promise, but has been miraculously
restored by his resignation. Indeed,
he seems stronger today than ever
before, and one need only keep one's
ears open and look at British news-
papers of all complexions to realize
this.

Split Dates Back to November
Sunday's split has brought into the
open a conflict within the Cabinet
which first became acute last No-
vember when Lord Halifax visited
Berlin. Resignations were then avoid-
ed because Chamberlain sided with
Eden, and the Ministers who pressed
for an Anglo-German settlement were
not prepared to resign. The issue in
both cases was precisely the same,
although based on different facts.

In terms of personalities this con-
flict is between the Cabinet Old
Guard, Sir John Simon, Sir Samuel
Hoare, Lord Halifax, Mr. Kingsley
Wood, Lord Swinton, and Premier
Chamberlain; and Eden and a group
of younger men, Leslie Hore-Belisha,
Oliver Stanley, Walter Elliott, Wil-
liam S. Morrison and Malcolm Macdonald. The rest of the Ministers
either represent viewpoints different
to both of these two groups or are in
the middle haze, with their opinions
unresolved.

Issue Clearly Drawn
The issue between these two
groups is baldly, collective security v.
isolation. Eden's group believes that
the only path to British security lies
in world organization for peace, sup-
ported by peace-loving nations who
are prepared to face war-minded dic-
tatorships and, if need be, defend in-
ternational order by force of arms.
His group is for the League of Nations.
The Chamberlain group has no
confidence in the League or in any
conceivable international organiza-
tion to cope with present problems.
They believe that Britain must go it
alone, playing power politics, not
from choice, but of necessity in a
world governed by force.

Would Make Duce Move First
Eden's position with regard to Mus-
solini was that no settlement was
possible unless Mussolini withdrew
from Spain and ceased stirring up
trouble for Britain in the Near East,
and gave convincing proof that he
would cease imperialistic adventures,
such as Abyssinia and Spain. Recon-
ciliation of Abyssinia, he contended, was
a matter for the League, and not for
London.

Chamberlain's position was, and is,
that Spain can be left to the Non-
Intervention Committee, and need
form no part in settlement negotia-
tions. Britain is ready to recognize
the Italian conquest of Abyssinia and
look favorably upon Italian efforts to
raise credits in London to bolster up
the crumbling underpinning of the
Fascist State.

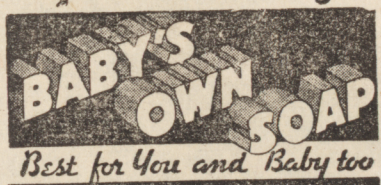

Notes Re Hugh Miller

Mr. Hugh Miller who has just re-
tired from the position of Secretary
of the British and Foreign Bible So-
ciety in Korea, has been connected
with that society for over thirty-
eight years, and has held the position
of Secretary for thirty-two years.
Mr. Miller is of Scottish ancestry and
after a business career partly spent
in Halifax, N. S., he felt the call of
definitely religious work, and found
in the Bible Society a sphere of activ-
ity in which he has given splendid
service. The tributes from every part
of Korea to his work have been truly
remarkable.

Mr. Miller knows the situation in
the Far East as few do in the pres-
ent, and he is recognized by all who
know him as one of the great mis-
sionary leaders of our time.

When laying down his work in
Korea Mr. Miller made the following
striking statement: "When I joined
the Bible Society there were few
homes that possessed the Scriptures.
Now there are few that have not had
the opportunity to get at least a
Gospel."

Vast strides have been made in the
printing and publishing of the Scrip-
tures in Korean during Mr. Miller's
occupancy of the position of Bible
Society Secretary, and this brief re-
cord of work accomplished by him
should surely induce all who possibly
can to attend services and meetings
to be addressed by him, and on the
testimony of all who know him there
is pleasure and profit in store for
those who find themselves able to
embrace such opportunities.

property, said that he had no state-
ment to make on the matter. He
would not make a denial to the re-
port.

Whether or not the property is
being purchased by Super Service
Stations, Ltd., could not be learned
for certain. W. E. Vaughan, repre-
sentative of the company in this city,
stated that this is not so to his know-
ledge. His company was refused a
permit to erect a station on the old
Saunders property, a short while ago,
after a long drawn out siege of the
council.

