FRED W. FAIRLEY, MIRAMICHI GUIDE, ATTENDS SHOWS

Has Fine Sporting Outfit On The River Near Boiestown

Owens Salmon Pools

Including One Made Famous by the Late Joe Jefferson

Fred W. Fairley, who operates the Elmsdale sporting camps on the north bank of the Southwest Miramichi River in York County, a few miles above Boiestown, left last night in company with Mrs. Fairley, for Boston to attend the New England Sportsmen's Show, which opens in that city on Saturday, February 5th. At Boston he will join the large contingent of New Brunswick guides who left Saint John for that city yesterday by one of the Eastern steamships. Mr. Fairley will assist in getting the New Brunswick exhibit in shape for the opening of the show on Saturday evening. He plans to proceed the following week to New York with the exhibit and attend the sportsmen's show to open in the Grand Central Palace in that city on February 18.

Has Fine Camps

Mr. Fairley, with the assistance of Mrs. Fairley and their two husky sons, operates one of the finest sets of sporting cabins on the Miramichi River. There are seven in the group, one of which has been fitted up as a bathroom, with hot and cold running water. Nearby is located one of the best boiling springs in the country, and ice cold water from this has been piped to the camps. The largest of the camps does duty as a dining room and cookhouse, and it is here that Mrs. Fairley, who is a very capable cook, makes her headquarters during the long angling season, which begins in April and ends the 30th of September.

Has Riparian Rights

Mr. Fairley is the riparian owner of two miles of Miramichi water, which begins at the Norrad bridge and extends a mile below his camps. Some of the best salmon pools on the river are to be found in this stretch of the river, and good catches are made from them every season. The Northumberland county line crosses the river just below his cabins, which means that they are located in the County of York. They can be reached by auto from Fredericton in two hours.

fine sporting camp at the Mouth of York. Most Miramichi guides are just as much at home when following the trail of a bear in the woods as they are when polling or paddling a canoe on the river and Mr. Fairley is one of that class. Last season he handled the largest number of non-resident sportsmen in his long career as a guide and outfitter and he is hopeful of a greatly increased business during the coming year. He is confident that the opening of a new highway across the province from Renous to Plaster Rock is going to open up a Sportsmen's Paradise, and having secured the lease of a camp site in that region he expects to handle a share of the new business that it will undoubtedly bring to the province. All of Mr. Fairley's camps will be found conveniently located for those who may wish to combine a hunting or fishing trip, either in the spring or fall.

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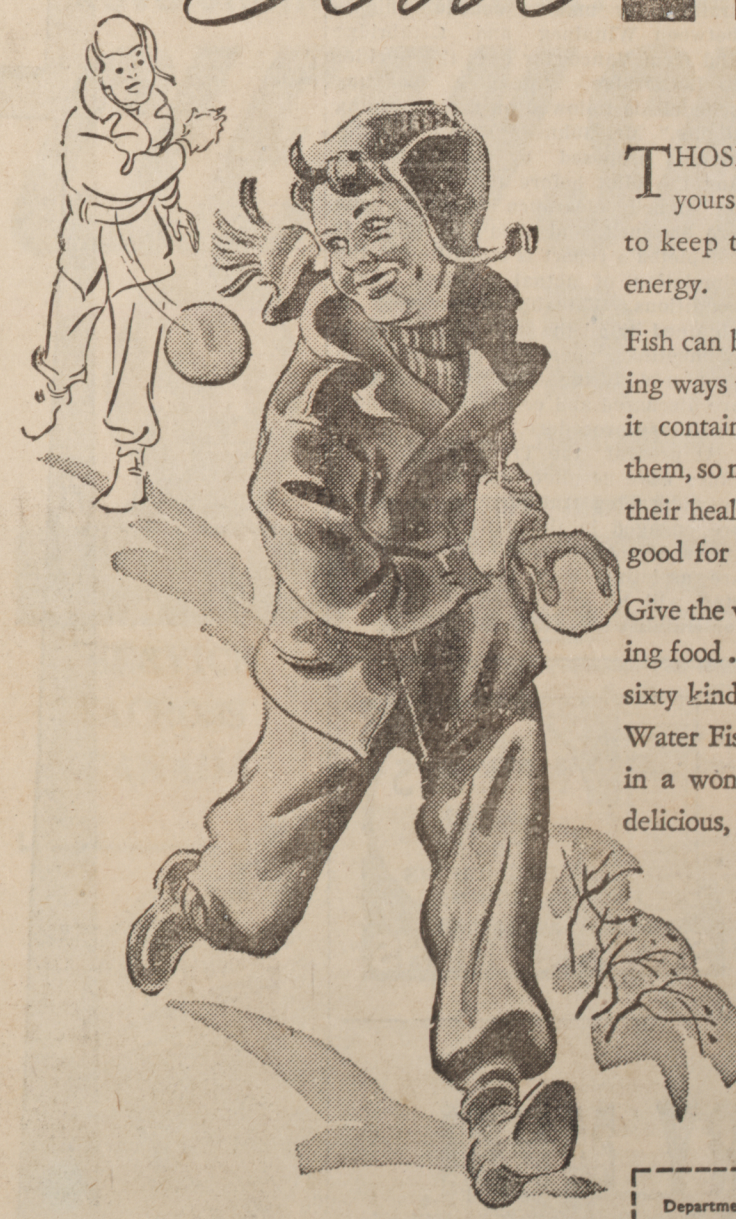
