Turkey and a big addition to the "berry business" on the Cape.

M. L. Urann, Cape Cod's "big cranberry man," was here looking the place over today. "I've been in the business for 30 years," he said, "and it has been changed a lot in that time. These plantations were not so costly in those days. Now some of these bogs are worth \$3000 an acre. Four years are required for a bog to become productive."

What is said to be the largest bog in the world is opposite this great development. It is of colossal size. The variety of berry to be grown in the new bog will be the Early Black, which develops quickly and has a nice, tart flavor. Incidentally, Mr. Urann is authority for the statement that this is expected to be a banner year for cranberries. "More," said he, "have been eaten than ever before in a summer season. I suppose the reason for this is the large use of turkey, which is less expensive than beef. Whatever may be the reason, a great deal of cranberry sauce is being devoured."

and were connected with the raising of a regiment to send to what was then Upper Canada. They were connected with the Imperial Army then stationed in the barracks here.

The records of the Forman and Brown families which are in the possession of Miss Forman contain many interesting incidents regarding the early Loyalist settlers and of those who later came to these parts. These records mention the Hagermans, the Munroes, the Prices, the Formans, the Brownes, the Tapleys and several other families well known in this section of the country. In these records special reference is made to Burton and places throughout Bear Island, Queensbury and Southampton. It is The Daily Mail's intention to publish extracts from the diary which Miss Forman has brought with her. The story of the Forman Browne family which came here at the close of the Revolutionary War contains much matter which is of interest to people in this section of the province.

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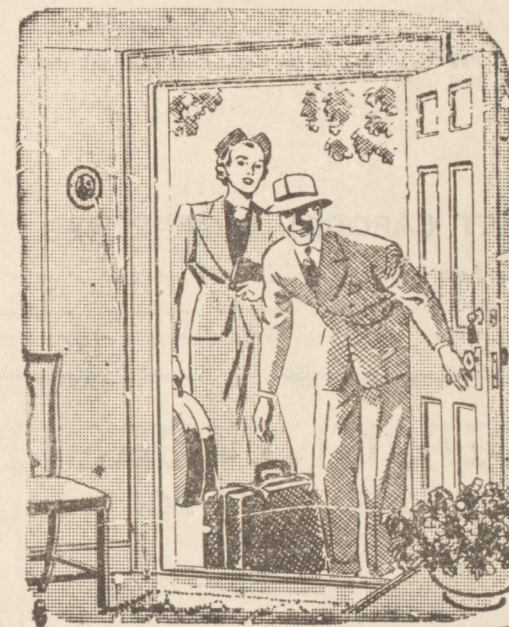
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
