BOY SCOUT NEWS

Report of District Scout Commissioner. Meeting of March 23rd, 1938.

I must express my pleasure to meet this Association again and may my remarks not be taken amiss if I say that it is very likely that more frequent meetings would advance our mutual interest, keep it more in the public eye and furnish more material for a report of this nature.

To some of this body it might seem that my work is being neglected in that more energetic and intimate attention is not given to this city. In a mere explanation, not apology, may I say that my work is for the district and that, while provided with the privilege of co-operating with our virile Provincial Field Worker, I feel it would be doing much less than my duty to the district to fall to take advantage of this privilege to the full. To the limit of my strength I have done the best I could by both city and district.

I take a chance of often repeating myself in reiterating my very marked feeling of gratitude to the 3rd Fredericton (St. Anne's) Rover Scout crew for able assistance in maintaining the city Scout and Wolf Cub standard.

The old 6th Fredericton Troop has been revived at Morrison under Rev. Karl Fairweather. It meets weekly at St. Margaret's Chapel-of-Ease, Morrison, averaging 16 boys.

Upper Lincoln School has a troop of 10, under S. M. Robert Howard, well trained and making a good start in providing themselves with uniforms.

3rd Fredericton (St. Anne's) has about 15.

4th Fredericton (St. Dunstan's) has 17, 14 completely uniformed.

Here seems the appropriate place to remark on the part that a neat uniform plays in increasing the lad's pride in his appearance, pride in his troop and interest in attending regularly. Many may condemn it as a sort of vanity but it seems to me that the boy that turns up regularly at meetings with his red and green neckerchief promises better for the future than the chap with a sweater, no collar or a nondescript one, probably not caring a hoot whether he comes or goes.

Springhill Wolf Cub Pack was organized in January, held its first meeting on the 18th of January; chicken-pox interrupted the regularity of the meetings but 18 attended Tuesday's meeting. This Pack meets at Springhill Hall, the boys from the Garden Creek and Springhill schools making up the number.

The Nashwaak-Durham Community Troop has a 30x15 ft. frame lodge on top of the high bank immediately overlooking the west end of Durham Bridge. This was used in March for the week-end sessions of the District Scout Leaders' Training Course. The Troop number about 12 and their regular meeting was Saturday night, so each session of the course included a demonstration meeting with the Troop, co-operation in games, contests and singing making these week-end sessions the most successful of any course in our series.

I have not had an opportunity of visiting Stanley Troop but I have the fullest confidence that all is well with it.

Nashwaaksis Troop, under S/M Neil Mills, is very healthy with 20 boys.

Douglas Community Troop under A/D/C Hawkins, has up to 18 and a Wolf Cub Pack is immediately to be formed.

Introducing the new Assistant District Commissioner involves reorganizing a slight realignment of the District into sub-districts, the better organized areas being put under A/D/Cs with a possibility of later development into fully organized districts. The Nashwaak sub-district, under A/D/C John Yates and the Keswick sub-district, under A/D/C Hawkins, will shortly be increased by the Miramichi sub-district. The fact that Fredericton District includes seven counties, in whole or in part, may add a little light to this matter.

Fredericton Junction Troop is at present in the air for lack of a hall to meet in. Tracy, next door, has a very promising group of 16, under S/M Harold Peterson. Burt's Corner Troop of 12, under S/M Rev. J. A. Carr, is most promising and a Troop or Pack is soon to be started at Bird-ton.

And now another spring is here To charm the sight and please the ear, As with a lavish hand she brings A brand-new host of lovely things! —Catherine Reger Gordon.

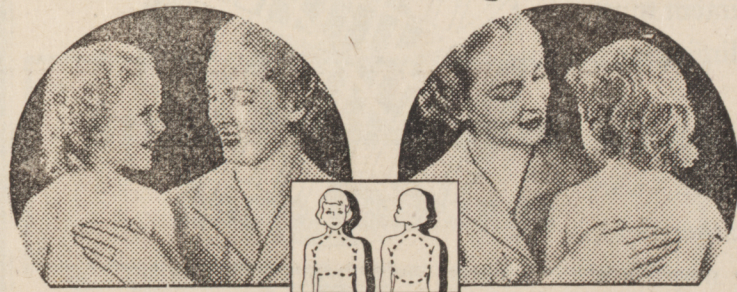
