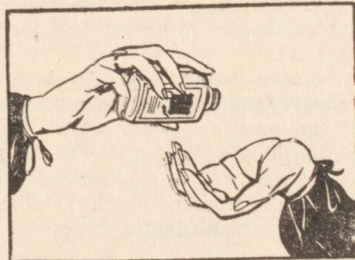
COURT SITS TOMORROW
