FORMER RESIDENT
HONORED BY KING
NEW YEAR'S LIST

Dr. J. D. Tothill, Here 13 Years; Later Served In Fiji Islands; Now In Uganda



Many friends in this city will be pleased to learn that in the New Year's honors recently conferred by His Majesty the King that the name of Dr. J. D. Tothill appears as having been awarded the C.M.G. Dr. Tothill who joined the Entomological branch here in 1911 resided on Waterloo Row and has a large number of friends in this city. In 1924 Dr. Tothill was loaned to the Colonial office for entomological work in the Fiji Islands. He left with his family to take up his residence in that far off country. He later resigned from the Canadian service and was appointed Director of Agriculture for the Fiji. After a few years in the Southern Pacific he was promoted to the post of Director of Agriculture for Uganda, with headquarters at Entebbe. Dr. Tothill was on leave in England during the past summer and left early in December to return to his post. Before returning to Uganda, however, he will visit India and South Africa, looking into agricultural methods, institutions and education.

Dr. Tothill began his work in science at the Ontario Agricultural College, graduating with the degree of B.S.A. in 1909. He was employed at the Melrose, Mass. Parasite Laboratory until 1911 when he came to New Brunswick to take charge of the Brown-tail Moth investigation work. In the following year a small laboratory was established in a wooden building between the present site of the Beaverbrook residence and the Engineering building at U.N.B. In 1914 this developed into the Dominion Entomological Laboratory. Associated with him in those early days were L. S. MacLaine, now in charge of the plant inspection in Ottawa, A. B. Baird of Chipman, now in charge of the Dominion Parasite Laboratory of Ontario and carrying on the work which Mr. Tothill began, L. J. Simpson and R. P. Gorham of this city and the late Geo. P. Walker.

While in Fredericton Dr. Tothill carried on extra studies which won for him the degree of M.Sc. from Harvard and Ph.D. from Cornell, his thesis for the doctorate being on the parasites of the Fall cut-worms in New Brunswick which was published by the Dominion Government and in a large measure formed the basis for the present parasite control work in Canada.

Dr. Tothill won her Ph.D. degree from Cornell for her work on leaf mining insects. Her book on the subject of 361 pages published in 1928 being still a standard text on the subject. As a result of Dr. Tothill's work in New Brunswick the Brown-tail Moth which had spread over almost the whole of the province was eliminated and only three nests have been found

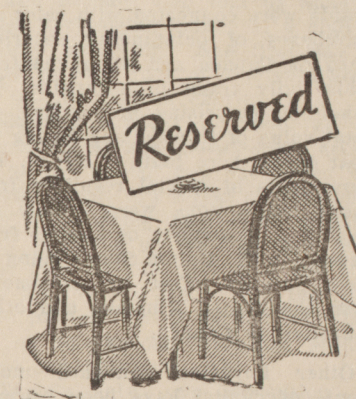

since 1918, whereas some years before as many as 26,000 had been found in one winter.

The success of his work in New Brunswick led to the British Colonial office borrowing his services when the coconut industry of the Fiji Islands was threatened with destruction by an insect. Through the introduction of parasites from Indo-China he was able to bring this insect under control within a few years in what was described by the British Journal of Science as one of the outstanding pieces of economic work done in the Empire. He was appointed Director of Agriculture for Fiji and later when other important problems developed in Africa he was sent to Uganda.

Dr. Tothill will be remembered in Fredericton by his work in association with L. S. MacLaine in founding the Fredericton Science Club, which recently held its 126 regular meeting. He was the first president of that organization and A. G. Turney the first secretary. There are a number of members who attended the first meeting some 22 years ago at the home of D. L. W. Bailey when the latter gave the first evening address on "The Story the Rocks Tell", outlining the Geological history of New Brunswick.

Dr. Tothill took an active interest in Boy Scout work and was one of the first, if not the first, scout commander in this district.
