Boston Red Sox Nose Out New Yorkers 5-4

Gehrig Crashes Out the First Homer of 1937 Campaign

NEW YORK, May 2—Before the largest crowd of the young American League season, 52,150, Lou Gehrig snapped out of his homer-hitting slump here today, but his first round-trip of the campaign was not enough to save Yankees from a 5-4 beating at the hands of the Boston Red Sox.

Errors at crucial moments by Frank Crosetti and Johnny Broaca, and a couple of timely extra-base hits by Jimmy Foxx and Rookie Bobby Doerr put the game on ice for the Red Sox, giving Footsie Marcum the best of a pitching duel with Broaca. Broaca's errors on Foxx's easy tap in the ninth allowed Maroum to score with the winning run.

Gehrig found the range with his four bagger in the fourth to account for the first Yankee run. George Selkirk also pounded out a homer, driving Joe Di Maggio home in front of him in the sixth.

Gerald Walker smashed a home run in the seventh inning to give the Detroit Tigers a 6-5 victory over Chicago White Sox in Detroit.

Walker had a perfect day at bat, with two singles and the home run, his third this season, in three times at bat. The score was tied at 5-5 when he drove the ball out of Navin Field.

Trailing by two runs as they came into the ninth, Washington Senators put on a five-run rally to win 10-7 and split a two-game series in Philadelphia with the Athletics.

Playing his first full game of the 1937 season after his recent tonsil operation, Joe Di Maggio banged out three singles as he paced the Yankees to a 3-2 win over Boston Red Sox Saturday.

Detroit Tigers gained an 11-4 victory over Chicago White Sox at Detroit. At Philadelphia, the Athletics defeated Washington 2-1. Elon Hogssett held Cleveland Indians to three hits at St. Louis as the Browns rallied in the eighth to score two runs and win 3-2.

Southpaws Bees to Defeat
NEW YORK, May 2—Cliff Melton New York Giants' elongated southpaw from Baltimore, lefthanded the Bees to defeat today to win his first National League contest 3-1 before 23,767 Boston fans.

Melton whiffed nine batters and allowed but four hits. Guy Bush went

the distance for the Bees and pitched well, despite 13 Giant hits.

Four of the 13 were singles by Lou Chiozza, defeating the luckless Reds 7-2 in defeating the luckless Reds 7-2 in Cincinnati as Chicago tripped St. Louis Cardinals.

A crowd of 17,488 saw Joe Bowman distribute nine hits in his first start for the visitors, while his mates, led by little Lee Handley, battered two of four Red hurlers for 11 safeties.

Chicago's jinx-ridden Cubs won and lost again, conquering St. Louis Cardinals 4-1 in Chicago behind Bill Lees sparking three-hit hurling, but losing the services for probably a week of their star second baseman, Billy Herman.

The St. Louis 'Gas House Gang' blew up at Chicago Saturday as they absorbed an 11-4 lashing from the Cubs. Pittsburgh Pirates found the range in Cincinnati in the sixth inning to come from behind and defeat the Reds 3-1.

Philadelphia Phillies scored a 4-2 win over Brooklyn Dodgers, while at Boston, Bees nosed out Giants 3-2.

SOPWITH'S YACHTS ENDEAVOR I AND II SAIL FOR AMERICA

GOSPORT, Eng., May 2—Endeavor I and Endeavor II, carrying T. O. M. Sopwith's hopes of lifting the America's cup this summer, were well out to sea today. They slid proudly out of Gosport harbor Saturday en route to the United States.

Endeavor II, built for the current challenge, was towed from the harbor by the Belgian trawler John, which has been engaged to take her across. Endeavor I, beaten by Harold S. Vanderbilt's Rainbow in the 1934 series, was picked up off Cowes by Sopwith's motor yacht Viva II.

Sopwith said he had no idea which of the two craft would be selected to oppose the American defender. That, he said, will depend upon the outcome of a series of trials off Newport after the craft have been fitted out of the Herreshoff boat yard in Bristol, R.I.

Most British observers, however, felt that Endeavor II will almost certainly be the choice since it was built with its unsuccessful predecessor's experience in mind.

The British challenger, whether Endeavor I or II, will meet the American defender, not yet selected, in the America's cup series starting off Newport July 31.

