ITALY WILL WITHDRAW

It is reported that Italy agreed to withdrawal of volunteers from Spain as a part of an Anglo-Italian understanding. The press voiced regret that an olive branch could not be discerned in Hitler's words. The Times warned that British rearmament must not be relaxed.

PRAHA—Czechoslovakia politicians stressed that Hitler's promised defence of German minorities outside the Reich posed a question of international law of concern to many European states. The country, home of 3,000,000 Sudeten Germans remained calm.

TOKYO—Japan welcomed the Fuehrer's action regarding Manchoukuo, his reiteration of "tothing" for Soviet Russia, and his statement that a Japanese triumph in China now would rebuff Bolshevism.

ROME—The Italian press welcomed Eden's resignation and said conversation between Premier Chamberlain and Rome's Ambassador to London revealed no real obstacle to an Anglo-Italian understanding.

VIENNA—Still uncertain what might develop from last week's Austro-German "compromise", some circles voiced misgivings over Hitler's failure to pledge Austrian independence.

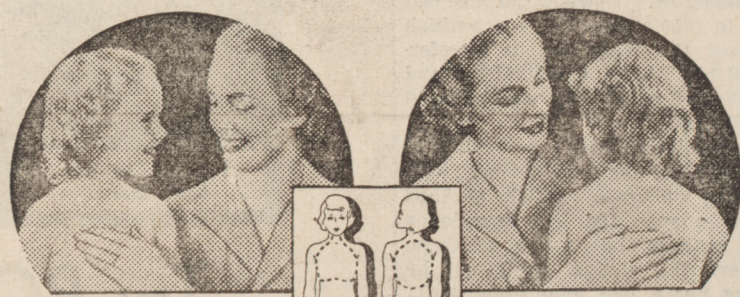
Resumption Passenger Train Service

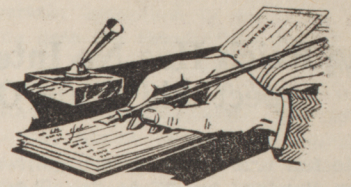
Mrs. Harley Brown, who has been spending some time with Mrs. Kenneth Morrison, has returned to her home in Bear Island.

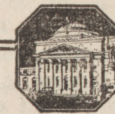
