

# HUB COPS TOP SPOT; CAPS TRIM LEAFS

## DUD JAMES' MAROON AGGREGATION KEEPS FIRST PLACE HONORS IN RUGGED GAME AT MONCTON THROUGH 2-1 WIN

Weakened Capital Team Walked Over St. Croix Before the Smallest Crowd of Present Season; Young, Keenan, McLenahan Were Out

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 14—Charlie Phillips' goal midway through the third period gave Moncton Maroons first spot in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League standing here tonight and the bye in the playdown series as the home team scored a 2 to 1 win over the second place Saint John Beavers.

Before the largest crowd of the current season the Jamesmen played smart hockey but the beavers played keenly throughout the piece with the result that the fans saw about the best league joust in some time.

Minus "Swede" Olsen, captain and left winger, Jerry Lynch, another southpaw laneman and Colin Sherwood, a right winger, the Beavers played with but two front lines, and this sextet gave the home forces plenty of trouble.

The winning marker, poked home at 10:53 in the last period by the husky Maroon rearguard was the result of a smart play on the part of Phillips and his rearguard-mate Clarence Bastarache.

The teams played the first 20 minutes without a marker, then in the middle session they each rapped home a tally and Maroons copped the contest in the final session.

Ingraham was penalized for cross checking Livingston near the boards and while he was with the timers the Beavers ganged but Maroons did a nice job of protecting and no score resulted.

At the seven minute spot Eddie Price tripped George Bell in the centre zone, and it was Maroons' turn to put the pressure on. Not more than 500 spectators saw the visitors, playing shorthanded, with only eight men, hold the locals two-all in the first, drop behind 4-2 in the second, and then even the tally 5-5 in the third before going down in defeat mid a barrage of Fredericton rubber.

The absence of Young from the Fredericton nets with a cold and "Bun" McLenahan from the lineup with a gash over his eye necessitated the rearrangement of the entire Caps' lineup.

For all of the foregoing you have the word today of Manager Bill "Terrible" Terry of the Giants, who confidently predicts that his team will make it three straight pennants, and thus meet the Yankees in the world series for the third time in a row. Yes, he thinks the Yankees will repeat in the American league.

"Terrible Terry" was strangely affable, considering that he has just had published a magazine piece under that title—"Terrible Terry," in which he took New York baseball writers for a ride. He sat down with them last night at their annual banquet, and didn't even wince when they gave him the works in an appropriate skit.

As to that, he said: "I don't give a darn; I'm big enough to take it."

Apparently, he didn't even mind some of the things written about him in rebuttal to his piece, and seemingly was determined to make his brief visit away from his Memphis home as free from rancor as possible.

The manager of the Giants was not particularly concerned over his sustained feud with newspaper men, but interested, rather, in club business—particularly a budding deal with the Cincinnati Reds. CHATHAM, N. B., Feb. 15—St. Thomas College Tommies won their first victory in the New Brunswick Intercollegiate Hockey League here last night when they turned back Ralph Goodine's U.N.B. sextet 5-4 in overtime.

Gene O'Leary, St. Thomas defence-man, fired home the winning counter after more than seven minutes in the extra session.

The victory placed St. Thomas six in second place in the standing with one victory and two losses. Mount Allison University leads with two victories over the Tommies. Tomorrow night at Sackville U.N.B. plays Mounties and another victory for the latter will give them a stranglehold on the N.B. title.

The Red and Black forced the play at the outset but the Tommies soon found their stride and gave the U. N. B. net-custodian many anxious moments. Then followed several minutes of wide open hockey, neither side gaining advantage.
