Daniel MacDonald arguing in the cause of Labor said the latter had a right to organize and that labor was a living power in the world. Labor had been exploited by capitalists and the only solution would be brought about by evolution.

Representing Portugal the delegates of St. Thomas' College drew a picture of balanced budgets and favorable credit of their country when offering bonds for sale and general contentment of the people as the result of a unit control of their constitution the secret of which was one for all and all for one. The economic success and social contentment of Portuguese was based on the principles of Christianity as incorporated in the encyclical of Pope Leo XIII, which were given to the world in 1891. During the course of Mr. Whalen's remarks who referred to the denial of Christianity in some countries some light skirmishing took place when retort came from representatives of Communistic countries. The students representing each country are, it is understood, expressing sentiments from the viewpoint of each of the countries they represent and not according to their own personal point of view. In this connection the students representing the Soviet rose to a point of order, however with the result that the arguments of the speaker were admitted and supported by the applause of the session.

Mr. Coish speaking for the employee claimed that wages had decreased and that labor in France was organized only ten per cent with the result that conditions for the working class had continually become worse.

### Chamberlain Willing to Consult Dominions On Foreign Policy

Chamberlain told the House of Commons yesterday His Majesty's Government are "most ready" to communicate with and consult the Dominions' High Commissioners on any matter of common concern to the fullest extent which the respective Governments may desire.

He was replying to I. C. Hannah, Conservative, who asked the Prime Minister to consider giving the Dominions a representative in London of Ambassadorial status and some right to be consulted in the foreign policy of the Empire.

Mr. Chamberlain said the status of the High Commissioners was determined by the Imperial Conference. Alan Lennox-Boyd, who only three weeks ago was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Labor, today was the centre of a storm in the House.

On the Conservative back benches Mr. Lennox-Boyd was known for his Fascist sympathies. When, as a junior member of the Government, he first rose in the House to answer questions, Labor members ironically greeted him with cries of "Franco's Deputy!"

In the House today they badgered the Government over an alleged statement by Mr. Lennox-Boyd to his constituents on Friday night that nothing "could be more ridiculous than to guarantee the frontiers of Czechoslovakia when half the people of that country could not be relied upon to be loyal to the Government of the day."

Clement Attlee, leader of the Opposition, and Sir Archibald Sinclair, Liberal leader, joined in a demand to know whether the junior Minister's statement represented the views of the Government.

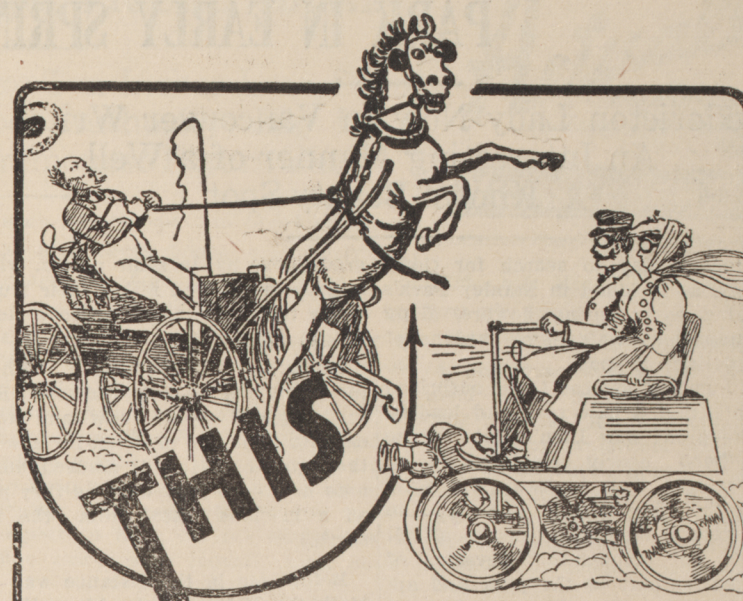
Following the program refreshments were served by the members of the Ladies Aid. The total receipts of the evening amounted to \$12.45.
