Their Broadcasts Range from Barn Dance to Opera

Ria Ginster makes her American radio debut on the Magic Key of RCA program Sunday, February 6.

Ria Ginster, distinguished European soprano, will make her American radio debut when she appears as soloist with the celebrated Philadelphia Orchestra, conducted by Eugene Ormandy, during the Magic Key of RCA program on Sunday, February 6. The Magic Key will turn to the Academy of Music in Philadelphia for the concert over the NBC-Blue Network from 2.00 to 3.00 p.m., EST.

Miss Ginster, who recently returned to America to begin her third concert tour, won the unanimous acclaim of American music critics during her two previous seasons.

Lotte Lehmann sings the lead role in "Der Rosenkavalier" to be aired by NBC on February 5.

With Lotte Lehmann singing the lead role, Richard Strauss' charming Viennese opera, "Der Rosenkavalier," will be broadcast in full from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House on Saturday, February 5, beginning at 1.55 p.m., EST., over the NBC-Blue Network.

Singers to be heard in supporting roles include Kerstin Thorborg, Emanuel List and Suzanne Fisher.

The opera, first produced in Dresden on January 26, 1911, combines the dramatic elements of intrigue, manners, farce and satire, together with the romance long associated with the gay social world of Vienna.

"Golden Journeys"

Jean Haig, soprano, again will be featured on the CBC program, Golden Journeys, to be broadcast from Toronto on Friday, February 4, from 6.30 to 7.00 p.m., EST., over the national network. Miss Haig will sing Schubert's "To Music," Dunhill's "The Cloths of Heaven," and "The Banjo Player," by Alice Barnett.

Roland Todd and Eileen Waddington, well known organ-piano duo, will open this half hour of light concert music with "Minuet A L'Antico," by Seeböck. Other selections to be presented by the duo will be: Rimsky-Korsakov's "Song of India," Henselt's "Were I a Bird," Polindini's "The Dancing Doll," and "La Cinquante," by Gabriel Marie.

John Carter becomes solo star of the Chase and Sanborn Hour on Sunday, February 6



One of radio's prize singing assignments of the season, a regular spot on NBC's Chase and Sanborn Hour, has gone to 25-year-old John Carter, who makes his first appearance as soloist during the broadcast over the NBC-Red Network on Sunday February 6, at 8.00 p.m., EST. Carter was introduced to the radio audience the previous Sunday, when he sang a duet with Nelson Eddy, who is leaving the program for a concert tour. Eddy will return to the show in August.

Only once before, on the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air, has Carter broadcast to a network audience. The Chase and Sanborn Hour is his first regular program. A native of New York, Carter, for the past several years, has been singing at clubs, parties and churches. For a short time he was a dancer in vaudeville.

Oddly enough, although he was only in vaudeville about two months—and that seven years ago—two weeks of the time were spent on the same bill with a ventriloquist named Edgar Bergen. At Loew's State in New York Carter shared a dressing room with Bergen and made the acquaintance of one Charlie McCarthy. That was five years before Charlie acquired a top hat, white tie and tail coat.

Charles Butterworth of the Hollywood Mardi Gras programs, and Martha Ray of the Al Jolson series, are currently working together in the forthcoming picture, College Swing. Other radio personalities in the picture will be Burns and Allen, Bob Hope and Skippy Etnus.

"Kathleen Stokes, Organist"

Another program of old favourites will be presented by Kathleen Stokes, organist, over the CBC national network on Friday, February 4, at 7.35 p.m., EST. The songs to be heard are as follows: Meet Me Tonight in Dreamland, Goodbye; Sweetheart of Sigma Chi, and the beautiful Song of Songs. This broadcast will originate in the CBC Toronto studios.

Radio News In Brief

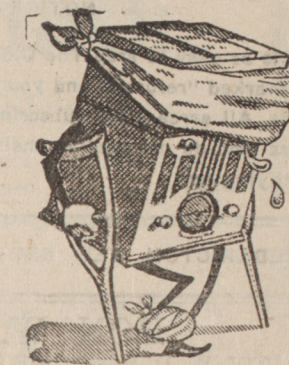
The first serious power failure in six years kept WEAF, key station of the NBC-Red network, off the air for 56 minutes Tuesday afternoon. Only one commercial program was affected however, and this was switched to WJZ, key station of the Blue network. Out of town affiliated stations were not affected. The program that was switched for that afternoon was the popular Pepper Young's Family, daily script show.

Al Jolson has written a new song, "You . . . And I Do Mean You," which Jimmy Fidler, the movie commentator, is considering using as a theme song.

Sealed in the cornerstone of the new half million dollar film laboratory now under construction by Warner Brothers is the real story of the birth of motion pictures, including a sound track of six words spoken by Al Jolson in "The Jazz Singer" and a recorded speech made by Will Hayes ten years ago. Jolson, as you know, is now one of radio's top fighters.

Andy Devine, gravel-voiced comedian heard on the Jack Benny programs, will have a featured role in Bing Crosby's next picture, "Dr. Rhythm."

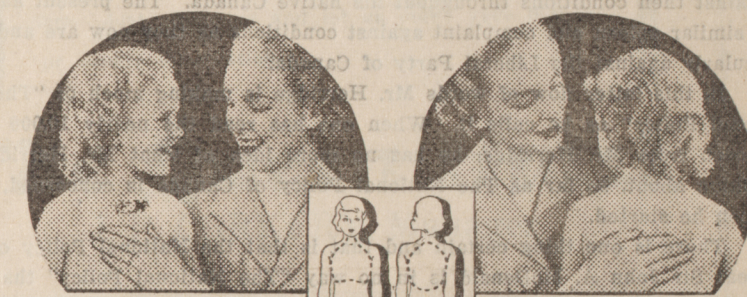
