Partition Still the Solution

THE British Government's decision to let the Palestine partition plan stand over to allow for "adequate inquiry" is unquestionably the wise course. There are some issues which may be more easily adjusted in developing the details of the plan if full study and discussion are permitted at this stage. This does not mean that the Government contemplates altering its decision to carry out the general proposals made in the Royal Commission report.

There is a considerable body of influential, if partisan, opinion massed against the partition both inside and beyond Great Britain. Some idea of the strategy it intends to employ was had from Winston Churchill's performance in the House of Commons. It was he who asked the Government if it had done all that could be expected of it to persuade "one side to concede and the other side to forbear." Any number of shallow questions such as this can be raised without doing anything to clarify the issue. The Government can prove its actions only to the extent that partisan opinion is willing to accept its proof.

Another equally partisan demand is that which seeks assurance that Britain has done everything within her power in exercising the mandate for "maintenance of the status quo" in Palestine. The impossibility of maintaining a status quo between elements so widely separated in their ambitions and so unyielding to any sort of reasoning but martial law is the key to the Royal Commission's proposals. It is only logical that the difficulties in this regard will increase as the Arabs and Jews themselves increase and reach out for what each considers to be its indisputable rights and privileges.

A second factor favoring the postponement is that it will allow the numerous alternatives to be examined under the same critical conditions as the partition plan. Viscount Samuel, breaking twelve years' silence on the Palestine controversy, proposed one alternative to the House of Lords this week. Others have been offered from the United States, and, while the Zionist Congress is confidently expected to endorse the partition in "principle" at its Zurich conference next month, it is almost certain that further suggestions will be made.

All such plans go back to the idea that there is the possibility of mutual agreement on all the major issues, provided Britain continues to exercise the mandate. It has to be admitted that the partition is a drastic remedy, but no more drastic than the fundamental problems of Palestine. It is sure to cut across the interests of both factions, but not nearly as seriously as their own contradictory programs have done and will continue to do. The plan thus far is only a skeleton. All the details have yet to be decided, and if there is any spirit of compromise, a willingness to concede and forbear on either side, it can be used to the best advantage in settling these.

Yet the horror had its inception in the ranting of self-seeking politicians who inflammed hates and stirred their followers into a frenzy of destruction yes, of self-destruction.

The fire that was started in the minds and hearts of many Spaniards by the politicians became a conflagration that found the rabble-rousers in competent to restrain the destructive power they had unleashed.

So it can be anywhere in the world. Even well-intentioned men of small mind can stir trouble which, in full fury, dismays the very leaders who aroused it. Then these dismayed leaders plead that this was not their intent. They look to better men to repair the damage.

Little good that does the dead men of Spain, rotting under the July sun.

Printing

THERE stands in the middle of the square in front of the Cathedral at Mainz, the ancient German city on the Rhine, a statue of Johann Gutenberg. He was the father of printing. We are the inheritors of a measureless wealth that he gave us.

He belonged to a family which had long been prominent locally. He served his apprenticeship as a stone-cutter. Studying the playing cards printed from one rough block, the little wood-cut pictures of saints and Bible characters and the curiously carved images which he made, it seemed to him there ought to be other ways of making books than laboriously writing them by hand.

One day he began cutting letters in wood and fixing them on a wooden block. It was the beginning of his printing press. A year or two went by and then Gutenberg printed a book from solid type-letters cut in a solid block of wood so that when that book was printed there could be no other

Gutenberg foresaw a good deal. He remarked: "The printed book is not like any other art. A painter sketches his figures on the canvas and perfects the creation of his thought, the same with the poet, the engraver, the musician, we, on the contrary, with our presses, are only the servants of others."

The old man Gutenberg, who was born in 1400 and died in 1468, was right. The book has become everything and the printer almost nothing, yet without the printer where would the writer be and where would the
