co-operatively by representatives of Dominion and Provincial departments and reports made in duplicate. For some years inspection has been made annually.

Ernest W. Stairs, M.L.A., York, believed that rigid inspection should be made before farmers purchase their stock.

Other Resolutions

Among the other resolutions most important were, that the government investigate hydro rates from the farmers' viewpoint; one recommending a bounty on bears; a resolution for the eradication of warble flies; one asking a bounty on porcupines; that the Federal government be petitioned to make favorable trade treaties for the recovery of the Cuban market; that the rights of agriculture be prominently put before the Rowell Commission; that the provincial government use their influence to have the freight rates on grain for livestock feed reduced to the same basis as export rates; that a Co-operative Associations act be passed at the present session of the Legislature; that a provincial school trustees' association be formed; that the Youth Training Project be continued in 1938-39; that agricultural instruction be supplied to a larger number of rural boys in the future; that Institutes be formed in each Parish, and that a French speaking assistant be engaged in the Horticultural Division of the Department of Agriculture.

V. O. N. NURSES ASSIST IN 1,889 EXAMINATIONS

March Meeting Held Yesterday; Assisted In Medical Inspection Of Schools

According to the report of the Victorian Order of Nurses tabled at the March meeting held yesterday, the nurses assisted Dr. J. M. Cameron, Department of Health medical examiner for the schools in this district, in the examination of 1,898 school children in the Fredericton, Devon and Barker's Point schools.

Alderman Ivan McKnight, president of the V.O.N. Board was in the chair. Miss Pond, V.O.N., gave the report of the work done during February. 103 cases had been nursed, of these 9 were pneumonia, 8 new maternity, and 12 other mothers and babies. In all 398 nursing visits had been made, and 39 welfare, etc., visits. The Well Baby Conferences had been held as usual, 14 babies had been referred to our physician. In Devon the ladies of Gibson Memorial Church had served tea; and in Fredericton, Picardy Chapter, I.O.D.E.

In the medical inspection of schools, 324 defects had been found, 107 pupils had been referred to our physician, 20 to the Rotary Eye Clinic, and 9 excluded.

Notice was given of the Annual (general) Meeting in Ottawa on the 6th and 7th of April, and arrangements made to send to Ottawa an account of the work done in Fredericton and also some suggestions and inquiries by their request.

and Company (Maritime) Limited; to amend the rates and taxes act relating to Madawaska; to enable the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton to borrow money and to issue bonds; to authorize Moncton to construct an airport; to amend the incorporation act of Moncton; to authorize Moncton to issue debentures; to fund capital expenditure and provide for purchase of property and reconstruction purposes for the Provincial Hospital.

C. H. Blakeny for the committee on municipalities presented their first report in which a bill relating to James Pender Company Limited, was recommended without amendment, and bills authorizing the Town of Newcastle to issue debentures and guarantee bonds for the Anderson Manufacturing Company Limited, were recommended with certain amendments.

Leave of absence was asked on behalf of H. O. Downey, F. M. Colpitts, Hildulph Savoie and Dr. A. D. Dyas.

In addition to a number of Saint John petitions the following petitions for bills were submitted:

By E. W. Melville, to authorize a Hartland bond issue.

By H. A. Porter, K.C., to amend and consolidate the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society Consolidation Act.

By F. M. Tweedie, relating to the Southwest Boom Company.

By Hon. W. S. Anderson, to separate Newcastle and Chatham from their respective parishes for alms purposes.

By R. Fraser Keay, to amend the towns incorporation act relating to St. Stephen.

P. Philibert LeBlanc, to authorize temporary loans for Restigouche; for compulsory school attendance in Campbellton; to incorporate the Upsalquitch Water and Power Company Limited.

Hon. C. T. Richard tabled the annual report of Motor Carrier Board.

Hon. J. B. McNair introduced a bill respecting landlord and tenant. He said this bill is the work of the Commission on Uniformity of Legislation. It is a model act and will be adopted by all the provinces of Canada. He would later suggest that the bill be referred to the committee on law practice and procedure. The bill was given first reading.

Mr. McNair also introduced a bill to amend the summary convictions act. He said the amendments were minor. The bill was given first reading.

Premier Dymally moved, seconded by Hon. C. T. Richard, that the time for introduction of private bills be extended to Friday next without additional fee. He asked private members to have legislation prepared and presented by that time so there would be no need of further extension.

postponed, and therefore necessitates increasing expenditures for the additional patients who will be cared for this present year. Our Municipalities can no longer share a greater portion of these costs. This has also contributed to an increase in the expenditures of the Department of Health.

