Conditions For War Do Not Exist Amongst European Nations Says Former New Brunswicker

There will be no war in Europe this year or the next for that matter according to a former New Brunswicker, Lord Beaverbrook, owner of the London Daily Express, and if we keep the peace for two years we will probably escape war for a long time to come, says Lord Beaverbrook.

Only a few years ago we looked on Russia as an enemy who menaced our Empire. We feared Russian attack on the frontiers of India. And when the Russians came near to Afghanistan there was a crisis in Britain. Now we do not look on the Russians with any fear. We do not think that Stalin holds a threat over India. And tomorrow we may have forgotten the alarm which has been felt lately about other countries in Europe.

Conditions for war do not exist among European nations. The French will not fight. They are a nation of pacifists. The Germans cannot fight. Their army would in present conditions be crushed by the French alone. Italy is a second rate power. She must play a subordinate part either to Germany or Britain.

Russia has an air force bigger than Germany's and manned by better pilots. But the Russians dare not make war on Germany. If they did so internal dissensions in the country would break out in an immediate struggle for power in Moscow.

As for Britain we have no intention of fighting at all and besides we give a hostage to our enemies in London which can be bombed at the will of foreign powers. But of course the destruction of London from the air would not cripple Britain's offensive power by sea. That power is strong enough to strangle any European nation that might challenge our Empire. Our strength in relation to possible enemies in Europe far outstrips what we possessed in 1914.

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Communism

THE Daily Mail is frequently in receipt of communications tending to boost Communism. These communications come from the headquarters of the Communist party in Canada and are frequently received from the Secretary of Tim Buck, Communist leader at Toronto. Needless to say these communications are consigned to the waste basket.

It is time that the people of Canada awoke in regard to Communism. Too long have they been asleep at the switch.

The Communism of today, more emphatically than similar movements in the past, conceals in itself a false messianic idea. A pseudo-ideal of justice, of equality and fraternity in labor, impregnates all its doctrines and activity with a deceptive mysticism, which communicates a zealous and contagious enthusiasm to the multitudes entrapped by delusive promises. This is especially true in an age like ours, when unusual misery has resulted from a unique distribution of the goods of this world. This pseudo-ideal is even boastfully advanced as if it were responsible for a certain economic progress. As a matter of fact, when such progress is at all real, its true causes are quite different, as, for instance, the intensification of industrialism in countries which were formerly almost without it, the exploitation of immense natural resources, and the use of the most brutal methods to insure the achievement of gigantic projects with a minimum of expense.

Communism, moreover, strips man of his liberty, robs human personality of all its dignity, and removes all the moral restraints that check the eruptions of blind impulse. There is no recognition of any right of the individual in his relations to the collectivity; no natural right is accorded to human personality, which is a mere cog-wheel in the Communist system. In man's relations with other individuals, besides, Communists hold the principle of absolute equality, rejecting all divinely-constituted authority, including the authority of parents. What men call authority and subordination is derived from the community as its first and only right.

Another powerful factor in the diffusion of Communism is the silence of the part of a large section of the press of the world. It is impossible to explain how a press usually so eager to exploit even the little daily incidents of life has been able to remain silent for so long about the horrors perpetrated in Russia, in Mexico, and even in a great part of Spain; and that it should have relatively so little to say concerning a world organization as vast as Russian Communism. This silence is due in part to short-sighted political policy, and is favored by various occult forces which for a long time have been working for the overthrow of the Christian social order.

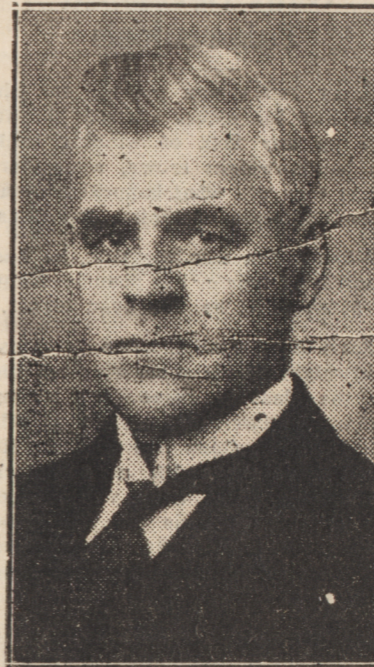
Meanwhile, the story effects of this propaganda are before our eyes. Where Communism has been able to assert its power—and here we are thinking with special affection of the people of Russia and Mexico—it has striven by every possible means, as its champions openly boast, to destroy Christian civilization and the Christian religion by banishing every remembrance of them from the hearts of men, especially of the young. Bishops and priests were exiled, condemned to forced labor, shot and done to death in inhuman fashion; laymen suspected of defending their religion were vexed, persecuted, dragged off to trial and thrown into prison.

