### Large Number Citizens Attend Funeral Here Today

## HIGHER PULPWOOD WAGES ARE FIXED BY COMMISSION

### Regulations Provide For Substantial Increase

#### Average \$40 Monthly

### No Employee to Receive Less Than \$34 Per Month

A substantial increase in the rate of wages paid lumber operators for cutting, peeling, yarding and hauling pulpwood was fixed by the New Brunswick Forest Operations Commission which convened in the provincial building here yesterday afternoon. The new scale provides for an increase of nearly 30 per cent. in the average and 26 per cent. in the minimum.

The average rate of wages to be paid when the scale goes into effect on May 1 will be \$40 monthly with a minimum of \$34 per month. The former is an increase of \$9 per month over the old rate of \$31, while the minimum of \$34 is increased from \$27. Extra allowances are provided for where board is not provided.

G. F. G. Bridges, prominent barrister and member of the Moncton City Council, presided at the meeting. Others present were John H. Wallace, Reynolds, Northumberland County; W. H. Miller, Campbellton; G. H. Prince, Fredericton, registrar and H. R. Pettigrove, Marysville, fair wage officer.

The commission was in session till six o'clock last evening. The announcement of the new regulations was contained in a press statement issued by J. H. Conlon, director of municipal and federal relations.

### Regulations

The order of the board was as follows: "The following wage scales have been fixed by the New Brunswick Forest Operations Commission for the lumbering industry and are to take effect on May 1, 1937—

"For cutting, peeling, yarding and hauling the average rate of wages paid by any employer to his employees shall not be less than \$40 per month and board, net, provided, however—

"No employee shall receive less than \$34 per month and board net. When board is not furnished by the employer, the employee shall receive 50 cents per day additional.

"Wages paid to cooks, tractor operators and truck drivers shall not be included in determining the average rate.

"The amount paid to employees for piece work shall not be included in determining the above average wage.

"The average amount paid per month by any employer to his employees for piece work shall not be less than the average of \$40 per month and board net, but in no case shall any employee on piece work receive less than \$34 per month and board net.

"Foremen, bookkeepers and clerks do not come within the jurisdiction of the act, and their wages shall not be included in determining any average rate.

"Investigations will be conducted from time to time by the fair wage officer."

## INTERESTING PROGRAM ARRANGED IN CONNECTION WITH VISIT OF GOVERNOR-GENERAL AND PARTY HERE JUNE 10TH

### Their Excellencies Will Arrive Here on Night of 9th

The programme arranged in connection with the visit of Their Excellencies Lord Tweedsmuir and Lady Tweedsmuir to Fredericton on June 9th, was announced this morning by Major T. C. Barker, A. D. C., to His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Murray MacLaren. The vice-regal party which, in addition to the Governor-General and Lady Tweedsmuir, will include Mrs. George Pope, A. S. Redfern, secretary; Captain Campbell-Preston, and Lieutenant Kenneth Rivers-Smith, R. N., A. D. C., will arrive here at 9.05 p. m., on the night of June 9th. The party will be met at the C. P. R. station by the Lieutenant-Governor and legislative and civic officials.

On the following morning at 10.30 a. m. His Excellency will take the salute and inspect the Guard of Honor. Ten minutes the vice-regal party will leave for city hall where greetings will be extended by various local organizations. At 11.15 o'clock the visitors will proceed to the auditorium of the city hall where a civic address of welcome will be read.

This will be followed by a motor drive through the city. At 12.45 a. m., the party will return to the train for lunch. At 3 o'clock Lord Tweedsmuir will go to Hart's Salmon Pool for an afternoon's fishing, while Her Excellency will be enjoying a motor drive through the district. Afternoon tea will be served at 5.20 o'clock. In the evening at 9 o'clock, a public reception will be held at the legislative building.

The party will leave for Saint John on the following morning.

## N. B. APPEAL COURT "QUASH" LIQUOR CASES

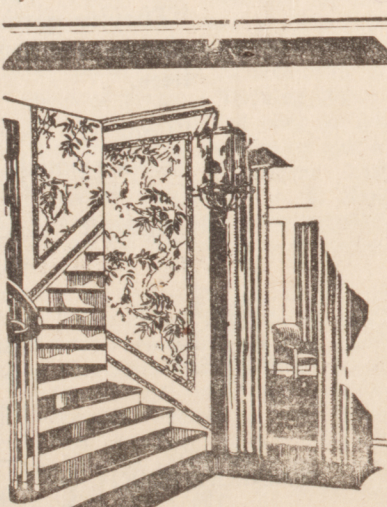
### Dismiss Appeals in Saint John Cases This Morning

Two appeals were dismissed by the appeals division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court when the April sitting was resumed here this morning. The first appeal was that of Percy McCoy from a decision by Magistrate Palmer in the Saint John police court delivered in connection with a liquor charge. The second appeal was by Edgar Friars from the conviction of Magistrate G. Earle Logan of Lancaster. The latter conviction was also in connection with the recent "bootlegging" drive in Saint John.

