shirt with the swastika, emblem of the party, on his sleeve, and officers wear stars, cords and chevrons according to their rank. There is also a band.

In Provincial Police

Commander-in-Chief of the Legion is Joseph Maurice Scott, who, despite his name is a French Canadian born of a Scottish father and French-Canadian mother. A former physical culture instructor at the Royal Military College in Kingston, he has spent a large part of his lifetime in physical training and gymnastic work and at 49 looks the part. Going to France with the First Canadian Contingent, he was sent home by Sir Sam Hughes in 1915 as a recruiting officer among the French-Canadians, with the rank of Major. He was the cause of many hundreds of his compatriots signing up and travelled across Canada many times on recruiting trips. Until last year when the Duplessis Government came into power, he had been for sixteen years an officer of the Quebec Liquor Commission police, and since that time has divided his time between an insurance business and the Legion. He is not proud of the fact that he bears a strong resemblance to Mussolini.

Regular Army Men

Under "the Major," as he is known to his associates, are first and second Assistant Commanders, An Adjutant General completes the "headquarters staff". The organization has set eight divisions as its goal. In a division there are four brigades, in a brigade four legions, in a legion four com-

panies, in a company four sections and in a section eight men, a corporal and a lance-corporal. Others officers are sergeants, captains, etc. Several officers are former N.C.O.'s of the regular army.

Women May Join

Professional men and unemployed, French and English-speaking, are in the ranks. Besides the Montreal groups, of which there are several, there are corps at Valleyfield, St. Hyacinthe, Three Rivers and in several other cities and towns. Women may and do join the party and wear uniforms but can't be legionnaires, qualifications for membership in the party, and thence the Legion, are that one must be a Christian, white and a British subject. Germans and Italians are not encouraged to join, but are admitted if they are British subjects. The leaders disavow any connection whatever with the Italian Fascists or German Nazis, they are not even sympathetic. They are closer to Sir Oswald Mosley's band, but have absolutely no outside affiliations. They claim intense loyalty to Britain, the flag and Canada, and their main idea is to get rid of every Jew in Canada. They are careful to point out, however, that, under their program, this will be done not by force of arms, but by force of public opinion. This public opinion will be crystallized by 1940, they claim.

"Only chance I ever get to sit is when I come to town," said Herb. "I'm waitin' for the bus, that's all."

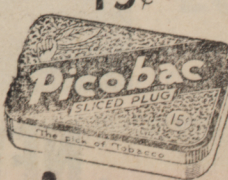