To propose a specific course of action to people who are not convinced of the necessity of any action at all, would be a waste of time and effort, and it should be clear that the mere negative opposition to Communism is not a successful method to prevent its spread. The denouncing of Communism is having next to no effect. COMMUNISM IS SPREADING AND ITS INFLUENCE IS GROWING DAY BY DAY, AND WE MUST DO SOMETHING AND DO IT SOON. THE COMMUNIST POINTS TO THE EVIDENT INEQUALITY OF DISTRIBUTION OF WEALTH; SOME CORPORATIONS AND INDIVIDUALS WITH TREMENDOUS INCOMES AND IMMENSE RESERVES; OTHER INDIVIDUALS HARD WORKING, THRIFTY MEN TOILING FOR A MERE PITTANCE WHEN THEY CAN FIND WORK, AND WHEN THEY CANNOT FORCED TO SUBSIST ON A NECESSARILY INADEQUATE DOLE OR DIRECT RELIEF ALLOWANCE.

There is no use pointing out that, if wealth were equally distributed today, tomorrow would find some rich and others destitute. To the man who, through no fault of his own, is out of work and on relief the contrast between his penury and the opulence of others is glaring to the point of being blinding. NOW THE SOBER TRUTH IS THAT LABOR IS NOT GETTING A FAIR SHARE OF THE WEALTH IT PRODUCES IN CO-OPERATION WITH CAPITAL. ORGANIZATION AND UNSCRUPULOUSNESS, TO PUT IT MILDLY, HAVE TRANSFORMED CAPITAL INTO THE RUTHLESSLY DOMINATING FACTOR OF OUR MODERN ECONOMIC LIFE. COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA STRESSES THAT FACT, AND PROMISES A REORGANIZATION OF SOCIETY WHICH WILL ELIMINATE EVEN THE POSSIBILITY OF ITS RECURRENCE: NO WONDER THAT ITS MESSAGE IS ACCEPTED.

Model League Mar. Universities Held First Session This Morning

Delegates Welcomed by Lieutenant Governor and President of University of New Brunswick

SIXTY DELEGATES ATTENDING

Proposals Concerning Collective Bargaining First Item On Agenda

THAT scores of men and women have attained great heights in later life who in early life did not show any special brilliancy was a fact brought out this morning by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor Col. Murray MacLaren at the opening session of the Model League at the University of New Brunswick.

The Lieutenant Governor also stated he was not clear on the aims and objects of the Model League but he felt sure that the representatives of the Universities of the Maritime Provinces would have in their program much that would be for the good and welfare of all classes.

The first session of the Model League opened at ten o'clock this morning, in the Memorial Building of the University with the local president, Allison Mitchell in the chair. Mr. Mitchell called upon Dr. C. C. Jones, President of the University to introduce the Lieutenant Governor Col. Murray MacLaren. Dr. Jones referred to the brilliant career of the Governor of the province noting honors that had been conferred upon him by both U.N.B. and Edinburgh as well as to his success in the professional, political and military fields. The Lieutenant Governor in welcoming the sixty delegates to the Model League and who represent the Universities of the Maritime Provinces, commented on the beauties of the capital and the pride with which all U.N.B. graduates looked to their Alma Mater. He referred to Sir Howard Douglas, founder of U.N.B. who had also been his predecessor as Governor of the province.

Outstanding among his remarks were the facts that there had been many benefactors in the cause of education among men who themselves had never been University men. These men had seen the importance of advanced education and had given of their wealth in this regard. He advocated the acquiring of the ability to think on the part of the students who were at college for the purpose of mental development. 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ITALIAN TROOPS BACK FROM LIBYA RESULT PACT

Br. Recognition Ethiopian Conquest Included in Agreement

ROME, March 22—The first detachment of Italian troops withdrawn from Libya as a concession to Great Britain came home today and informed sources predicted that an Anglo-Italian friendship accord would be concluded by Saturday.

