### OLDER FEMINISTS OF ENGLAND PLANNING NEW PROGRAMME

Militarists Find Sisters Complacent and Too Indifferent to Political Rights They Struggled to Get For Them

LONDON, Oct. 12—England has almost forgotten her suffragettes. After all they got the vote did they not? What else do they want? Most people picture those wild women who starved in prison, who chained themselves to the railings at the Prime Minister's august home in Downing street. Who threw stones at policemen, as sitting quietly at home knitting socks and taking great pride in their grandchildren.

But there is still a National Council of Women and a Women's Freedom League and some forty other women's organizations not altogether satisfied with the amount of interest women show in politics now that they have the vote and the Women's Freedom League has decided that steps must be taken—not against men this time but against the indifference of the women voter for whom they worked so hard.

#### Planning Action

It is one of the most interesting experiences imaginable to go to the Women's Freedom League offices and meet there many of the suffragettes and find that their daughters and sometimes even their granddaughters are there also, only too proud to be associated with these women who were known as Militant Suffragettes. Of course there is no longer a W.S.F.L. and the Pankhursts have vanished into obscurity but the Women's Freedom League is ripe for action.

Their grand old leader Mrs. Charlotte Despard is now ninety-three years old and they gave her a birthday party recently and she is keen that they—and she—should go to work again. She was the most inspiring of all their speakers, a thin, erect woman with a resounding voice and a face that seemed lighted from within. Then there is Mrs. Billington Greig, the first woman to go to prison and there is Mrs. Flora Drummond that short sturdy woman, like a little drum major who suffered all the vicissitudes her sister suffragettes did but is hale and hearty still.

#### Watching Her Sisters

It is Mrs. Billington Greig who has started this present movement. She has been watching the progress of women in statesmanship, of a world all the better for having women working with men in ruling a country and she has come to the conclusion that women have become a little complacent. They do not come out in bodies when elections sweep the country and demand that the candidates of the different parties should be frank and tell what they are prepared to do about having women with titles of their own in the House of Lords and other women on the Privy Council.

And women are not demanding reforms that will develop and widen the scope of women's place in public life. So, now the women's Freedom League is to start a campaign for "Full Equality, in Every Direction, of Women with Men."

#### Work Program

They are to work for peace, better housing, earlier pensions for spinsters, places for women on every magistrate's bench throughout the country and women on all juries. Then just to cover all possible ground they want women on the prison committee and women medical officers and women inspectors of prisons to stay nothing of women police commissioners and women police.

Equal opportunities and equal pay for men and women in all branches of the Civil Service at home and abroad is one of their main points, the right of married women to work for pay and various things about income taxes. In fact one does not realize how many privileges women still lack till one visits the Women's Freedom League and sees that champions of women ready to take up the fight again.

#### Women Speakers

But this time it is to be largely proselytizing. Women speakers well trained for the job of getting all over the country before and at election time, not working for any party but urging women to remember the grave issues facing the country and how great a party they should play in them and how they should give their vote to the man who they believe will respect their rights and work for them.

### GIRL FINDS NEW TUBERCULOSIS FACTOR, FIRST "UNDESIRABLE" ENZYME KNOWN

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 12—Georgine A. Moerke, young, brunette, good-looking chemist of the Detroit health department, reported today discovery of a new factor in tuberculosis, an "undesirable" enzyme, the first of its kind in medicine, which is produced by the tuberculosis germ and aids in its destructive attack.

She told the American Chemical Society that test tubes show this enzyme takes up oxygen and destroys adrenalin. This indicates that in the person suffering from tuberculosis, the "undesirable" steals oxygen from lungs already depleted, and cuts down the supply of adrenalin which every body furnishes from its own glands to keep up energy.

She reported to the medical section. Most of her discoveries, she said, came in the past month. She said available records showed no other enzyme like this, and medical men who heard her agreed they knew nothing of the sort.

There are scores of enzymes. Pepsin which aids digestion is an example. They aid in chemical reactions, and while it is possible for them to produce bad results, the enzymes in man have always been considered essentials to life and not the aids of death.

Something that looked like coal dust in lungs of persons who had died of tuberculosis, she said, was the first clue that led to the "undesirable" enzyme.

The black specks were found about a year ago by Dr. C. E. Woodruff, director of the William H. Mayberry sanatorium, where Miss Moerke works. They were found also in other parts of the body.

