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## PHRENOLOGY AID IN DISCERNING CHILD'S ABILITY

### James Strange, Phrenologist, in Interview With Newspaper Man.

James Strange, professional phrenologist when interviewed at the Barker House yesterday, said "It is the wish and endeavor of all phrenologists to receive the kindly good will and consideration of all classes of their fellow men. The real masters of the science have always felt that to achieve this end it is necessary to make some substantial contribution to the welfare of humanity."

Mr. Strange said that in 1922 he had been attracted to the science of phrenology some years after his arrival in Canada from England. He studied the subject in Toronto with H. B. Farmer one of the most prominent of Canadian phrenologists.

"To become a phrenologist one must endeavor to forget the thought of self. One's horizon becomes vastly widened and one tastes more fully of the savor of life. The interest of a phrenologist is always active. He is constantly drawing upon his analytic faculties—balancing one deduction against another to arrive at the conclusions which are used in a final reading of the person who desires a character analysis.

"A great and unjust harm is being done the science of phrenology by the travelling quacks who set themselves up as phrenologists. These people who put on phrenology acts without the slightest knowledge of true phrenology are base imposters, and are doing incalculable harm to the true cause of Phrenology. They endeavor to conceal their lack of real knowledge under the mannerisms of the actor and have been responsible for undoing much of the good work done by the true practitioners of the science."

As instances of famous men who believed in phrenology Mr. Strange quoted Walter Carnegie, W. J. Stead, Lloyd George and Walter Runciman. It was revealed at the last yearly convention of the British Phrenologists Society now in its fiftieth year that Edison's inventive genius was first revealed to him by a phrenologist and that W. E. Gladstone four times Prime Minister of England had praised the value of Phrenology. Mr. Strange expects to reside in Fredericton for some time and possibly take up a permanent residence here. In addition to his work as a Phrenologist, Mr. Strange has devoted considerable attention to the interesting subjects of Palmistry and analysis of character by means of handwriting.

## NEW RELIEF FOR TEETH PAIN

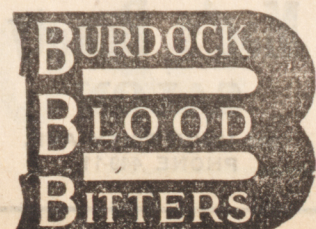
Think of the word 'dentist,' and only too many of us immediately think of pain. Now, this is a mental 'hangover' from the early days when dentists did not have the present methods by which pain can be prevented to a large extent.

A recent discovery by Dr. LeRoy L. Hartman, of Columbia University, should do much to prevent pain in repairing teeth. He has made a solution which can be put on the tooth to prevent pain during dental work. He announced this solution a little more than a year ago and since that time some careful studies have been carried out by a committee of dentists, to see just how effective this solution is.

The test showed that it is effective in about 37 per cent. of the cases in which it is employed. The solution is to be used only in those cases where it can be applied directly to the dentine, which is a substance within the tooth. In other words, unless the outer enamel covering of the tooth has decayed or has been removed, the Hartman solution cannot have any effect.

This preparation is applied directly to the teeth by means of a pellet of cotton. When using it, great care must be taken to keep it from get-

**Fish Ramekins**  
2 1/2 cups of any cooked fish  
5 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca  
1 cup milk  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Dash of cayenne  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon celery salt  
1/2 teaspoon minced chives  
1/2 teaspoon minced parsley  
1 pimento, chopped fine  
This was planned to use left-over boiled cod. But tuna or any white fish, or salmon may be used. Combine the tapioca with the milk, salt, cayenne, parsley, fish, and all other ingredients. Mix well. Let stand

ting on gums and cheeks, because it will cause blistering. Therefore it should never be used except under the direction of a dentist.

This preparation seems to have its chief effect on substances in the dentine, known as lipoids, which are fats. The solution dissolves the lipid or fats in the tiny, hollow tubes that make up the dentine. This takes the pain sensation out of the dentine.

From this, it can be seen that the Hartman solution cannot be used in caring for all teeth. People should not get the idea that their dentists are not modern because they do not use this preparation in their cases.

In those cases where this solution cannot be employed, there are other methods of preventing pain. The injection of local anaesthetics has been found satisfactory.

The fact that dental operations may produce pain should be a warning that everyone should heed. A person who takes care of his teeth can avoid suffering from toothache and the pain that may accompany dental operations. Taking care of the teeth properly means you must eat the right foods, particularly those supplying lime, phosphorus, and vitamins A, C and D; chew coarse, hard foods; brush your teeth regularly, and visit your dentist every six months, so that the tartar may be scraped off your teeth, and tiny decayed spots promptly filled. Doing these things is your best protection against dental pain.

### BRITISH STEAMER REFLOATED NEAR HONG KONG