Almost 4,000 officers and men who had helped garrison Italy's North American colony disembarked at Naples.

Informed persons said the accord would provide for British support of recognition for Premier Mussolini's Ethiopian conquest through League of Nations and withdrawal of all Italian combatants from the Spanish civil war through the 27-national non-intervention committee.

These sources said Italy would discontinue construction of certain fortifications in Eritrea which might threaten Red Sea traffic and therefore menace the Suez Canal route.

(Special to The Daily Mail) LONDON, March 22—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain will give his ultimate decision on Great Britain's policy in regard to the situation in Central Europe on Thursday. The British Cabinet is discussing whether or not Great Britain will join France in its attitude on Czechoslovakia. Canada has not been consulted.

Japs Cut Off From Base; Lack of Food

MINTO RESIDENT REMANDED 8 DAYS

William Fulton Charged At Chipman With Breaking, Entering, Theft

CHIPMAN, N. B., March 22—William Fulton, 41-year-old Minto resident, was remanded until March 29, when he appeared before Magistrate C. G. Baird here, charged with breaking, entering and theft. He was accused of stealing several small articles, such as preserves and clothing, of a total value of \$25, from the home of Arthur Burgess, Iron Bound Cove, last Thursday.

The prisoner was accused also of stealing a wrist watch from Reid Ferris, Jemseg, at the latter place on the same day, but he did not appear before the magistrate on this charge. Articles reported to have been stolen in both cases were said to have been found on the person of the accused.

The Iron Bound Cove Break, said police, took place when the occupant of the house, whose permanent address was given as Saint John, was away. Fulton was arrested at Minto Saturday night by R. C. M. P. Corporal R. L. Love who, with Constable E. Randall, investigated the thefts.

LONDON DENIES ADVICE GIVEN BY DOMINIONS

At No Time Has British Government Consulted With Canada Regarding European Situation

LONDON, March 22—The Dominions were involuntarily pushed to the centre of the British political crisis when the isolationist press, led by Lord Harnsworth's Daily Mail and Lord Beaverbrook's Express, blazoned that consultation with the overseas Governments had revealed that the Dominions were against greater commitments in Europe and would not support any guarantee for Czechoslovakia.

Inquiry in responsible quarters, however, brings the information that at no time during the present European crisis has the government of the United Kingdom consulted the Dominion Governments on their attitudes or whether they would support any particular course of action. They have been kept informed of developments and the situation, but their advice has not been sought, it

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ARRESTS AND SUICIDES CONTINUE IN VIENNA

15,000 Held In Concentration Camps Or Prison

VIENNA, March 22—Nazification of Vienna, with its attendant wholesale arrests and suicides, moved on apace today.

Many former Socialist party leaders were arrested over the week-end, and, according to one report, there are already from 10,000 to 12,000 men and women in concentration camps or prisons.

A radio report said between 50 and 70 persons took their lives in the last few days.

All members of ex-Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg's former cabinet now have been placed in "protective custody", save one who escaped across the frontier.

Ex-President Wilhelm Miklas attended a mass yesterday under strong troop guard.

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JEW, WIFE ESCAPE FROM GERMANY IN AN OPEN BOAT

(Special to The Daily Mail) LONDON, March 22—An open boat containing two Jews was found this morning in the English Channel. Mr. and Mrs. Nevinsky were running away from Germany so that the former would not have to report for military training. They landed at Cherbourg three days ago. While in the boat they fell asleep and drifted out to sea.

MINTO PROBE TO RESUME NEXT MONTH

SAINT JOHN, March 22—Although Judge H. O. McInerney, chairman of the federal conciliation board which is investigating the Minto labor dispute, had sufficiently recovered from his recent illness to resume his regular duties he expressed little hope that he would be able to go to Minto this week, as planned.

Next month, a meeting of the United Mine Workers' international board will be held in Washington. It is understood that union heads hope to have a copy of the board Minto report for submission at this meeting. Before this report is compiled and forwarded to Norman McL. Rogers, federal labor minister, the conciliation board must hear briefs from both the union and the mine operator.
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
