The Irish Outrage

IF THE NEWS WHICH COMES OVER THE WIRE FROM BELFAST TODAY IS TRUE—and if the outrage which took place on the border of the Free State is justly blamed on the extreme Irish Republicans, then the whole affair is a disgrace to those Irishmen residing south of the Ulster border.

There have been bitter political differences regarding the Government of Ireland between those residing in Northern Ireland and those in the south but these differences should not be made the occasion of the outrage which took place yesterday when Their Majesties, the King and Queen paid their visit to Ulster.

No one can deny to the Irish, both of the North and the South, the right of determining for themselves how they are to be governed. This is a right which we in Canada possess and of which we are jealous.

Ireland is unfortunate in its home affairs. It has given to the world its share of poets, of statesmen and of leaders in world affairs. Its sons have gone to foreign lands and have become leaders.

Many of our news despatches from across the seas are untrue or overdrawn. This may be the case in regard to the reported incidents yesterday. The whole affair, however, seems to have been an unfortunate and disgraceful one, no matter how small its proportions may have been.

SEVERE FIGHTING IN SECOND DAY OF OPEN WAR

PEIPING, July 29—Severe fighting is reported in Northern China in the undeclared open civil war today. At Tientsin British, French and Italian troops threw up barricades early today to protect foreigners, against fighting for Tientsin by Chinese and Japanese troops.

Authorities of the British, French and Italian concessions declared a state of emergency as Chinese troops began a surprise offensive against the city, Japan's North China garrison headquarters and a Japanese naval force started shelling the port of Tangku, 20 miles east.

PRES. ROOSEVELT AND HULL DISCUSS NEUTRALITY PACT

SOVIET MILITARY JUDGE NOW 'ENEMY OF PEOPLE'

One of the Eight Who Doomed Marshal to Death Singled Out for Disgrace When Purge Hits High Places.

MOSCOW, July 29—In a wave of new arrests and dismissals, the Soviet purge invaded the Russian military today, singling out for disgrace one of the eight military judges who sentenced Marshal Mikhail Tukhachevsky to death as an "enemy of the people."

WILL SUPERVISE BEAUTIFYING OF DOMINION CAPITAL

The main duties of the Committee will be to study the general beautifying of the Canadian Capital both by ornamentation and creating of other beauty spots. The committee include Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, Premier of Canada, Hon. Charles A. Dunning, Minister of Finance, Hon. J. C. Elliott, Postmaster General, Hon. Fernand Rinfret, Secretary State, Hon. W. E. Foster, Speaker of the Senate, and Hon. Pierre F. Casgrain, Speaker of the House of Commons.