According to the present informa-
tion, plans are already underway for
the demolishing of the old building,
and that a Nova Scotia company will
begin this in the near future in pre-
paration for the erection of the new
building at the earliest possible date.

Although no application for a build-
ing permit has been received by the
City Engineer and Building Inspect-
or, J. D. MacKay, this area is in the
section which allows the erection of
such buildings under Town Planning
and Zoning.

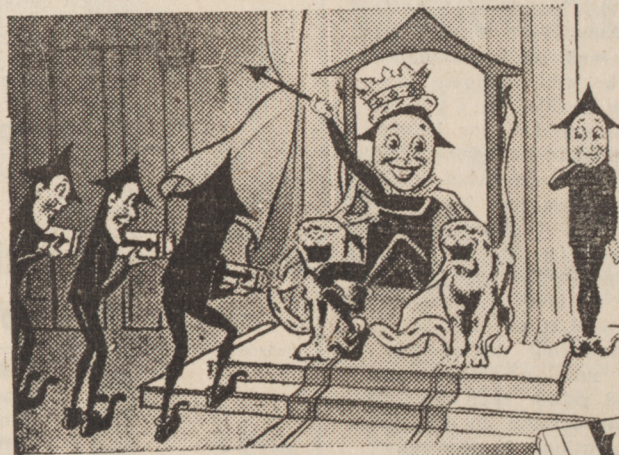

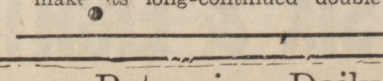

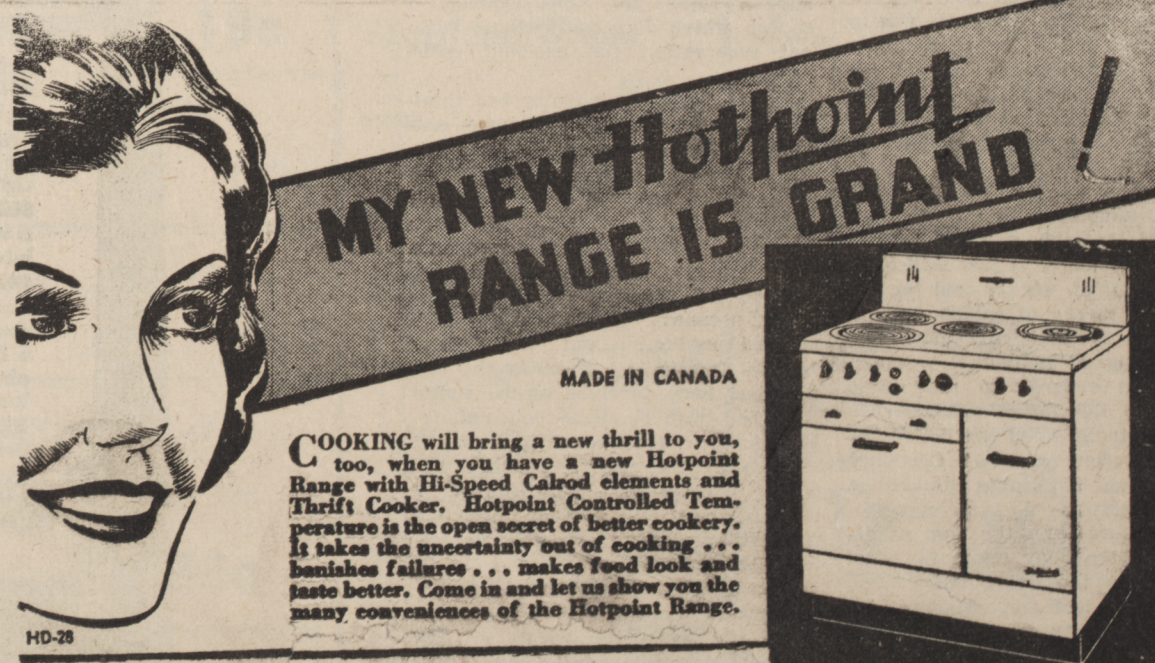
