

"Best Movie of 1937" Made In the Canadian Rockies



TO Hamilton H. Jones, amateur movie producer of Toronto, Ont., goes the honor of having made the best non-theatrical motion picture of the year. His film "Western Holiday" has won the Hiram Percy Maxim Trophy which is awarded annually to the producer of the best amateur motion picture of the year by the Amateur Cinema League, a non-commercial, international organization with members in more than sixty countries. The trophy, established by Mrs. John G. Lee and Hiram Hamilton Maxim, both of Hartford, Conn., surviving children of Hiram Percy Maxim, the famous inventor, is open to world-wide competition so that the winner may claim rightfully the world's amateur championship in the realm of motion pictures. "Western Holiday," the 1937 prize picture, consists of two reels in natural color depicting

scenes and activities in Victoria and Vancouver, British Columbia, Mount Robson Park, B.C., and Jasper National Park, Alberta, and the picture won against competition from the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France and Mexico, as well as other films from Canada. The layout shows Mr. Jones with the camera he uses and the Athabasca Glacier, a scene along the Columbia Ice Fields motor highway in Jasper National Park, which forms a part of the prize-winning film.