The "black" trail led farther. Blackening was noted in tissues near the spot where injections of tuberculosis infection were made in animals. Black particles were found in the tubercles which appear during the course of the disease.

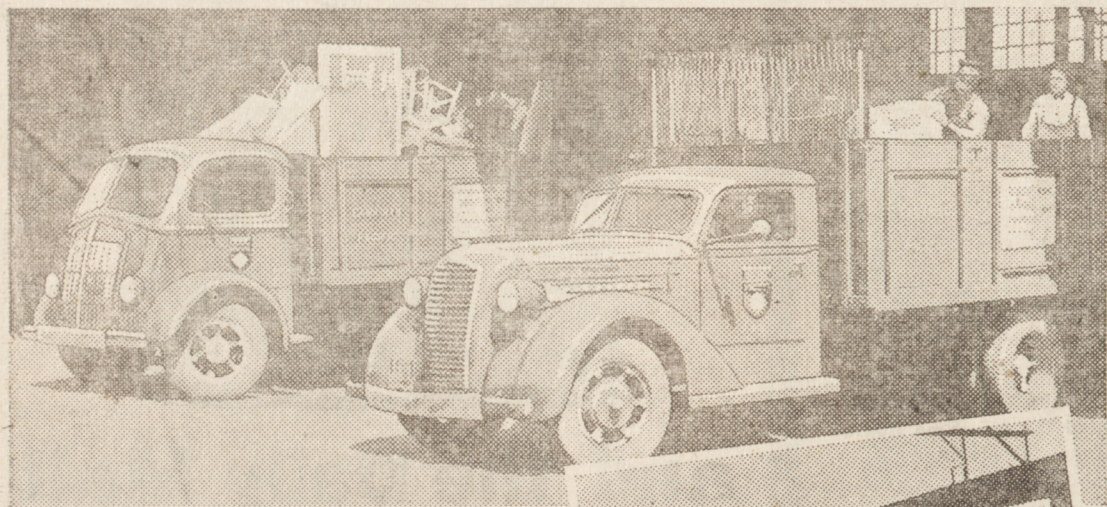
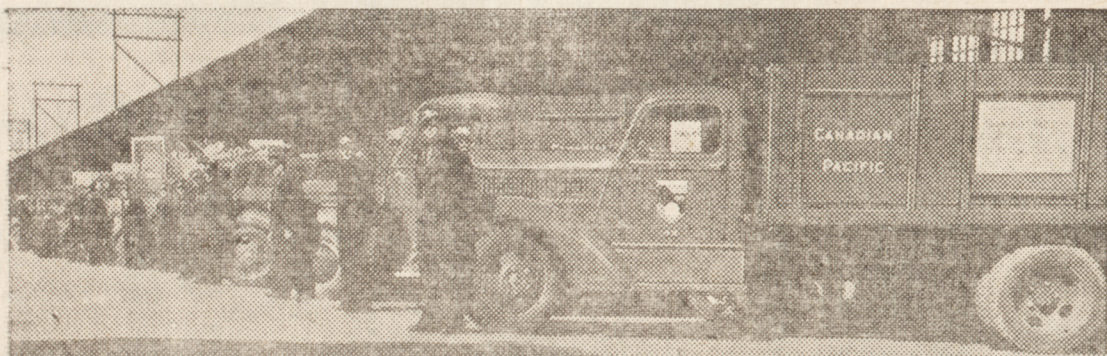

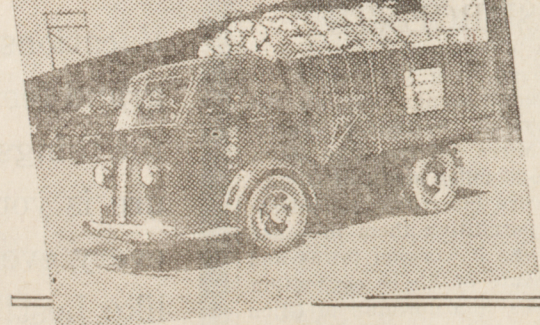

### Canadian Pacific New Freight Service



Montreal freight shippers are enjoying the fastest pick-up and delivery service in Canada since the inauguration of the Canadian Pacific Railway's new Carriage Department for the pick-up and delivery of railway freight.

