the rural school, unchanged in the years the others have advanced.

The speaker condemned the raising of standards of entrance to the normal school. City schools drive and cram pupils to secure records on matriculation, to the extent that too many city girls are becoming teachers who ultimately end up in a rural school where they are entirely out of place. He also stated that the rural schools are being used too much as a proving ground. The teacher just begins to be fitted to a rural school after a few years experience, when she leaves for a city school and the rural district must begin all over again.

"We can't go on with such differences between rural and city. Any magnitude of difference in a democracy is a bad thing for both parties concerned. Are the towns a little high hat? If so it is bad for the city. Do we feel that we are not getting an even break? If so that is bad for us. We must heal the sore," he said.

Must Co-operate

"Co-operation" was the agent advocated to bring about the needed changes. The educational system would be centred in each county according to its individual needs. A school board under an efficient superintendent would have charge of affairs. Under the system each rural school would be improved; the board would set up regional high schools at strategic points, and the school would be applied to the needs of the farm.

Commercial studies and marketing would be included. The school would be a community hall, and through literature, music and drama, the cultural development would not be forgotten.

"The time is ripe for action," he declared. "We must reorganize—someone has to do it, we would miss a lot of fun if it is not us," he said.

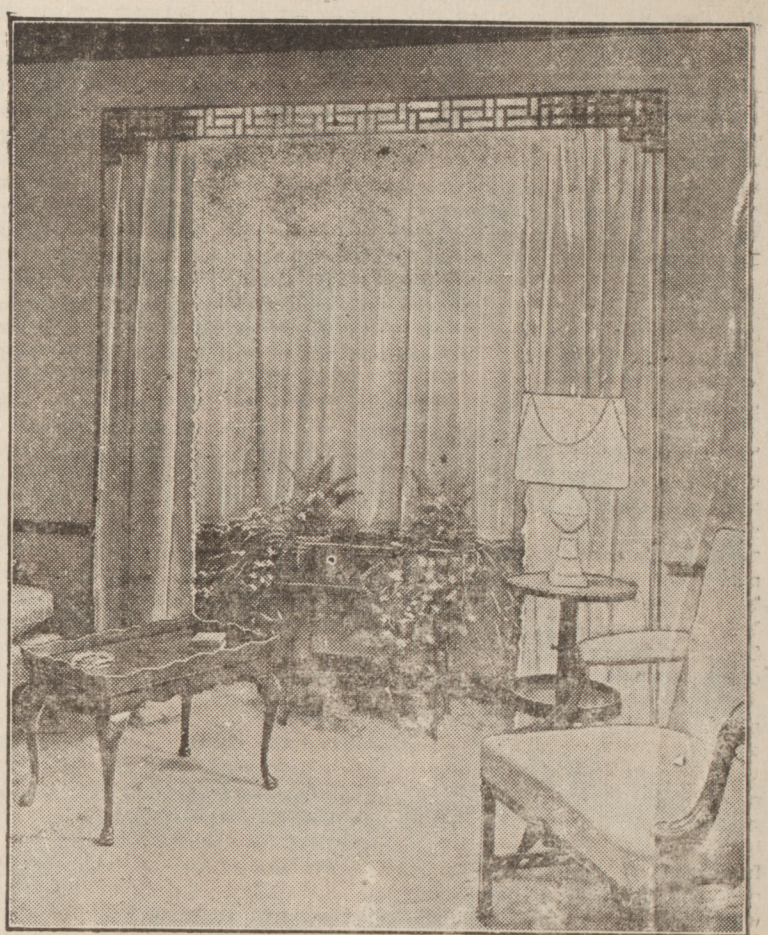

**Sunlight or Moonlight Now Come Into
Living Room At Flick of Switch**

A fresh note of modernism is injected into this Chippendale living room through the installation of a concealed lighting unit recessed behind the curtains. The effect produced is that of warm sunlight streaming through the window.

THERE seems to be simply no limit to the ingenuity of these lighting people nowadays. A press of a button, and they give you day, light, sunlight, or moonlight at any hour of the day or evening—right in your own living room. And it's almost laughably simple!

Lighting panels built into hidden places produce the effect. They are often used over the latest kitchen sinks, although in such cases, ordinary colorless bulbs are employed. Recently this type of lighting has become quite popular in living rooms, particularly where there is a bay window.

Easily Installed

The lighting unit itself consists of a metal box, approximately thirty inches long, six inches wide, and seven inches high. It contains three 40- or 60-watt bulbs, depending upon whether you have light or dark shades. The amount and color of light desired also determines the number of bulbs. Flashed opal glass is used at the bottom of the unit to diffuse and soften the light.

There are two ways of installing such a unit, which is a regulation fixture, obtainable at many electrical stores. When built into a new house, it is recessed into the ceiling, adjacent to the window. In a house that has been already built, two polished metal reflectors containing 60-watt lamps can be mounted between the over-drapes and the glass curtains. These reflectors are also standard equipment, easily installed by your electrical contractor.

Choice of Colors

Where there is no space between the draperies and curtains, a row of small 10-watt bulbs or several luminaire lamps may be mounted behind the valance or curtain cornice. The wiring can be so arranged that a choice of colored light is simply a matter of which switch is pressed.

In these modern times, there's no need to permit the original architectural limitations of a room to stand in the way of modernity. And you'll find that the modest investment yields ample dividends in the added enjoyment you derive from your home.

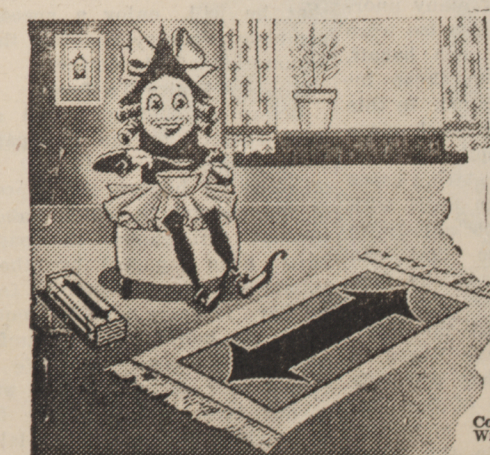
