It was stated by Alderman Ross that members of the City Council had interviewed Hon A. P. Paterson on numerous occasions con cerning the matters of relief, but no relief has been obtained since last August. Alderman B. R. Ross declared that the Government told him they were too busy to take the matter up For the month of March this year Committee it may be reconsidered in the cost of relief has been one quarter less than last year when the Government sponsored 75 per cent. of costs. This lack of help will necessitate a \$9,000 extra assessment.

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
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
