> A thorough inspection of many uildings in the city will be carried vincial Fire Marshall, H. H. McLelan, Saint John, and Fire Chief Karl Walker, according to a statement by the fire mare all today.

The inspection will be a friendly proposition, the fire marshall said. and will be aimed at offering a ser vice to the parties effected rather than by imposing any hardship. Inspections. Valuable

Such inspections are of value for more than one reason, it was stated. In the first place the owners or occuquainted with whatever dangers may exist and will see the wisdom of remedying them. In the second place the fire department, through the Fire Chief, will have a better knowledge of the conditions, the layout of the buildings, and the other matters, which would be very valuable, in the event of a fire in these particular buildings.

Electrical wiring will be particularly considered in the inspection while heating apparatus and flues will also be looked over.

Schools, the hospital, hotels and rooming houses will be closely scrut inized, while apartments, business houses, and the Legislative Buildings will also be in the scope of the in-

Although the inspection had bee planned to begin in the next few days, Mr. McLellan has been called to other sections of the province and expects to leave the city tonight. The inspection itself may take som time, he stated today.
