The Polling Places will be as follows:
Division No. 1—At or near the City Hall.
Division No. 2—At or near the Court House.

Polls will be opened at 9 o'clock in the forenoon and closed at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

The ballot will be in the following form:
"ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME?"

Each voter desiring to vote in favor of adopting daylight saving time shall strike out or mark through with a pencil of black lead or a pen with black or blue-black ink the word "No" on the ballot and each voter desiring to vote against adopting daylight saving time shall strike out or mark through with a pencil or black lead or a pen with black or blue-black ink the word "Yes" on the said ballot.

Not more than one voter shall at any one time enter the polling place and such voter upon entering shall declare his or her name, surname and addition and if the name of such voter is found on the list of voters he or she shall receive from the presiding officer an unguessed envelope on the back of which the presiding officer shall write with a pencil of black lead or with a pen and ink his initials in the presence of the voter.

The voter on receiving the envelope shall forthwith proceed within the screened compartment and shall there, having marked his or her ballot or having previously done so, place his or her ballot within the envelope handed to him or her by the presiding officer and shall without any delay hand the envelope containing his or her ballot unsealed to the presiding officer who shall ascertain by examining his initials that it is the same with which he had furnished the voter and if so satisfied shall immediately place the envelope in the ballot box and the voter shall immediately leave the polling place. No ballot shall be received by the presiding officer until the voter has proceeded to the screened compartment within the polling place and while there placed his or her ballot in the envelope furnished him or her by the presiding officer.

POLLING PLACES:
Division No. 1—At or near the City Hall.
Division No. 2—At or near the Court House.

Polls will be opened at 9 o'clock in the forenoon and closed at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

HOW TO VOTE

Each voter shall be entitled to vote for one candidate for Mayor; for one candidate for Alderman for St. Ann's Ward; for one candidate for Alderman for Carleton Ward; for one candidate for Alderman for Queen's Ward; for one candidate for Alderman for King's Ward.

The voter shall use the official ballot paper and shall strike out or mark through with a pencil of black lead, or a pen with black or blue-black ink, the names of all except the name or names of the candidates for whom he or she wishes to vote, and a ballot so marked, if otherwise good, shall be counted.

Not more than one elector shall at any one time enter the polling place, and such elector, upon entering, shall declare his or her name, surname and addition, and if the name of such elector is found on the list of voters, he or she shall receive from the Presiding Officer an unguessed envelope, on the back of which the Presiding Officer shall write with a pencil of black lead or with a pen and ink, his initials, in the presence of the voter.

The elector on receiving the envelope, shall forthwith proceed within the screened compartment and shall there, having marked his or her ballot, or having previously done so, place his or her ballot within the envelope handed to him or her by the Presiding Officer, and shall without any delay, hand the envelope containing his or her ballot unsealed to the Presiding Officer, who shall ascertain by examining his initials that it is the same with which he had furnished the voter, and if so satisfied shall immediately place the envelope in the ballot box and the voter shall immediately leave the polling place. No ballot shall be received by the Presiding Officer until the voter has proceeded to the screened compartment within the polling place and while there placed his or her ballot in the envelope furnished him or her by the Presiding Officer.

The Poll Clerk shall, under the direction of the Presiding Officer, then enter the name of the voter on the check list.

claims in some other way, warned Coun. Morrison.

Coun. Malone moved an amendment to the motion that the matter be laid on the table for a year. Coun. Hamilton was the seconder.

"Are we going to raise dogs or are we going to raise sheep?" queried Coun. Stannix.

On being put to vote the amendment carried 18 to 8.

The report of the Administration of Justice Committee showed \$10,634.52 expended during the past year. Of this the county paid \$6,429.31 and the City \$4,204.21.

Considerable heated discussion centred about the bill of \$100 charged by the Secretary Treasurer, Major John S. Scott, for revising the voters' list last fall. The matter was laid over until this afternoon, along with approval of the committee's report.

Proposed to the City Council as a means of raising the necessary money, the share to the county for interest would be about \$5,000 per year he said. He estimated the total yearly interest at approximately \$10,000.

Mr. Reid predicted that the amount both city and county would be obliged to pay when the plan got underway would be much smaller than members of those bodies might believe.

**"FLYING PRESIDENT" STARTS
ON 30,000 MILE AIR TRIP**

NORMAN HOLLAND, leading Montreal business man, is here shown prior to leaving St. Hubert airport, Montreal, today, on a 30,000 mile aerial trip to 14 countries, which is believed to be the longest aerial jaunt ever undertaken by a Canadian business man. He will be away 11 weeks and in that time will fly by way of New York, Miami, Nassau (Bahamas), Kingston (Jamaica), San Juan (Porto Rico), Port of Spain (Trinidad), Bridgetown (Barbados), Georgetown (British Guiana), Belim (Brazil), Recife (Brazil), Rio de Janeiro (Brazil), Buenos Aires (Argentina), Santiago (Chile), Arica (Chile), Guayaquil (Ecuador), Cristobal (Panama Zone), Guatemala City (Guatemala), Mexico City (Mexico), Los Angeles and San Francisco before flying across the United States to New York and thence to Montreal. Mr. Holland is shown holding his ticket in his left hand which is the longest piece of aerial transportation ever issued. While on the trip he will personally take about 5,000 feet of coloured movies.
