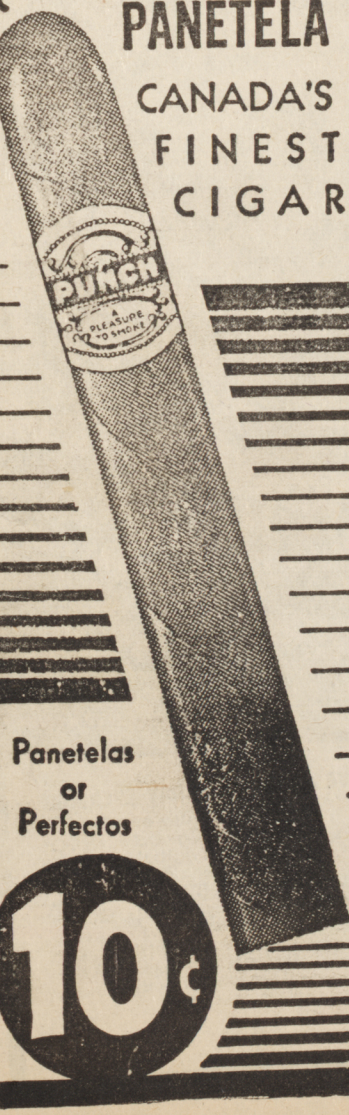

Virginia Gafda, Premier Benito Mussolini's journalistic mouthpiece, who declared: "Its intention is declaredly hostile." He added that it was always the British who slandered Italy and never the Italians who libeled Great Britain.

### Dictators Long in Field

The broadcasting of Roosevelt's message to Congress and the inauguration of the British broadcasting of news in foreign languages marked the advent of democracies into the radio propaganda race. For the dictatorship countries — Germany, Italy and Soviet Russia — have long ago appreciated the possibilities of the wireless set as a means of propaganda. Democracies in self-defense have been forced to retaliate. For as "The London Times" expressed it:

"The comforting old belief that since truth must ultimately prevail, no defensive measures need be taken, has yielded to a recognition of the difficulty experienced by truth in overtaking fiction, especially: when fiction is backed by ample technical resources and an aggressive creed."

Germany broadcasts every day to Germans living in South America and Africa and uses the radio as a means of propagating Chancellor Adolf Hitler's doctrine of race consciousness.

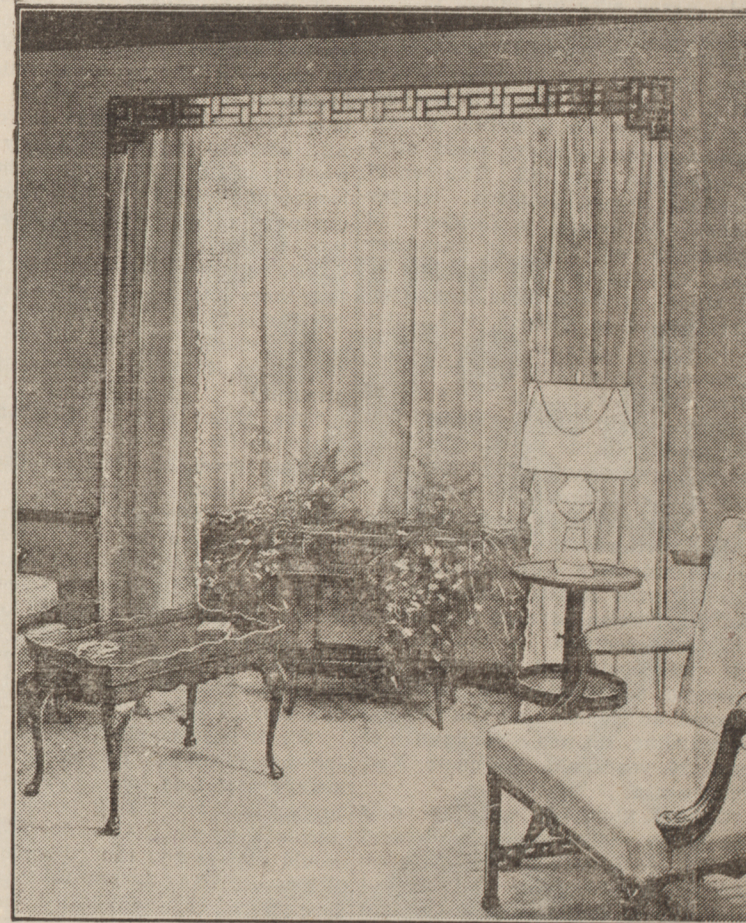

## Sunlight or Moonlight Now Come Into Living Room At Flick of Switch

A fresh note of modernism is injected into this Chinese Chippendale living room through the installation of a concealed lighting unit recessed behind the curtains. The effect produced is that of warm sunlight streaming through the window.

THERE seems to be simply no limit to the ingenuity of these lighting people nowadays. A press of a button, and they give you daylight, sunlight, or moonlight at any hour of the day or evening—right in your own living room. And it's almost laughably simple!

Lighting panels built into hidden places produce the effect. They are often used over the latest kitchen sinks, although in such cases, ordinary colorless bulbs are employed. Recently this type of lighting has become quite popular in living rooms, particularly where there is a bay window.

### Easily Installed

The lighting unit itself consists of a metal box, approximately thirty inches long, six inches wide, and seven inches high. It contains three 40- or 60-watt bulbs, depending upon whether you have light or dark shades. The amount and color of light desired also determines the number of bulbs. Flashed opal glass is used at the bottom of the unit to diffuse and soften the light.

There are two ways of installing

such a unit, which is a regulation fixture, obtainable at many electrical stores. When built into a new house, it is recessed into the ceiling, adjacent to the window. In a house that has been already built, two polished metal reflectors containing 60-watt lamps can be mounted between the over-drapes and the glass curtains. These reflectors are also standard equipment, easily installed by your electrical contractor.

### Choice of Colors

Where there is no space between the draperies and curtains, a row of small 10-watt bulbs or several luminaire lamps may be mounted behind the valance or curtain cornice. The wiring can be so arranged that a choice of colored light is simply a matter of which switch is pressed.

In these modern times, there's no need to permit the original architectural limitations of a room to stand in the way of modernity. And you'll find that the modest investment yields ample dividends in the added enjoyment you derive from your home.
