VICTORIAN ORDER OF NURSES MADE MANY VISITS

Interesting Nurses' Report Presented By Miss Georgia Pond, R.N., V.O.N.

The Victorian Order of Nurses report for the year ending Dec. 31 showed that a total of 827 cases were nursed during the year. They were divided as follows:

296 Medical—24 of these pneumonia and 6 T.B.
80 Surgical—47 of these operations in homes or doctors' offices.
110 expectant mothers.
121 mothers and babies of maternity cases.
186 other mothers with their babies

Maternity Cases
2,567 of the visits made during the year were to mothers and babies of maternity cases. 336 to expectant mothers, 2,231 to mothers with their babies. 99 night calls in connection with this service. 554 hours spent there, and we are pleased to report no maternal deaths, either in homes, or V.O.N. prenatal in hospital for confinement.

48 of these paid no fee for confinement.

24 paid part of the regular fee of \$3. 49 paid full fee of \$3.

Other Visits
289 visits to pneumonia cases—one death.

48 visits to tuberculosis cases awaiting admission to the sanatorium.

344 visits to cancer patients.

54 visits to incurables.

1,610 other nursing cases.

96 operation cases.

121 other night calls not maternity cases.

394 visits to children in their own homes.

This increase is indirectly due to the infantile paralysis epidemic, as the closing of the Well Baby Conferences increased the number of visits to babies and children in their own homes.

This makes a total of 5,604 visits to all. 2,164 of these visits were free. 1,671 paid for by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, and the remainder paying either a full fee of 75c, or as much of that as they were able to afford.

Clinics
No Well Baby Conferences were held during September or October, so we are obliged to report a lowered average attendance.

77 Conferences held, one every Wednesday in Fredericton, with a total attendance of 2765. 183 referred to own physician for advice. Cod Liver Oil was supplied as usual by the Rotary Club and we still feel that it has done much towards keeping the death rate down as to preventable deaths.

Transportation to and from Morrison's Mills to the Conference is paid for as usual by the Ministering Circle of the King's Daughters.

Schools
The schools in the city, Morrison's Mills, Doak and Lincoln were visited as usual, and the Medical School Inspector was assisted with his examinations. Visits were also made between his visits. 3608 pupils were examined. 213 hours spent in the schools. 87 defects found. 116 corrected. 130 referred to own physician. 45 excluded. All exclusions suspected of infectious disease referred to Health officials. Due to the lack of a Dental Clinic in the city, the number of uncorrected defects continues to be large.

Glasses are supplied both in Fredericton and Devon to children whose parents cannot afford them. These cases are first investigated by the V. O. N. The financing for this is done by the Rotary Club.

Two Pre-school and Vaccination Clinics held by the Medical School Inspector were assisted by the Nurses, as were also the Toxoid Clinic at Morrison's Mills, Doak and Lincoln, where pre-school and school children were given complete immunity from diphtheria. Miss Green kept the records in both Clinics. Assistance was given in the Normal School Tuberculosis Clinic; and, for the first time with the Clinic held in the University of New Brunswick. These Clinics are conducted by the Provincial Health Department every year. All students are X-rayed and examined by the specialists. Many are examined and X-rayed during the following years, if the Doctors think it necessary.

We had two very welcome aids to our work this year—Blankets were donated by the Rotary Club for needy families; and a Hope Chest was donated by the Fredericton Women's Institute. This chest is filled with articles necessary for a mother and baby. A list of the articles is kept in the chest and is refilled as used by the nurses. This in addition to their generosity in supplying the babies with milk seems quite an undertaking. And last but by no means least we wish to thank the V. O. Board for their continued support and sympathy. Without that as an assurance, our work would be almost impossible to carry through.

Sunlight or Moonlight Now Come Into Living Room At Flick of Switch

A fresh note of modernism is injected into this Chinese Chippendale living room through the installation of a concealed lighting unit recessed behind the curtains. The effect produced is that of warm sunlight streaming through the window.

THERE seems to be simply no limit to the ingenuity of these lighting people nowadays. A press of a button, and they give you daylight, sunlight, or moonlight at any hour of the day or evening—right in your own living room. And it's almost laughably simple!

Lighting panels built into hidden places produce the effect. They are often used over the latest kitchen sinks, although in such cases, ordinary colorless bulbs are employed. Recently this type of lighting has become quite popular in living rooms, particularly where there is a bay window.

Easily Installed
The lighting unit itself consists of a metal box, approximately thirty inches long, six inches wide, and seven inches high. It contains three 40- or 60-watt bulbs, depending upon whether you have light or dark shades. The amount and color of light desired also determines the number of bulbs. Flashed opal glass is used at the bottom of the unit to diffuse and soften the light.

There are two ways of installing it.

such a unit, which is a regulation fixture, obtainable at many electrical stores. When built into a new house, it is recessed into the ceiling, adjacent to the window. In a house that has been already built, two polished metal reflectors containing 60-watt lamps can be mounted between the over-drapes and the glass curtains. These reflectors are also standard equipment, easily installed by your electrical contractor.

Choice of Colors
Where there is no space between the draperies and curtains, a row of small 10-watt bulbs or several luminaire lamps may be mounted behind the valance or curtain cornice. The wiring can be so arranged that a choice of colored light is simply a matter of which switch is pressed.

In these modern times, there's no need to permit the original architectural limitations of a room to stand in the way of modernity. And you'll find that the modest investment yields ample dividends in the added enjoyment you derive from your home.