Now we come to the Department of Education. Here also an increase is shown. Additional Inspectors had to be appointed in order to secure more efficient supervision of our schools, some Inspectors having a territory comprising schools, a situation which had to be remedied, if proper and efficient inspection was to be carried out. Improved texts, new courses, Adult Education and educational services contributed largely to the increased expenditure in this Department. However, it is worthy of notice that during the last 20 years, namely 1916-1936, the proportion of New Brunswick ordinary expenditure devoted to Education dropped from 18.5 per cent to 8.9 per cent.

The Old Age Pension Board comes in for an increase of some \$67,000. This is made up of increased costs of ordinary pensions and the addition of pensions for the blind. It can thus clearly be shown that these increased expenditures are beyond our control as more pensioners are receiving the benefit of pension than in the previous year.

I have shown in what Departments increases have occurred and where decreases have been effected. In the total expenditure it is to be noted that a large portion, that is to say the sum of \$545,500 is caused by an increase in Debt Service charges.

Necessary Expenditures

Can anyone in any Department or any Branch of any Department show where substantial saving could have been effected without abandoning entirely an essential service or impair another to such an extent that its effectiveness would have been totally destroyed. The citizens of this Province are entitled to all the Governmental services which citizens of other Provinces are receiving from their respective Governments. If we wish to keep abreast with other Provinces in the march of progress, which this whole Dominion is making then our citizens must be as equally equipped as our co-citizens. A chain is as strong as its weakest link. Do the citizens of this Province want these benefits? Do the mothers and fathers want to see an improved system of Education, better health measures and supervision to prevent the spread of communicable and unavoidable diseases? Does the public desire that this Government safeguard its citizens by stamping out Tuberculosis and do the aged want assistance through the old Age Pension Scheme or the blind to be treated as fairly as they are in other Provinces? Do the farmers desire a steady progress impulse given to agriculture? Do our citizens desire to protect our natural wealth, better ways of communication by means of more permanent roads, improved markets and growing industries so that we shall not revert to hewers of wood and carriers of water for others? Do you want all these benefits which are enjoyed by our co-citizens living in other Provinces? I am of the firm conviction that they do want these benefits and of the firmer conviction that they are entitled to them. If that is so, our sacred responsibility as their representatives is to assure them, the full enjoyment of all these benefits regardless of the opposition we shall receive from some quarters for we shall have opponents to our efforts. We shall have those who possessing more wealth and therefore better able to pay the costs of these services, will clamour that there are fanciful ideas, that our forefathers lived without all these services, that we are stifling business, that we are heading to disaster. All the old arguments of those who are too selfish to contribute their just share towards the costs of these necessary

measures, will be brought into play. I hope the day will never come when the people of this Province will ever turn to that trend of thought for it will be a sad day for the Province.

Taxation

Having realized our responsibility, it is our unpleasant duty to find the means of fulfilling that responsibility. I say it is the unpleasant duty for the imposition of new taxation does not contribute to the popularity of an administration notwithstanding the demands made upon it for the fulfillment of all these obligations.

A scrutiny of the estimated expenditure for the current fiscal year will disclose the fact that the main increases are to cover fixed charges—interest and sinking fund—on our Public Debt and additions to the Old Age Pension list; the remainder covers further aid to social services such as Education, Health and Agriculture—all worthy purposes.

Appropriations for Public Works and Crown Lands represent the main decreases.

In order to provide for the net estimated increase in ordinary expenditure, amounting to \$644,209.65, we have decided first to look to the users of our highways to provide the additional amount required to pay the interest, and sinking fund on the cost of building such vastly improved roads available to them today, and to this end we propose to bring down legislation increasing the Gasoline Tax and will increase Motor Vehicle Fees as regards Commercial users, trucks, buses, etc. No change has been made in the fees for private cars for the current season.

We also propose to increase taxation under the Corporations Tax Act to a point more in line with the other Provinces of Canada so as to avoid resort to income or sales taxes such as are in operation in most of them. To show how lightly in comparison with the other Provinces, we have taxed Corporations, Companies, etc. let us read up totals collected from this source by each province during the last fiscal year:

New Brunswick, sundry collections from Corporations, \$525,000.

It is quite apparent that the Corporations doing business in this Province are not bearing the burden of taxation they should.

By invading these new fields of taxation, we estimate an aggregate revenue of \$8,500,604.00 and a total expenditure of \$8,483,602, and an estimated surplus for the current year of \$17,002.00.

We have brought this Province out of a state of despair into one of hope and confidence. We have improved along all Governmental Services, and brought joy to the aged and the blind, the unfortunate who only a few years ago were without means of livelihood, were subject of public charity and who today have regained their self-confidence. The future holds still greater promise.

Firm therefore, in the belief that this administration has faithfully discharged the trust reposed in them, I have the honour to move, Sir, that you do now leave the Chair and that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Supply to be granted to His Majesty.
