

CAPITALS TURN BACK ST. CROIX HERE 5-3

INJURIES OF COFFEY EXPENSIVE TO BORDERITES AS CAPITALS INCREASE LEAD ON BEAVERS BY EASY VICTORY

Lifford, McLenahan and McNichol Each Net Two Points; Game Delayed By Injuries Of Border Goalie; Ev. Staples Pinch-hits for Coffey

The loss of Gordon Coffey, stellar St. Croix goalie, through injuries last night proved expensive to the border team as the Capitals overcame a one-goal lead in the first period to advance their lead on the Saint John Beavers to three points by virtue of their 5-3 victory. Coffey was struck in the face in the middle of the first stanza by a hard shot off McLenahan's stick, was forced to retire from the game early in the second frame and was replaced by Ev. Staples, Devon netminder. Although the pinch-hitting goalie turned in some fine work in his time between the pipes, the sniping of the locals with a little too much and the Capitals jumped their tally three notches after the regular goalie left the ice.

Frosty weather provided a sheet of ice that had both teams overskating passes. The game as a whole was disorganized and did not hold much excitement. Bun McLenahan, high scoring centreman, was maneuvering for firing range throughout every period and added two points to his season's count by a solo goal and an assist. A good crowd of fans shivered in their seats as repeated delays held the game up. The tussle started three-quarters of an hour late as one of the autos bearing the visiting team had trouble on the road. Coffey's injury and subsequent replacement further held up the play.

The game opened with the Capitals bossing the play in repeated rushes, but effective and close checking by St. Croix held the locals well outside the danger zone.

MacNichol gave the Borderites a one goal lead when he touched the first score of the game on a pass from Camyre and Innes six minutes and four seconds after the opening whistle. The shot came through a mess of legs at tussle-headed Cliff Young, who had little opportunity to do anything about it, the puck hitting his skate and deflected into the net. The game had a five minute recess as Coffey left the ice for medical aid after stopping McLenahan's hard shot. He returned to the game after first-aid to a badly cut lip.

CAPS TIE SCORE

Young was called on for a hard stop as the St. Croix snipers swarmed around the net. He came out and cleared to Lifford, who broke away with Kilburn and Morehouse flanking him. Lifford shot in the tying score on the combination play with his two team-mates. A little over three minutes later Keenan beat Coffey on a pass from Mills and Doucet to give the Capitals a one goal lead.

The second period opened fast as the Capitals strove to increase their lead. Armstrong drew a trip to the box for holding and things looked like a sure tally for the Capitals as Goodine went through on the weakened team. He flipped a perfect pass to Morehouse, who overskated the heel.

Minor Loops Consider Lively Ball For 1938

CHICAGO BLACK HAWKS DO WELL WITH AMERICAN-BORN PLAYERS

Cully Dahlstrom, A Detroit Boy, Latest Acquisition

Still expressing American-born talent though, quite obviously, not at the expense of quality, the Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League this year boast not only the lone American-born manager in the history of the league, but another American-born player to add to Aleck Levinsky, Mike Karakas and Elwin "Doc" Romnes — all of whom were born in the United States, the latter two playing all their hockey there. This is the American-born player Cully Dahlstrom, rookie centre.

For Dahlstrom, operating in spurts in the early Hawk games, has so improved that against the invading world champion Red Wings from Detroit recently, he got the starting call at centre on the third line and Manager Stewart believes he will stay there the rest of the season.

"He's going to be a smart hockey player, or I'll miss my guess," observed Stewart. "He handles the stick well, has balance on his skates and moves around like Tommy Cook or 'Doc' Romnes does, without much lost motion. You don't have to tell him anything more than once. He's got a good chance to stay up there a long time."

And so, perhaps, another one of the Black Hawks' touches will turn to gold and they will turn up with another top-notch man with the greatest of ease, as they did in acquiring 'Mush' March, Johnny Gottselig, Paul Thompson, Romnes and Karakas. The Hawks corralled still another American-born player lately when Roger "Broadway" Jenkins, who was born in Appleton, Wis., got a trial with the Windy City team.

Dahlstrom was last year with St. Paul in the American Association, scoring 23 goals and getting 19 assists. The season before in the same league, he had 20 goals, 23 assists, topping his present team-mate, Pete Palangio, by a single point.

Another American-born player on the Hawk team, a rookie also, is Vic Heyliger, the ex-Wolverine (Michigan College) hockey captain. He is young and energetic and has lately been used regularly by the Hawks.

KID LULU GETS TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT OVER KID HART AT SAINT JOHN TO RETAIN MARITIME LIGHTWEIGHT TITLE

Ray McIntyre Stops Billy Holm In Fourth Round; Gauthier Given Decision Over Laverne After 6 Rounds; Age, Lightness Spells Hart's Defeat

SAINT JOHN, Jan. 13—Countering southpaw Kid Hart's looping up-percut to the mid-section with a ripping right to the jaw, Paul Doucet, alias "Kid Lulu" of Bathurst, piled up a margin in earlier rounds and polished off the veteran with a technical knockout seven seconds after the start of the tenth round of Jack McAllister's semi-final bout at the Princess Theatre last night to retain the Maritime lightweight title he won from the lighter Moncton veteran some months ago.

Ray McIntyre, 162 pounds, of Montreal and Saint John, floored Billy Holm, the "Durable Dane" from New Waterford, with a right hook to the jaw two minutes and 19 seconds in the fourth round to take his third successive victory in a local ring since entering the professional ranks. Holm went down for a nine count in the opening round as McIntyre registered on a vicious one-two uppercut combination to the heart and head in his own park.

The cover is 1-128th of an inch thicker. It's seams are sewed with a five-strand thread instead of four. Otherwise the ball is the same.

Beneath the covers there will be no difference at all.

Says Ford Frick:

"It will take the actual test of pennant play to verify these things, of course, so in that sense our 1938 season will be experimental. We may make further changes next winter. May decide to speed up the ball a bit, or may add another 1-128th inch to the cover, or use six-thread strands instead of five."

THE TITLE BOUT

The handicap of five pounds he gave the Maritime champ and inability to land the "Sunday punch" in his left mitt spelt defeat for the bewhiskered Hart as his younger and heavier opponent slipped under his awkward right lead, tied him up in the clinches and came back with a damaging right to the mid-section.

Hart was saved by the bell in the ninth as Lulu draped the bleeding battler on the ropes with a terrific right smash to the mouth following a jab to the nose, and Referee Joe Irvine called the bout seven seconds after the last round opened.

Lulu was awarded seven of the ten rounds by both judges while the referee called five even. Hart weighed in at 128 and Lulu was five pounds heavier.

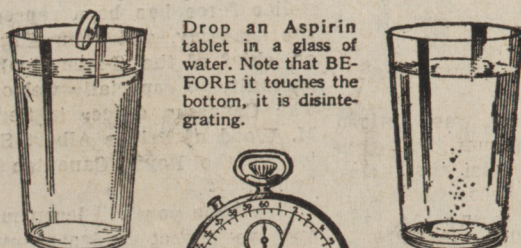
