will describe means of control, particularly emphasizing control by means of parasites.

The co-operation of the Dominion department is shown by the expected attendance of Dr. Arthur Gibson, Dominion entomologist, J. J. de Grysse chief of the division of forest insect pests, and A. B. Baird, superintendent of the Dominion parasite laboratory at Belleville, Ont.

An exhibit of insect pests will be on display in the Legislative library during the conference.

The second day, the conference will assemble in the Forestry and Geology building of the University of New Brunswick where plans for the distribution of parasites will be discussed.

that the Oriental and Doukhobor problems did not come within the scope of the Commission, but urged Dominion action in both matters.

Referring to the Doukhobor situation, Mr. Pattullo said the Provincial Government objected to the "en masse strip tease" acts performed periodically by the Doukhobors and asserted that Federal responsibility should take over the problem, in co-operation with British Columbia.

The printed recommendations, dealing specifically with twenty-six major problems, were placed before the Commission by the Premier. They started off by saying that power to amend the British North America Act should rest in the Parliament of Canada upon a basis to be agreed upon between the Provinces and the Dominion. Each Province should have the right to review its position at regular periods so that none should be placed in a disadvantageous position by changing conditions. Inequalities and disabilities existing by reason of the application of the tariff and freight rates should be adjusted.

Regarding income tax, the brief suggested that blanket authority should be granted all Provinces to raise their own revenues, and, if this were carried out, it would place beyond question all taxes as now levied and would authorize the imposition of other taxes, such as the business turnover tax, or the retail stores tax.

Other Recommendations

Closer co-operation between the Dominion and the Provinces in the matter of health and welfare services; the assumption by the Dominion of full responsibility for old age pensions and mothers' allowances and for unemployment relief, with the use of Provincial services for the last-named, were advocated. Public works to relieve unemployment should be started, it was emphasized. It was suggested the Dominion might develop a bureau of education, in working out close relations between Ottawa and the Provinces in matters of education.

Equal contribution by the Dominion and the Provinces to the cost of the Trans-Canada Highway, as well as primary feeders, was urged.

Inspection of fruits, vegetables, honey and bulbs for both domestic and export sale should be under Federal jurisdiction, it was declared. And to control effectively the marketing of commodities within the respective boundaries, the Provinces should be given complete control of the packing, storing and transporting within their boundaries of commodities intended for interprovincial trade, it was argued.

Authority of the Dominion with regard to bankruptcy laws should be restated and the Dominion Government should abolish the anomalous situation under the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act whereby a contract between the Crown in right of the Province and a farmer, entered into under Provincial legislation, could be altered by a body appointed by the Dominion Government, the recommendations declared.

It was suggested to the Commission that any conclusions reached respecting sources of Provincial revenue, must take into consideration provision for enabling the municipalities adequately to function within the measure of their jurisdiction.

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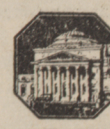
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
