Mackenzie King-Howe Differ Over Politics In C.N.R. Administration

Prime Minister King Contended That C. N. R. Directors Could Not Be Indifferent To The Wishes Of Province

PREMIER KING'S DISAVOWAL CREATES A PRECEDENT

Howe Believes That Directors Should Have A Free Hand In Administration of Railways

OTTAWA, March 23—Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King publicly disagreed with his minister of railways, Hon. C. D. Howe, on the floor of the House of Commons yesterday when the latter expressed the strong belief that politics should not be allowed to enter into the administration of the Canadian National Railways.

Right Honorable Mr. King declared that it was inevitable that there should be some political interference in the management of the C. N. R. and that the railway directorate could not be "indifferent to the wishes of the government and of parliament."

While the prime minister declared that he was simply "interpreting" the remarks which his minister of transport had made, his "interpretation" was so completely contrary to the stand taken by Hon. Mr. Howe as to amount to a thorough-going contradiction of the latter.

Veterans on Parliament Hill last night were searching back into their memoirs unsuccessfully to recall a precedent for a public disavowal of a cabinet minister by his leader on the floor of the House. None could be cited.

FORD ESTATE TO PRODUCE READY MADE FARMHOUSES FROM OWN PINE TREES

WAYS, Ga., March 23—Henry Ford announced a new project—the manufacture of fabricated farmhouses from pine trees on his Georgia estate.

The automobile manufacturer also disclosed other plans for expansion of the community he has helped to build. These include restoration of Fort McAllister and construction of a school chapel and a manual arts school for Negro boys and men.

"We have already restored several of the old homes here and will begin work on the new farmhouses shortly," Ford said.

"The houses will be made in a number of standard patterns, or manufactured according to the prospective owner's plans. They will be offered to the general public as soon as the needs of our community here are supplied.

Save The Kiddies

WITH the approach of the spring and summer weather seems to be a good time to consider the question which has been brought up more than once by different people and which has been endorsed by The Daily Mail.

The time of year is approaching when kiddies are allowed to run the streets probably more than they are in the winter season. As the fine weather approaches it will be a problem to keep them in the house where they belong, at a reasonable hour.

When we speak of the "kiddies" of course we mean those dear little angel faced children anywhere from eight to fourteen years of age whose parents allow them to run the streets night after night from seven o'clock until eleven o'clock or later. Some few years ago an effort was made to have a curfew law passed but the idea fell through. It got as far as the City Council where somebody threw a monkey wrench into the whole works by saying that the city had no legal power to enact a curfew by-law.

The way many of these youngsters remain out on the street at night is a positive disgrace. It is not a kindness to these children to allow them to remain out until midnight or nearly so. Their opportunities for mischief is unlimited. Of these children who run the streets at night the general run of them are an undisciplined crowd who overrule their homes to an extent detrimental to the public welfare and to their own health. We believe that the sooner some curfew by-law or other law causing the children to be off the streets at a reasonable hour is passed the better it will be for everybody.

YOUTHS STUDY IN LEGISLATURE AT COLGATE

FREDERICTON, N. B. March 23—The following bills were given third reading in the New Brunswick Legislature yesterday: To provide for the redemption of \$300,000 provincial debentures falling due in 1938; to amend the incorporation act of Grand Falls; to authorize Newcastle to issue debentures; to fund capital expenditures and provide for the purchase of property and reconstruction at the Provincial Hospital; to authorize St. George to issue debentures; to authorize the sale of the St. George electrical distribution and street lighting system to the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission; relating to the constitution of the board of commissioners of the Saint John Municipal Home; relating to George W. Mullin; to amend the act respecting the levying and assessing of rates and taxes in Saint John; to authorize the Municipality of the City and County of Saint John to issue debentures.

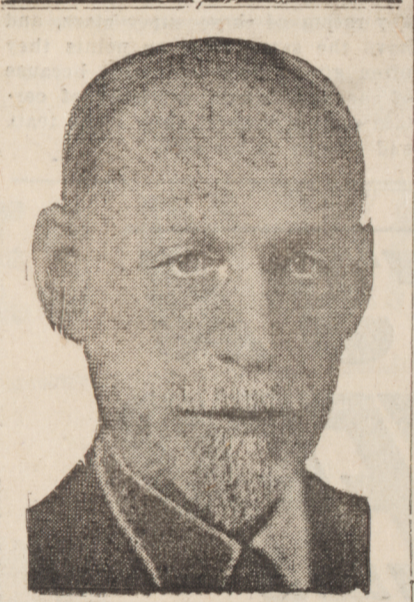
C. P. R. President Sails On Ten Days Caribbean Cruise

Dominion Provincial Relations On Today's Agenda Model League

I.L.O. Sessions Conclude, Draft Convention Polling Results 24 to 7 in Favor, Not Ratified Due Lacking Two-thirds Vote

SEVERAL MEMBERS DO NOT VOTE Addresses By Student Delegates Show Thought, Talent Public Speaking

The Model League Hears Representatives Of Various Provinces

Dominion Provincial Relations was the order of the day on the agenda of the Model League which is holding sessions at the University this week and which is attended by sixty delegates from the Universities of the Maritime Provinces. At this morning's session George McAllister, U.N. B. representing the Premier of Canada was in the chair. The first speaker Robert Porter represented Maurice duPlessis of Quebec. Mr. Porter stated that no amendment to the B.N.A. Act may be made without full acquiescence of all the provinces of Canada. None have ever been made without this assent.

(By Mary Neville) At yesterday afternoon's session of the Model League which is meeting this week at the University, discussion continued on the proposed draft convention concerning the creation of machinery for guaranteeing workers the right of collective bargaining. A vote taken on the draft resulted in 24 in favor and 7 against, a few of the delegates not voting, but due to lack of a two-thirds vote the motion was not ratified.

MAGISTRATAL DISTRICTS FOR NOVA SCOTIA

(Special to The Daily Mail) HALIFAX, March 23—The Legislature of Nova Scotia has decided to create magistratal districts. Each magistrate will be on a straight salary from the province.

ASKS RETURN OF RELIEF GIVEN MILLAR WINNERS AS APPEALS HALT SPLIT

Legal Fight By Mrs. M. Kenny and Mrs. Pauline Mae Clarke for Shares Expected to Continue

TORONTO, March 23—With appeals planned from the judgment of Mr. Justice Middleton, who ruled on Saturday against the claims of Mrs. Matthew Kenny and Mrs. Pauline Mae Clarke, entrants in the Millar will stork derby, the \$500,000 prize cannot be divided until these appeals, if any, are concluded, it was pointed out on Saturday by legal authorities.

Kenny's counsel would take similar action. Saturday, Mr. Justice Middleton announced that four Toronto mothers would share the \$500,000 estate equally. The four winning mothers, who are tied, with nine eligible babies, are: Mrs. Annie Katharine Smith, Mrs. Kathleen Nagle, Mrs. Alice Timleck and Mrs. Isabel MacLean.

Two Said Ineligible The Supreme Court jurist held that Mrs. Pauline Mae Clarke, 25, red-headed and pretty, and impulsive, stocky Mrs. Lillian Kenny, who had promised to build a mausoleum in honor of Charles V.
