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**APPEAL GRANTED  
HERE TODAY IN  
CONNORS' SUIT****Bernard Connors Grant-  
ed Appeal In Suit Re  
Sardine Packing This  
Morning**

Application for leave to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada in the suit of Bernard Connors vs. Connors Brothers, Ltd. and Lewis Connors & Sons, Ltd., was granted here this morning at the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court before Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter and Mr. Justice C. D. Richards. Application was made on the ground that the amount in controversy exceeded \$2,000, and that a public policy involving restraint of trade was involved. In order to secure leave to appeal to the Supreme Court, it must be shown that the amount in the controversy exceeds this amount or that some important question of law having general application throughout Canada is involved in the appeal. J. H. Drummie, Saint John, supported the application and C. F. Inches, K.C., Saint John, opposed the application.

An affidavit was filed this morning by J. H. Drummie showing the amount involved to exceed \$2,000. Argument contra was that no evidence was presented of an amount exceeding \$2,000.

Judgment was delivered in the Appeal Court February 8, dismissing an appeal.

The case was first heard by Chief Justice Baxter in June, 1937, on an originating summons to determine the proper construction of certain agreements made in 1925. They contained clauses restraining Bernard Connors from engaging in the sardine business in Canada for all time and preventing his using the names "Connors" in connection with the sardine business in any country, in any part of the world, for a period of ten years.

protection of occupants of hospitals, schools and similar institutions against fire hazard.

The proposed legislation would be in a large part an embodiment of the present fire prevention laws along with strict additions. The Dominion government is powerless to act in regard to this type of legislation, it was pointed out by the Fire Marshall and fire fighting authorities in each province of the Dominion are being urged to petition for the enactment of more stringent measures for the prevention of fire and danger to human life.

**St. Hyacinthe Blaze**

The recent tragic blaze which took some thirty lives at Sacred Heart College, St. Hyacinthe, Que., was used as a demonstration of the dangers which exist in public institutions not properly protected from fire.

The dangers which hover over the lives of children in schools, inmates of hospitals were stressed. Not only does the board seek to wipe out the dangers of fires in such buildings but it also wishes to see that loss of life is not apt to occur if fire does break out. It was pointed out however that New Brunswick is reasonably free from such disasters in comparison with the other provinces of the Dominion.

The Fire Marshall warned against the adoption of untested fire apparatus, stating that such legislation would probably cause a wave of high pressure selling of inferior apparatus.

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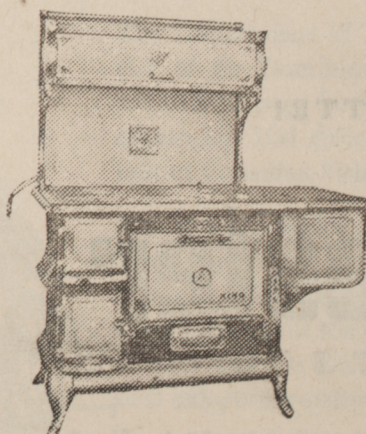
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**The Daily Mail Office****TOY TRAIN AMUSES C. N. CHIEF**
