Circular Letter by Fredericton Branch L. Of N. Society

The Fredericton Branch of the League of Nations Society in Canada has issued a circular letter throughout the city and points outside asking for co-operation in opposing Japanese aggression in China. The citizens are asked to answer YES or NO to the following questions:

1. Do you feel that Canadians should refrain from buying Japanese goods.
2. Are you in favor of a boycott of Japanese goods in Fredericton.
3. Do you feel that before taking public action in Fredericton that we should wait for the Dominion Government to act.
4. Do you favor the imposition by the Dominion Government of an embargo on the export from Canada of war materials to Japan.

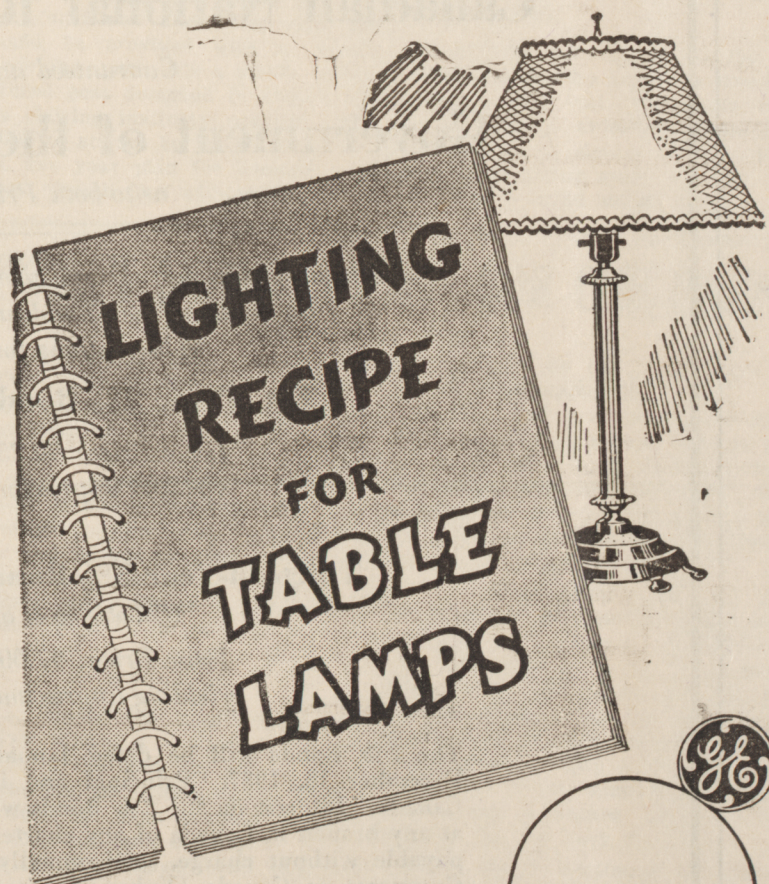