J. Paul Barry, Saint John, the youngest practising barrister in the province, argued on behalf of the appellant in the McCoy case. G. King Kelley, Saint John, presented the appeal in the second case. R. G. Kierstead and E. B. McLatchey represented the Crown in the Friars case, but their arguments were not heard.

Other appeals before the court are those of the Royal Bank of Canada vs. the Port Royal Pulp and Paper Company Ltd., in which the defendants are appealing a judgment handed down in favor of the plaintiffs for \$3,000 with accrued interest, and the appeal of Arthur Clarke vs. the Corporation of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Saint John in which the plaintiff will move (Continued on Page Five)

## ALDERMEN WILL ASSUME OFFICE ON APRIL 26TH

### Seven Are Re-elected by Acclamation -- No Seats Contested

The seven aldermen who resigned their seats in protest against the action of the municipalities committee of the legislature which rejected a bill providing for the abolishment of the Fredericton Police Commission, and who were re-elected yesterday afternoon by acclamation, will be sworn to office next Monday afternoon, the date on which the election was to have been held if any of the seats were contested. Despite numerous rumors heard during the past several days, no newcomers entered the local political arena to contest seats in the different wards. There were reports that at least two additional candidates were to file papers but when the final hour for receiving nominations closed yesterday only the papers of the seven aldermen were filed.

The aldermen re-elected yesterday were: W. Raymond Crewdson, Wellington ward; Ray T. Forbes and Murray E. Hagerman, St. Anne's ward; Dr. B. R. Ross, Carleton ward; T. Earle Doohan and R. A. MacMillan, Queen's ward, and Ivan McKnight, King's ward.

For the first time since its incorporation nearly a century ago, Fredericton was without a governing council. Routine business has been carried on and will be until next Monday afternoon by Mayor G. Willard Kitchen and Aldermen David McCaughey, F. S. Mundle and Delmas Olts.

At the time the resignations went into effect there arose the debatable questions as to what procedure might be legally followed. P. J. Hughes, K. C., city solicitor, offered two possible ways of escape from the entanglement. One of his proposals was that the city go into technical bankruptcy—this would result in the appointment of an official to carry on civic administration. The appointment would have been made by the government.

However, Mayor Kitchen reserved the right to call for an election—a similar right was also claimed by the aldermen before their resignations became effective. The latter group set April 26, as election date—this date also being the one selected by Mayor Kitchen.

On next Monday afternoon, the aldermen will take the oath of office, and a meeting will afterwards be held to select the various committees.

## LOCAL LABOR ASK REPRESENTATION N. B. WAGE BOARD

### Recommend Appointment of James Leger of Fredericton

#### Fair Wage Act

### Saint John and Moncton Also Seeking For Representation

At a meeting of the Fredericton Labor organization last evening that body decided to recommend to the provincial Government the appointment of James Legere of this city as one of the new fair wage commissioners. As soon as Hon. Dr. Roberts, minister of labor returns from New York the matter will be placed before him for his consideration. In the meantime it is understood that a committee will interview the local members here in regard to the appointment. It was felt by the meeting that central New Brunswick should be represented on the Board, and that Mr. Legere had the advantage of being able to speak both English and French which they agree is becoming more and more a necessary qualification of such a position.

According to an amendment to the Fair Wage Act which was passed at the last session of the Legislature a board of five persons was established. Two of these will represent the employers, two will represent the workers and one will be a disinterested party not affiliated with either party.

The two major labor groups in the province, the New Brunswick Council of Labor and the New Federation of Labor are both seeking to have representatives appointed on the board. Moncton and Saint John are also pressing strongly for representation on the board. The New Brunswick Federation of Labor has recommended John S. McKinnon, Saint John, and Raymond Roy, Dalhousie. It is understood that the N. B. Council of Labor are recommending the appointment of a Moncton man, who is one of the strongest figures in provincial labor activities. Moncton is one of the leading labor centres in the province and it is generally felt that this city should have representation.

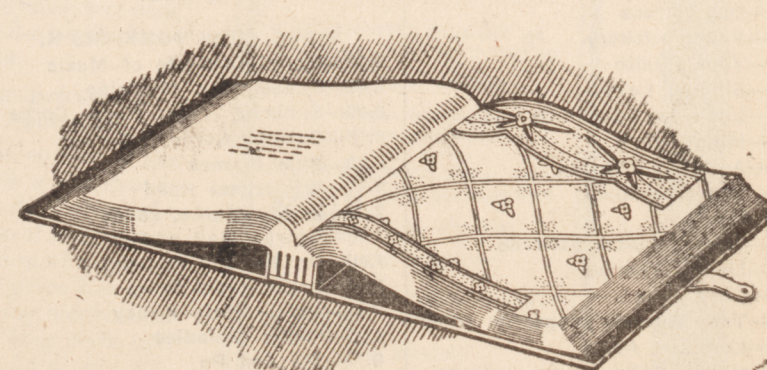
