ALBERTA LOANS ADULT EDUCATION EXPERT TO N. B.

Mrs. E. S. Haynes, M.A., To Spend Several Months Here

Taught At Saint John

Plans to Organize Literary Phases of Provincial Programme

Mrs. Elizabeth Sterling Haynes, M. A. of the Extension Staff of the University of Alberta has been loaned to the New Brunswick Department of Education for a few months. It was announced today by Hon. Dr. A. P. Patterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations. She arrived in Fredericton recently from New York where she was in conference with the American Committee on Adult Education in her capacity as Canadian Editor of the International One-Act Play Magazine.

Mrs. Haynes has been identified with Alberta's program of Adult Education for several years in the field of interpretive and creative literature. As a result of her organizing energy and distinguished literary gifts, more than two hundred rural centres in Alberta now have active groups (both adult and school, in most cases) studying literature and social subjects through the vitalizing vehicle of the drama. Following her efforts, music and drama festivals are now carried out each year in all school inspectorates of that province and the winning group from these districts participate in a grand provincial meet.

To Organize Literary Phases

While in New Brunswick, Mrs. Haynes will organize the literary phases of a province-wide adult education program and will serve the study clubs and adult groups in general, through radio talks, correspondence and direct contact. A similar service will be rendered to the teachers of Literature and social studies in the public schools. Special attention will be given to training for leadership in New Brunswick a group of our young people who may be specially gifted in literature and drama.

Mrs. Haynes was a popular teacher at the 1937 New Brunswick summer school of Education at Saint John. (Continued on Page Five)

Discover Body of Missing Municipal Home Inmate Today

The body of George McQuaid, York County Municipal Home inmate who has been missing since early Tuesday morning, was discovered shortly after noon today a short distance away from the Home by Corporal L. P. Ryder, head of the Fredericton Detachment R.C.M.P., and Sheriff C. N. Goodspeed.

The deceased, who was 77 years old, disappeared from the Home about 6:30 Tuesday morning, and an intensive search of both the surrounding countryside and river failed to produce any trace of him. The body was found in a shallow ravine, in a swamp about 300 yards from the home. A small spring issued from the ravine, and when the body was found, it was first believed that drowning had been the cause of death, since the body was lying on the face in the water.

Dr. Charles MacKay stated that death came about as a result of a heart attack. No marks were found on his body or other circumstances which would cause the belief that death was caused by suicide.

The strange circumstances of the case, which included the fact that the deceased had left in his stocking feet, and at an unusual time, since it was before breakfast, is explained since he was aged and quite feeble minded.

The deceased, a native of Douglas Parish, has relatives at Houlton, it is understood.

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MAY ESTABLISH BRANCH FACTORY CANAD. CANNERS

Ald. F. S. Mundle Discusses Plan In Visit to N. S. Plant

Would Employ Many

Would Can Apples, Berries, Fiddleheads, Cider and Dried Fruits

The possibility that a branch factory of the Canadian Canners, Ltd., the largest canning company in Canada, may be established in this city, giving employment to a large number of local men and women, was revealed today by Alderman F. S. Mundle, following a trip to Nova Scotia during which he visited the factory of that company at Middleton. While there he conferred on the matter with T. H. Bartow, general manager of the firm.

The company is very interested in establishing a plant in New Brunswick, Alderman Mundle stated, adding that he believes that they look upon this city with favour as the probable locality for the establishment. Mr. Bartow has been invited to visit the city by Alderman Mundle for the purpose of viewing the situation and discussing the matter with city officials and others interested. In speaking to The Daily Mail today the Alderman said that he believes that necessary concessions could be arranged between the city and the company to secure the industry for this city.

Would Employ Many

The factory at Middleton employs 200 girls and 50 men, and although it is not believed that the factory here would employ that many, it was stated that the city could be assured of employment for a large staff, mostly composed of girls.

The company would be chiefly interested in the canning of apples, blueberries, the manufacture of cider. (Continued on Page Five)

CABINET RECEIVES REPORT OF FISHING INDUSTRY IN N. B.

Committee Appointed to Consider Report, Make Recommendations

A 140-page typewritten report on the fishing industry of New Brunswick, a result of a survey made recently by Walter W. Leonard, Saint John, was presented to the provincial government at its meeting yesterday afternoon, it was announced by Premier A. A. Dwyer.

The voluminous report, which touches all phases and branches of the fishing industry of this province, contains numerous recommendations to bring about improvements, it is understood.

The following will be asked to make up a voluntary advisory committee to consider the situation as regards the fishing industry of New Brunswick, make a review of the Leonard Report, and make recommendations to the provincial government with a view of subsequently forwarding them to Hon. J. E. Michaud, Dominion Minister of Fisheries: Fred Magee, Port Elgin; Foster G. Calder, M.L.A., Deer Island; F. T. B. Young, M.L.A., Caraquet; Alfred H. Brittain, Montreal; H. R. Ross, Saint John; Dr. J. J. Barry, Black's Harbour; Emil Patrel, Shediac; and J. H. Conlon, director of federal and municipal relations as secretary.

Copies of the report are being prepared at present, and upon completion will be given to the various members before they convene as a body. It is understood that the committee will meet in this city as soon as is convenient to do so, in order to get an early start on plans for the rehabilitation and development of the old industry.

All Quiet On Minto Strike Front

U.M.W. Urges Formation Special C'tee To Look Into Conditions

No definite information could be gained today concerning the provincial government's intentions, following the request of the United Mine Workers of America that a commission composed of miners, operators and government representatives be appointed to thoroughly investigate the mining situation in the Minto areas. The district headquarters of the union is at present considering the proposal of the government that the men be allowed to return to work so that the Fair Wage Board will be authorized to act on the matter, it is understood.

Meanwhile, at Minto, the situation today remained much as it was yesterday. No developments of any importance have taken place, it was reported by reliable sources, and it is further expected that the situation will remain unchanged for the rest of the week.

About 175 men are working, it was reported today, and a small amount of coal is being shipped. Welton and Henderson shipped one car of coal yesterday and another today. The Evans mine is also shipping coal three days per week.

TO HOLD PEP RALLY

In preparation for the annual football classic to be held here tomorrow, when the Red and Black fifteen meets the Garnet and Gold squad from Sackville, plans are afoot to hold a pep rally tonight at College Field, complete with bonfires, cheering and singing. The meeting, which is being sponsored by Brunswick, student organ, will probably culminate in a parade up Queen Street to the hotel where the visiting team will stay, where the students will serenade their choice for slaughter.

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
