

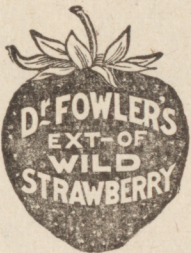

**WANT WOODCOCK
SEASON TO OPEN
EARLIER IN 1938****More Satisfactory
Shooting Would Result, They Feel**

In view of the fact that woodcock have practically all disappeared by the middle of November, while the season on those birds does not close until Nov. 30 in New Brunswick, the N. B. Guides Association meeting here in annual convention yesterday, passed a resolution urging that the season open and close two weeks earlier.

In other years the season was from Sept. 15 to Nov. 15, but last year was changed from Oct. 1 to Nov. 30. Shooting in 1937 being somewhat unsatisfactory for this reason, Raymond Currie of this city sponsored the resolution. It will be forwarded to Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, whom, it is hoped, will approve of it and forward it to Ottawa with the recommendation that the change be enacted. Federal action is necessary because woodcock are migratory birds, thus coming under the Dominion Migratory Birds' Act.

Guides Leave for Show

Over a dozen guides sailed by steamer from Saint John this morning, bound for Boston where they will assist in the preparation of New Brunswick's exhibit at the annual Sportsmen's Show, held at that city Feb. 5 to 12. Several more will en-train here tomorrow night for the Massachusetts metropolis. It is expected that in all about 50 registered guides of this province will be present to answer the questions of sight-seers and describe the natural advantages of New Brunswick for fishing and hunting.

All the material for the erection of the exhibit has already been shipped. It was learned from D. W. Griffiths, director of the N. B. Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel. Specimens, both live and mounted, will not leave for Boston until Thursday night he said, being partly loaded here and partly at Saint John. Loaded in a baggage car, they will go through with the regular nightly passenger train, the quick trip being necessary because of the live animals and fish. Were the trip to take more than ten or twelve hours, stated Mr. Griffiths it would be necessary to refill the tanks with water.

After the Boston show, a smaller number of guides will go with N. B.'s exhibit to New York, where it will be again set up for the show opening there Feb. 18 and closing Feb. 26.

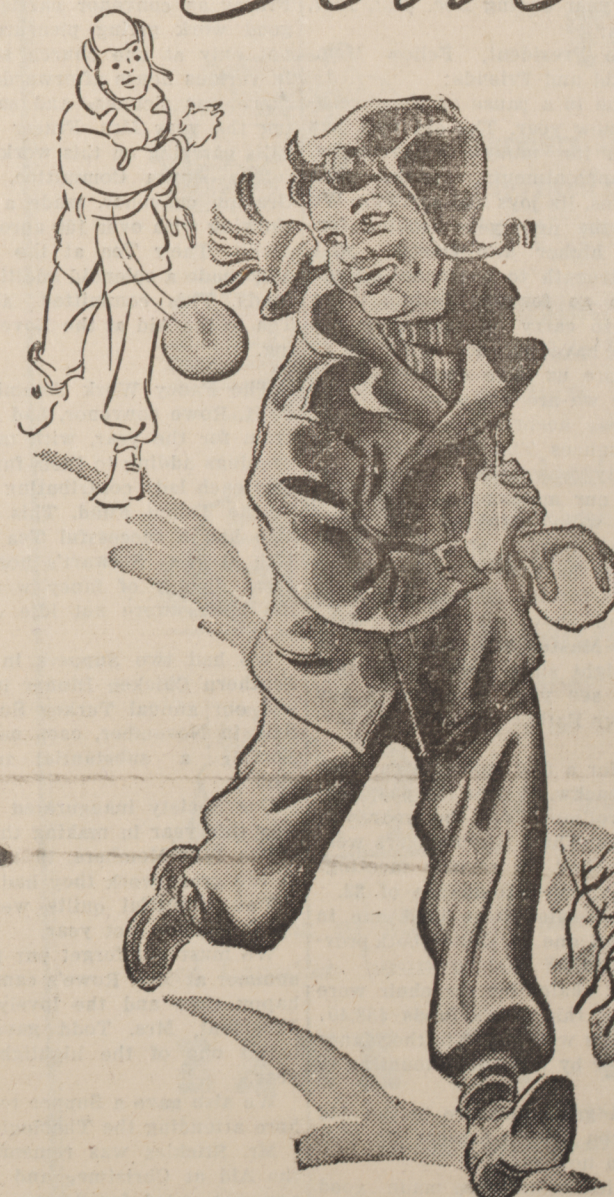

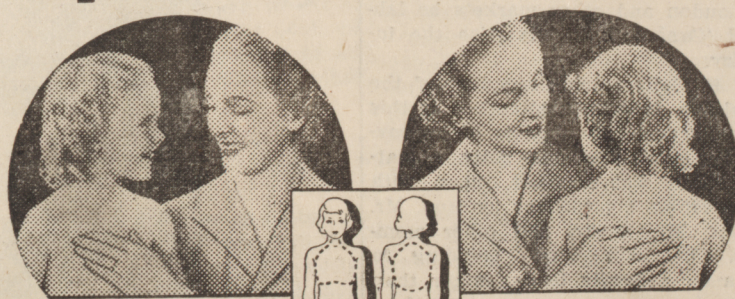
