All this added to his ambition to become a singer and at the first opportunity he went to Denver to study voice. By the time he was 18 he was singing with the St. Joseph's Cathedral choir as soloist. About this time his cash reserves

ran out and Ed was forced to find a job in the steel mills at Pueblo, Col. After a time he resumed his study of voice, commuting between Pueblo Dainty To Play and Denver for the instruction. Soon he won a scholarship offered by Rosa Raisa and came to Chicago to study at the Gunn School of Music Training. Here he enjoyed his first success as a professional singer. Af-