Aspirants for the honor of defending the cup include Harold S. Vanderbilt's Ranger, now under construction; Rainbow, the 1934 winner, now owned by Chandley Hovey, and Gerald S. Lambert's Yankee making its third attempt in seven years to win the right to represent the United States in the series.

B. C. VARSITY FIVE LIFT DOMINION SENIOR CAGE TITLE

VANCOUVER, May 2—Windsor, champions of Canadian men's basketball in 1936 and runners-up to United States for Olympic honors at the Berlin games, turned over their national title to University of British Columbia Thunderbirds today.

Thunderbirds dethroned them with a 23-20 victory last night in the 4th game of the best-of-five Dominion final. Varsity won the first two games 31-29 and 31-30 but Windsor prolonged the series with a 28-23 win on Friday.

A single point separated the teams in total points scores in four games. The Collegians scored 108 to Windsor's 107 in winning the championship for the second time in five years. Varsity held the title in 1932.

ANZAS AND U. S. PLAYERS ADVANCE IN DAVIS CUP PLAY

MEXICO CITY, May 2—Australia completed a clean sweep of its first round Davis Cup series with Mexico today when Jack Bromwich and Adrian Quist won the concluding singles matches.

Quist dropped the only set lost by the Australians in five matches as he defeated Ricardo Tapia, Mexican ace, 6-2, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, after Bromwich, getting his first taste of Davis Cup play, had defeated Esteban M. Reyes, 6-2, 6-3, 7-5.

As a result of the victory Australia will meet the United States, victors over Japan at San Francisco, in the American zone final at Forest Hills, N. Y., May 29, 30 and 31.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2—Frankie Parker of Milwaukee won his second singles match of the Davis Cup series between the United States and Japan, when he defeated Fumiteru Nakano, 6-0, 6-3, 6-2 today.

The outcome had no bearing on the actual zone elimination as the American squad clinched the right to meet Australia in the North American zone finals Saturday with a double victory.

Parker's chop-strokes and steadier play proved too much for Nakano, although the latter twice won on the service in the second set to make it a more evenly matched affair.

Saturday lanky Donald Budge, first ranking player of the United States, and stocky Gene Mako, National doubles champions, teamed to blast the Japanese duo of Jiro Yamagishi and Nakano off the courts 6-0, 6-1, 6-4.

The series had been virtually clinched Friday when Budge regained some of his fireball tactics to defeat Nakano 6-1, 6-1, 6-0, in the opening singles.

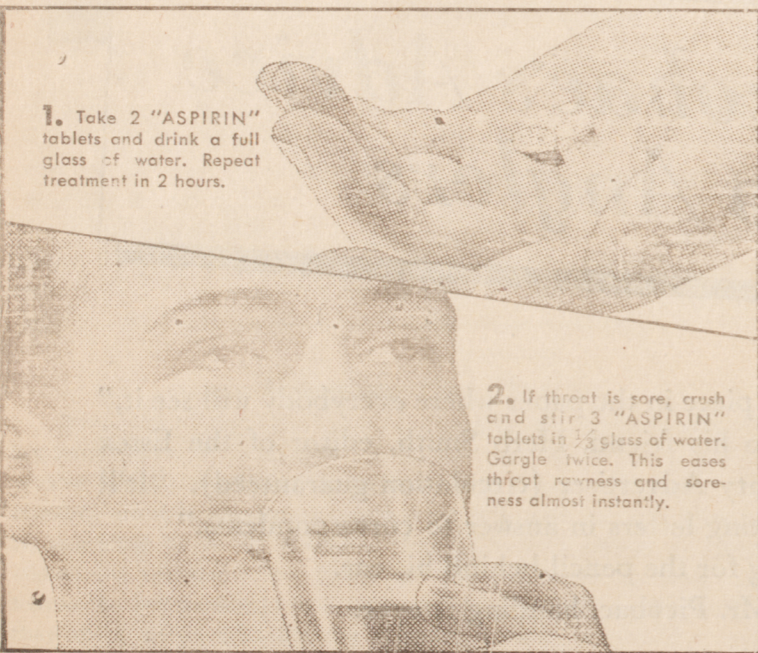
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
