MOUNTIES END PROMOTIONAL COURSE THURS.

Thirteen Members R. C. M. P. From Mar. Provinces Participated

Another Course Saint John Detective Took Course Along With Mounties

Thirteen members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick on Thursday will complete the promotional course for Junior N.C.O.s, which has been conducted at R.C.M.P. headquarters here during the past two and one half months. Nearly all examinations on the course have been written. Further examinations are being written tomorrow.

Taking the course along with the Mounties was Detective Geo. Stubbs of the Saint John Police Force. Following the completion of the present course eight men from the three Maritime provinces will assemble here for a refresher course which will conclude at the end of April.

New Course
In the new course, the men from the three provinces will be delegated on a pro rata basis, with more men coming from Nova Scotia and different parts of this province than from Prince Edward Island. The course will deal particularly with the latest methods of criminal detection along scientific lines.

Those completing the promotional course this week are L-Cpl. A. A. H. Cook, Constables J. O. Charlton, S. S. Kempton and G. A. Morrison, of 'H' Division; Constables W. Swindell and L. C. J. Watson, 'L' Division; and L-Cpl. R. W. Greatwood, Constables R. J. Kent, R. H. J. Holmes, G. M. Baker, W. L. Copp and A. D. Peltier, of 'J' Division which is situated in this province.

Among the subjects covered by the course is first aid, criminal code, Federal statutes, provincial statutes, drill and manual of arms, finger printing, photography, scientific aids in criminal detection and subjects relating to identification of 'wanted men' and kindred phases of ultra-modern police work.

The courses are under the supervision of Major W. V. Bruce, superintendent of 'J' Division, assisted by competent list of instructors in the various subjects.

POSSIBILITIES MAPLE PRODUCE MART FORESEEN

Chain Organization May Take Large Quantities N. B. Product

Are Negotiating Some Fear Held As To Whether N. B. Supply Is Sufficient

Possibilities of an extensive new market for New Brunswick Maple products is foreseen with negotiations which are at present going on between the Dominion Stores Ltd., and representatives of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and maple sugar producers in this province.

A large quantity of maple produce is marketed each year by the stores through their organization across the Dominion. In the past, it is understood that much of the produce of this type came from Quebec and other Upper Canadian provinces.

With the negotiations yet in a state of infancy, no definite details on the possibilities can be secured. It was stated today by one party connected with the negotiations that several factors have to be considered. The quality of the product has to be tested and it must be ascertained whether or not the supply in this province would meet the demand.

High Quality
In view of the fact that New Brunswick maple products have always enjoyed the highest reputation for quality, it is believed generally that there will be no hold back from this source.

Some fears are held as to whether or not the province can supply a sufficient quantity to satisfy the demand. Those concerned look with apprehension to the present cold weather which thus far has caused a backward season.

With the opening of the new maple sugar industry on the Renous-Plaster Rock highway, which is at present in a state of experimentation, such markets as these may be claimed for New Brunswick. At the present time the supply of maple produce in this province is mostly taken up by local demand.

DR. H. A. GREENE PASSED AWAY HERE SUNDAY

Well Known Retired Dentist Dies As Result of Fall; Practiced In City

The death occurred early Sunday morning at the Victoria Public Hospital of Dr. H. A. Greene aged 70 years. About two weeks ago Dr. Greene suffered a fractured thigh as a result of a fall on the icy sidewalk. Complications set in which resulted in his death yesterday.

For nearly fifty years Dr. Greene practiced dentistry in New Brunswick. He lived at Centreville for many years but removed to this city in 1911, where he continued his practice until about two years ago. His passing will be learned with deep regret by all who knew him.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. J. E. Palmer of this city; Mrs. C. J. Loughlin, Moncton; and Mrs. A. T. Clark, Victoria, B.C. Also surviving are three grandsons and two granddaughters.

Funeral services will be conducted at the home of his son-in-law, J. E. Palmer, 204 Church Street at two o'clock on Tuesday afternoon by Very Rev. Dean W. H. Moorhead. Interment will be made at the Rural cemetery extension.

AWAIT ACTION IN COMMONS RE YOUTH TRAINING

Dom.-Provincial Youth Training Project Expires Thursday

Expect Renewal Courses Closing In Two Points In Province This Week

Whether or not further handicraft and vocational courses under the Dominion and Provincial Youth Training Project will be carried out in this province in 1938 hinges on action in the Canadian House of Commons this week, it was stated today by Dr. Fletcher Peacock, director of educational services for the province.

The fiscal year for the Dominion closes on March 31, and present appropriations and sanction for the courses does not extend past that date. It is hoped by educational officials that the project will be renewed for another year and appropriations made before Thursday.

Intimate Renewal
In the speech from the Throne it was intimated that the plan would be renewed for another year but as yet no concrete action on the matter has been taken.

The handicraft courses in this province are nearly all completed or will be completed by the end of the present month. Arrangements have been made, Dr. Peacock stated today, to stop the other courses should the plan not be put in force for another year.

Miss Sazel Hayes, director of women's work, under the Department of Education, is leaving this evening to attend the closing of the handicrafts course at Port Elgin tomorrow. She will go from there to Dalhousie to attend the closing of a similar course there on March 31. Sixty-two persons participated in the course at Port Elgin, and 35 at Dalhousie.

W. K. Tibert, director of vocational education for the province, will be away this week visiting youth training courses in different parts of the province. He will inspect courses at Bristol, Dalhousie, Edmundston, Newcastle and Chatham.

While away, Miss Hayes will arrange for a course at Blackville, to begin in the near future, should the Dominion government decide to continue the scheme.

NINE INFORMATIONS

CITY BUSINESS BURGLARIZED DURING NIGHT

Safe Opened By Use Of Combination and \$50 Stolen

Police Investigating Full Extent of Loss Not Yet Determined Report Stated

Fredericton again fell prey to smooth fingered safe crackers, apparently of the "high class type," last night when the Bay Auto Parts was broken into, the safe opened and something over \$50 taken.

Full extent of the burglary could not be determined today since the manager of the store has had no opportunity to check over the list of stock to find what may have been taken.

Entry was made by forcing the back door of the establishment with a pry bar or similar tool, marks on the casing indicate. The safe was opened without violence, the combination being used to gain access to the money within the vault.

At Least \$50 Taken
Until further check-up of the company books is made the exact sum which was taken cannot be learned, the manager told The Daily Mail today. "At least \$50 was taken," he stated, adding, "that much anyway."

Corporal H. A. Tozer, fingerprint expert of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police was on the scene this afternoon. Whether or not this source of detection will be foiled by the use of gloves by the burglars was not known today. In other cases similar to the present break the crooks used gloves, making fingerprinting impossible, it is understood.

With the information today that the business had been burglarized and the safe opened, a rumor was heard that since the unsolved break in General Dairies, two other breaks have occurred which did not come to the public light. It is understood that similar methods of safe opening was used in each case.
