MISS PHYLLIS MENZIES and MR. ALLISTER CAMERON WINNERS OF ORATORICAL CONTEST

The fourth oratorical contest sponsored by the Victor Hatheway Chapter I.O.D.E., in conjunction with the Rotary Club of this city, was held in the auditorium of the Fredericton High School on Friday evening, March 11th, at eight o'clock, the contest being open to High School students only.

The Fredericton High School orchestra was in attendance under the capable leadership of C. B. Burden, and played several selections during the course of the evening, which were enthusiastically received. Their first number, which opened the program, was "Invitation to the Dance," by C. M. Von Weber. This was followed by short address by Mrs. A. McF. Limerick, Regent of Victor Hatheway Chapter, welcoming Miss Margaret McLaren and the guests of the evening and explaining the aims and objects of the contest. The subject chosen for the young ladies was "What we can do to make Canada the fairest country in the world." Guy D. Scovil, Supt. of Schools, then welcomed the visitors on behalf of the Rotary Club, and announced the subject for the young men as "The Progress of Aviation."

The judges for the evening were: Mrs. C. W. Argue, Mrs. F. J. Toole, Miss Marjorie Hicks for the Victor Hatheway Chapter, and Whitman A. Haines, D. W. Wallace and W. K. Tibert for the Rotary Club. As each of the contestants completed his or her speech, the audience realized that the decision of the judges would not be an easy one. The contestants showed not only originality in presentation of subject matter but an entire ease of manner that would have done justice to much older speakers. The contestants were called by number and after the first three speeches had been listened to with interest, the orchestra played its second number, "Minuet," by J. Hayden.

Three more contestants were called on, after which the orchestra played its third and last selection, "Little Sandman" by Johannes Brahms.

When the last of the eight contestants had completed his allotted eight minutes and the judges had retired to make their decisions, Dr. Fletcher Peacock, director of Education, congratulated the Victor Hatheway Chapter, I.O.D.E. and the Rotary Club on sponsoring this important and most interesting competition, and also congratulated the young ladies and gentlemen taking part on the excellence of their efforts. Dr. G. C. VanWart, on behalf of the Board of School Trustees, assured the sponsors that the Board would at any time be in favor of encouraging the youth of Fredericton in contests of this nature and would stand fully behind any efforts made in this direction. O. B. V. Miller, Principal of the Fredericton High School, in a few well chosen remarks expressed the hope that this contest would become an annual affair. He remarked that the increased size of the audience showed quite clearly that interest was growing in this phase of education. Dr. Arthur VanWart, President of the Rotary Club then thanked all those who made this contest possible.

Miss Phyllis Menzies, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allan R. found the efforts of a year's unceasing energy and the effect of his "thunderings" wasted on the desert air one can almost hear him repeat that famous exclamation, released no doubt in a moment of disappointment and despair, "Woe is me." But "Tis music to the Liberal ear to hear the Tories squeal." His great disappointment explains the inconsistencies in the speech he delivered on the Address. On that occasion, he criticized the Government for spending too much money in the construction of hard-surfaced roads whilst in the next breath he criticized them for not spending money on a National Park. He was determined to criticize for and against, blow hot one minute and blow cold the next, "You pay your money and you take your choice." Finally, however, the Honorable Gentleman was reluctantly compelled to admit the Budget had been balanced. But in order to bring this about he implied there had been juggling of figures and additional taxation and alleged if certain items of expenditure charged to Capital had been charged to Current account there would have been a deficit of some \$600,000.00. I wonder if the Honorable Gentleman arrived at that conclusion by the application of that theory of scholastic deduction of which he made reference in his Address. If he did, is it not passing strange, that he apparently knew nothing of scholastic deduction in 1935 when the Government of which he was an ardent and loyal supporter took \$529,000.00 which lay at the credit of the Province at Ottawa, ear marked Sinking Fund and applied the amount to Current Revenue to bolster up their receipts and make a real deficit of over \$1,400,000.00 appear as \$876,000.00. In the matter of juggling figures or manipulating accounts those Gentlemen were past masters of the art and if it becomes the Honorable Gentleman to cast reflections about matters of that kind against the present Government. It was indeed in great measure because of their manipulations, their nefarious schemes, and their waste and extravagance in the handling of public money that they were driven from power. But my Honorable Friend stated also that the Budget had been balanced through resort to additional taxation and mentioned the increased sale of liquor as one of the sources from which this additional taxation had been derived. That the increased sale of liquor afforded additional revenue is correct but why criticize the Government in the matter? Was it not the Conservative Party of which my Friend is now the distinguished Leader, that placed the Liquor Law on the Statute Books and may I ask under what circumstances, in case the Honorable Gentleman's memory has become dimmed, I shall try and refresh it, incidentally for the information also of those who are not perhaps familiar with the time and circumstances. In the general election of 1925 the liquor question was an issue of considerable importance. The old law under which liquor was sold and dispensed by vendors and druggists required certificates issued by the medical profession. The law had been found difficult of enforcement and was considered unsatisfactory especially by the temperance people. The Gentleman, who at that time was leader of the Conservative party, was out to defeat the Veniot Government and the order was issued that no stone be left unturned to bring about that result. The temperance people were a strong body and in order to secure their support a solemn pledge was given that if placed in power the new Government would enforce the "Law to the hilt"; but if it was found impossible of satisfactory enforcement the Government would thereupon submit the question of change of revision to the people by referendum and abide by the result. The proposal was approved and accepted by the temperance people, who threw their votes and support in favor of the Conservative Party and thus placed that party in power. In less than two years the Liquor Law was superseded by the present Act, which was enacted without consulting the people. No referendum had been provided as promised in lieu thereof, the Conservative Party flagrantly violated their solemn pledge to the temperance people. The Honorable Leader of the Opposition was in the House at that time and approved of the pledge, was a party to it and a party to its violation. I have never heard nor read of his opposition to the present Liquor Law so long as the Conservative Party was in power or protest against the revenue received from the sale of liquor. Another subject to which the Honorable Gentleman made reference was the matter of Potato Markets. He damned the Government with faint praise for their efforts in securing the South American Market for the Seed Potato Producers of the Province and he criticized the Department of Agriculture because of the price prevailing for table stock. When the record of his party is recalled it would certainly appear that the Honorable Gentleman was a little indiscreet in treating with the subject of potatoes.

In 1932, when the farmers of his own County were unable to market their potatoes at prices sufficient to cover hauling and loading expenses at railway shipping points, and in many cases hundreds and thousands of barrels of the finest quality of stock, that quality which has made the County of Carleton famous throughout this country, were given away for absolutely nothing, to any person for the hauling, I well recall being in this House as a spectator when a resolution was submitted by the Opposition Party, the object of which was to solicit the co-operation of the Federal Government in efforts to find markets for New Brunswick potatoes. What happened? The resolution was promptly voted down. The Party now led by my Honorable Friend apparently were afraid of embarrassing the Federal Government; they were more concerned with the interest of their friends at Ottawa than solicitors of the interests of New Brunswick farmers; but some time later a change came over the spirit of their dream and they decided upon action and this, I may add is an example of what Conservatism was when in action. In their determination and search for distant markets they went as far east as Egypt where they found an opening, and to which, after making elaborate arrangements and was considered unsatisfactory.
