### Early Training Benefited This Radio Entertainer

When radio was a pup, Carlton was called upon to announce, produce, write continuity and act. The training in continuity departments has given him a sense of balance for commercial copy so that sponsors now readily give him leeway to edit the 'plugs" he is to read on the air. His acting ability came to his aid in "Big Town" and the Paul Whiteman show, although he was signed for both as commercial announcer. On parts and on the Whiteman program he stooged whenever necessary.
