"From an acting standpoint, though," says Jolson, "radio is the only thing that interests me now. One reason for that is because it's so much bigger than anything else. Today, if you are on a good national show, millions of people hear you every week. You might spend 10 or 12 weeks making a one-hour picture which will be seen by that many per-

"In a sense, that makes radio work more difficult. I can remember using the same gag on the stage for two years. And it always got a laugh. You can't do that on the radio however. Your audience isn't sufficient-60 to 80 per cent, of the listening same gag twice within a month's time, you'd get so many complaining letters an extra mailman would have to be added to your route. These are the things you don't dare get. And I'm one guy who's very careful that the postman doesn't ring twice."


