Notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislature of New Brunswick for the passing of an Act to authorize the City of Fredericton to make a further issue of debentures in a sum not exceeding \$60,000.00 payable in twenty years from the date thereof with interest at a rate not exceeding 3½ per cent. per annum payable half yearly the proceeds of the sale of \$50,000.00 of said debentures to be used for the construction of permanent roads and streets in the City of Fredericton and the proceeds of \$10,000.00 thereof to be used for water and sewerage purposes.

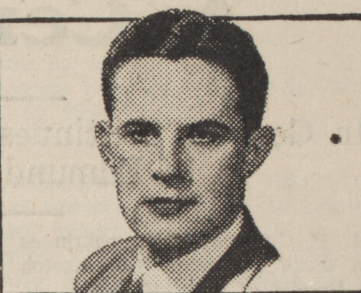
Period Ending Feb 7th, 1938

Wednesday saw the third session of the District Scout Leaders' Training Course held at previous sessions, at St. Dunstan's Hall. There was a large and enthusiastic attendance. Subjects covered included the Investiture, Scout's Pace and Kim's Game, by Asst. Scout Master Cyril Barnes; and Signalling and Compass, by myself. Other features of this session were: the dressing-up charade, won by two members of the Owls, one Bobcat and one Beaver; and the fine singing-song, which ended the session.

On Thursday afternoon, at St. Margaret's Hall, Morrison's Mills, a Scout Troop was started, with Rev. Karl Fairweather as Scout Master, and Ted MacArthur as Assistant. The Troop, consists at present, of two patrols, Beavers and Robins. Officials from the city assisted at the first meeting and will continue to do so, for the present.

On Sunday morning, members of the Third Fredericton Rover Crew attended morning service at the Parish Church. There was a fine showing and during his broadcast address, the rector, Ven. Archdeacon Gray commended the activities of this Crew, and of the Scout Movement in general, to his hearers.

On Monday evening, at St. Dunstan's hall, a good number of the younger boys assembled to see the Headquarters films of the World Jamboree held last August, at Vogelzang, Holland, and attended by some 25,000 Boy Scouts from all parts of the world.
