

MAROONS TAKE CAPITALS AT MONCTON 3-1

JAMESMEN DEFEATED LOCAL SEXTET IN THEIR FINAL APPEARANCE AT MONCTON ON PHILLIPS' SET OF TWIN MARKERS

Gill Led Team to Hub Minus Two Defencemen, Goodine and Kilburn; Lifford Accounts for the Lone Capital Tally; Gill Plays 58 Minutes

MONCTON, Feb. 2—Charlie Phillips, big Moncton Maroon rear-guard, scored a pair of goals while his back division mate, Clarence Bastarache, rapped home a third tally, as the loop-leading Jamesmen knocked over Bill Gill's Fredericton Capitals in a Southern New Brunswick fixture, 3 to 1, here tonight.

All four markers were scored by defencemen, the two teams' collection of forwards failing to break into the actual scoring column, although Babe LeBlanc and Ken Carroll figured for assists on two Maroon tallies, while Bill Lifford, moved back from the right lane to a defence position with Gill, scored the orphan Capital counter in the first session.

Good, bad and indifferent hockey featured the game. Play was fast at times, then the teams slipped into low gear and skated up and down the surface as though they were out for a practice but at times the fans were on their feet as first little George Harris in the Moncton cage and then curly-headed Cliff Young in the Capital citadel would pull off smart stops.

Maroons were without the services of 'Dud' White, big defenceman, and Len LeBlanc, clever utility performer, while the visitors were short handed with Johnny Kilburn and Ralph Goodine, regular defence mates of Bill Gill, out of the lineup due to illness.

Bill Gill played 60-minute hockey tonight, apart from a two-minute enforced rest in the early minutes of the first session, and gave one of his best displays of the year on Moncton ice. He did yeoman duty back of the blue line and was the spearhead of many a dangerous raid.

In the first period Gill was penalized for checking Charlie Phillips to the boards and while he was with the timers the husky Toronto boy scooped up a pass from Ken Carroll and patted the wafer past Young for the first tally of the evening. It was a hard high shot from well out and came after a Moncton gang attack.

While Gill was still off, Eddie Powers took a rest for tripping McLennahan, and when Gill returned Fredericton pressed but failed to count. Thompson was the next to get the gate, after Powers returned, but no damage resulted.

At the 12:33 spot, Bill Lifford carried the heel from end to end, coasted in close and tricked Harris on a slow roller, and although his marker might have been a gift he was robbed of a goal in the final period, when after a fine rush, his drive hit the top bar of the cage and bounded to the corner. Just before the 18 minute mark, Jackie Keenan used his stick on Phillips' head and he was ushered to the boards, but again the Caps managed to hold off the raiding Maroons and the period ended one-all.

There seemed to be a steady procession to the sinners' box in the middle period, and no less than seven men 'sat it out.' Lifford and Phillips took a pair of penalties apiece while Powers, Bastarache and Keenan also watched the game from the box for two minutes during the period and while Keenan was off Bastarache scored the second Moncton tally as the result of a power play.

He took the wafer near the blue line on a pass out from Captain Babe LeBlanc and drilled the disc into the hemp from the left side.

In the last canto the play speeded up some, and Keenan was penalized for tripping Babe LeBlanc and while he was off, Maroons went into gang formation but they failed to 'click' and as McLennahan sat out for two minutes, they again failed to drive the wafer into the hemp behind Cliff Young. With Bun in the box, Bill Lifford picked an open spot, shot down the ice at breakneck speed, coasted right in on Harris and drilled a high shot which hit the top bar and bounded to the side.

At the 9:34 mark Charlie Phillips scored the last goal of the night when he heaved a long shot from just inside the blue line at the Capital cage. Doran Doucet blocked Young's view and the wafer hit the back mesh before the goalie had an opportunity to get set for a play.

Fredericton then went on raid after raid and once they were caught up the ice by Chapman, Powers and Ingram, but Young came out of his cage to make a brilliant stop from Chapman, who passed the heel right on his pads.

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SARASOTA, Fla., Feb. 3—At least 22 major and minor league baseball teams will come to Florida for their spring training, and will spend approximately \$300,000 to condition their athletes for the 1938 season, it is estimated here.

Each club figures to spend around \$15,000 for travelling expenses, hotels, meals and other items incidental to the men, into winning clubs for the long grind that starts in April and ends in the autumn.

Most teams will be back at their old training camps, but a few will move to new spots, lured by bigger guarantees, larger crowds or better training conditions.

Some of these teams have become fixtures in their respective training sites. The New York Yankees, for instance, have based at St. Petersburg for many years.

Red Sox at Sarasota
Six years ago the Boston Red Sox moved into Sarasota, and the Yawkeymen have been there ever since. Connie Mack and his Philadelphia Athletics trained at Port Myers for 12 seasons before going to Mexico City in 1937. This spring they will be at Lake Charles, La.

The St. Louis Cardinals spent several seasons at Bradenton before going to Daytona Beach last year. This spring they will train in St. Petersburg with the Yankees.

The Boston Bees, who formerly based at St. Petersburg, moved across Tampa Bay to Bradenton for 1938, and will be just 12 miles from their cousins, the Red Sox.

Cincinnati Back Again
Cincinnati's Reds quit Tampa for Puerto Rico two years ago, but have come back to Florida, and have chosen Tampa again.

The spring training season opens in late February or early March and continues until April, when teams "break camps" for the trip home, playing exhibition games en route north for the season's opening in mid April.

HIGH SCORING MAPLE LEAF LINE OF APPS, JACKSON AND DRILLON IS BEING BROKEN TO STRENGTHEN UP DEFENSIVE

Jackson Goes to Second Line, Replaced by Davidson; Canadiens and Leafs Clash Tonight With New Lines in Action For the First Time

TORONTO, Feb. 2—One of hockey's most feared forward lines — featuring Syl Apps at centre and Gordon Drillon and Harvey Jackson on the wings—has been broken. The dynamiters won't blast together for a while at least. Manager Conny Smythe announced today he had decided to replace Jackson with Bob Davidson as the left winger with Apps and Drillon. Jackson will work with Bill Thoms and Buzz Boll on Toronto Maple Leafs' No. 2 line.

The move to bring some defensive strength to one of the highest-scoring lines in the National League was decided on early today while Leafs sped home from a 6-1 beating taken from Montreal Canadiens. A recent 9-1 drubbing from Boston Bruins also was taken into consideration.

The dynamiters, as Toronto dubbed them, had worked together since November of the 1936-37 campaign when Drillon took over the injured Charlie Conacher's place. Since then they had become the Leafs' No. 1 attacking unit.

MONTREAL, Feb. 2 — Toronto Maple Leafs with their revamped forward lines, will have their first place standing in the National Hockey League's Canadian Division at stake tonight when they meet Montreal Canadiens in Toronto in the feature of a three-game bill.

With Bob Davidson lining up alongside Gordie Drillon and Syl Apps in place of Harvey Jackson, Manager Conny Smythe hopes to stop the high flying Frenchmen who stepped to within two points of the Leafs last night by trouncing them here 6-1. Another Canadian victory will place them in a tie with the Leafs.

New York Americans also will revamp their lines for tonight's game with Detroit Red Wings in New York. Two-thirds of the "big S" line that once led Montreal Maroons' attack will be together as Amerks fight to hold their third place spot in the Canadian section.

First reports were that Manager Red Dutton was going to switch his two veteran centres, Hooley Smith and Nels Stewart, but now the Amerks' boss says the pair who once teamed with Babe Siebert, will play on the same line.
