City Had Surplus FORMER LOCAL \$679.45 For 1937 Statement Shows W. Turney Whitehead,

Budget For 1938 Set At \$293,000, An Increase of \$16,000 Over Last Year

NO INCREASE IN TAX RATE

Delegation Before Council Re Removal of Stone Yard and Joining Aberdeen St.; "May Be Done In Year or Two'

MOOD NEWS to the citizens of Fredericton was both the financial state-U ment of the year past, and the budget for the year 1938, which were presented to the council last evening in the regular monthly committee meeting. The statement for the year shows a surplus of \$679.45 for 1937, while the budget for the present year totals \$293,000.

Although the new budget is \$16,000 more than last year's, it is not felt that taxes will have to be raised. Mayor Forbes stated that the Board of Assessors feel that the assessment rate can be kept nearly the same as last year. It is estimated that \$309,375.10 will be needed for the administration of the city affairs during the present year, but with an estimated surplus revenue of \$16,375.10 from license fees and such, only \$293.00 need be raised by assessment.

Chief items of interest in the budget will be the assessing of the full VARIETY PROBLEM \$115,000 requested by the Board of School Trustees for the maintenance of schools, and allowance in street lighting costs for improvement of the lighting on Queen Street.