Ninety-two brand new trucks, of a heavy type, from two to five tons, were bought especially for this new Canadian experiment, which is designed to handle freight with all the speed and efficiency of express shipments. Built for local delivery and pick-up of freight, in carload lots or less, the 92 trucks form a rapid and steady stream of communication between the Canadian Pacific freight sheds in Montreal and the city's shippers. By eliminating much of the handling of freight and instilling the Canadian Pacific motto for fast service into this end of freight traffic, the new trucks are speeding up the service to a degree previously unknown. Although this service has also been introduced to Ottawa and Sherbrooke, Montreal will be the main testing ground.

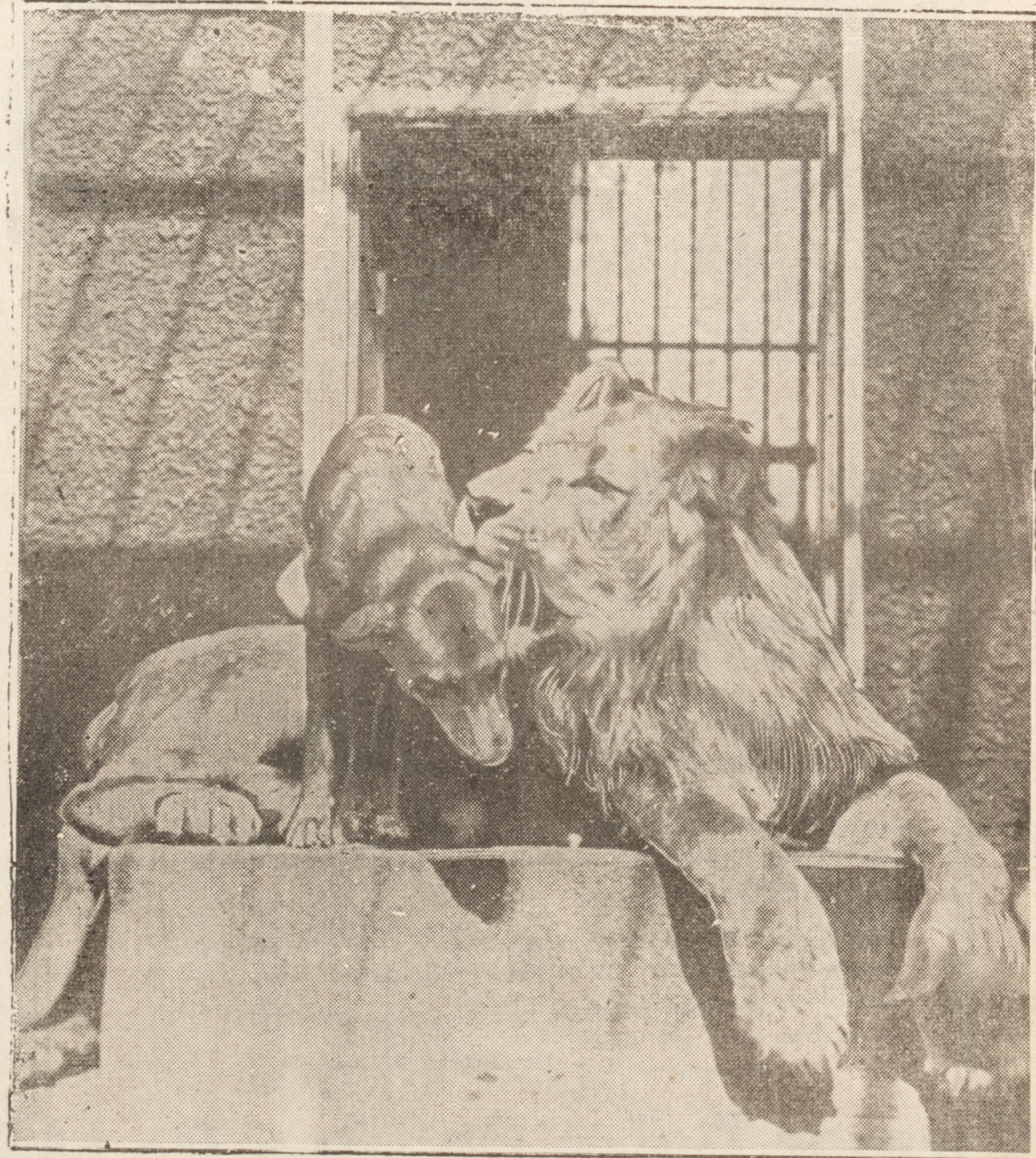
Both Miss Bagley and Mrs. Brown boast they have picked more than 100 barrels of potatoes a day on occasions.
