### PLAN TO ERECT NEW GARAGE AND BUS TERMINAL

Super Service Stations, Ltd., Asks For Building Permit

Brick Building

To Occupy Site Old City Club, Capital Transit Premises

Application for a building permit on behalf oi the Super Service Stations, Ltd., for the erection of a large, modern service station and bus terminal on Queen Street on the site now occupied by the Capital Transit Bus Station and the brick building formerly occupied by the City Club, was made by George Thompson and W. E. Vaughn, at the meeting of the Town Planning Commission held last even-

The proposed new building will have a frontage on Queen Street of 70 feet for the service station, repair shop and other connected departments, while the bus station will face Court House Square. A decision on the application was asked at the earliest possible date so that the demolition of the buildings now standing can be commenced immediately. Anneuncement of the decision will be made at the meeting of the commission scheduled for Oct. 29.

Brick Structure

Questioned this morning, Mr. Thompson, manager of the Capital Transit Co., Ltd., stated that the new building will be used jointly by the two companies, making it clear that the bus lines will still be operated by the present company. The building will be a single storey brick structure with stucco face, and will be set in 40 feet from the sidewalk.
