CHICAGO, Aug. 19-The dedication of Josh Higgins Park, a 30-acre tract being established at Finchford, Ia., in tribute to Joe Du Mond, NBC actor and singer, and his NBC program. Josh Higgins of Finchville, will be broadcast during the first half hour of the National Farm and Home Hour on Thursday, August 26, over the NBC-Blue Network from 1:30 to 2:00 p. m., EDST.

The Cedar Falls Chamber of Commerce and a committee of Finchford citizens received the park as a trioute to Du Mond, native of Finchford, because of the publicity he has brought the little town "by the bend of the river." Former production manager of WMT at Waterloo, Ia., Du Mond created the character of Josh Higgins and the fictional Finchville, microphone counterpart of his native town, before coming to NBC networks.
