Ald Forbes paid passing attention to the industries of Devon, noting the estabilshment of a new plant manufacturing lumber products. The Marysville plant of Canadian Cotions Ltd., had a \$500,000 payroll in 1937. he revealed. The average number of

employees was 400. In totalling the figures presented by Ald. Forbes, it was disclosed that there were 1,095 people industrially employed last year in the city of Fredericton and the towns of Marysville and Devon, as compared with the 1936 figure of 1,059.


