DIVINE BLAMES UNITED STATES FOR LOWER MORALS

CHELMSFORD, Essex, Eng., July 20—The United States was charged with lowering England's social standards by the Very Rev. W. E. R. Morrow, Provost of Chelmsford Cathedral in his sermon here Sunday night.

He blamed American influence for the bill now before Parliament liberalizing the divorce law. "In every contact with the United States there has been a lowering of moral standards and a siphoning in which the noblest ideals of domestic life have been derided," the Provost said.

"This is seen in numerous debasing films in which the marriage tie has been broken and those guilty of doing so have been extolled as heroes and heroines." Provost Morrow in 1912 was chosen to be one of the Mission to Help of the Prairie Dioceses of Canada.

INVENTOR DIES MARCONI PASSES AWAY AT ROME

(Special to The Daily Mail) ROME, July 20—Guglielmo Marconi the electrical wizard whose name has become a household word and whose invention of wireless has saved thousands of lives at sea since its adoption died this morning at his town house in the suburbs of Rome. The cause of his death was a paralytic stroke culminating in cardiac paralysis.

He had seemed in the best of health, and only last Saturday had been full of hope and ambitious plans for the future. Of late years Marconi who was a personal friend of Mussolini has taken a considerable part in politics. He was a member of the Italian parliament and a Roman Senator. It was not at first known whether the great inventor was alone or not when he died but later advices say that he was surrounded by relatives during his last moments.

RAIN BRINGS NEW OPTIMISM, CROPS 50 MILLION SHORT

WINNIPEG, July 20—New optimism returned to Western Canada today as three days of wealth-producing rains broke a prolonged summer drought, brightened crop prospects in Alberta and led to forecasts that feed crops would be produced in many sections of the burnt areas of Southern Saskatchewan. On the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, however, traders disregarded the bearish crop news and paid heed to Hon. J. G. Gardiner's estimate of this year's Canadian wheat crop, and reports of rust and crop damage in the United States. The Federal Minister of Agriculture estimated Canada would produce 150,000,000 bushels less than normal.

These bullish factors pushed wheat prices ahead 5 to 3%, with July futures closing at \$1.53 1/2, October (Continued on Page Four)

C. P. R. PRESIDENT IN OPTIMISTIC MOOD OVER CONDITIONS IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Comments Approvingly On Road Improvements "As It Should Be."

Sir Edward Beatty, G.B.E., K.C., LL.D., chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, last evening summed up the result of his observations and inquiries while on an annual inspection tour of the properties of the company in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

"In this visit to the Maritimes," he continued, "I have been impressed with the conditions so far as I have seen and with the prospect for the future. I shall return to Montreal tomorrow in optimistic mood over this portion of Canada."

Sir Edward passed through Saint John early Saturday morning and has since visited Halifax and the Dominion Atlantic Railway territory. He and his party arrived at Digby Sunday evening and stayed at the Pines until leaving in the S.S. Princess Helene yesterday-afternoon for Saint John. The head of the railway was accompanied by H. J.
