bodies in which no political considerations entered. The committee was essentially of a judicial nature, its purpose being to weigh the nature of a measure to see if it was in the public interest to adopt it. In three years of his experience he had not seen politics enter into the committee meeting. The criticism referred to Mr. McAllister resulted from the motion adopted last week by the Committee for the accompaniment of a financial statement with all municipal money bills. Hon. Mr. McNair felt that the St. John Member's statement should be withdrawn.

Defended Remarks

Mr. McAllister defended his remarks, stating that he had merely quoted from the press and that he had nothing to withdraw. He felt that the municipalities committee was not the proper body to carry on municipal business. Municipalities were themselves capable of executing their own affairs.

Hon. Mr. McNair stated that Mr. McAllister had made use of the views of the newspaper in question. He moved that in the view of this committee, Mr. McAllister's remarks should be withdrawn. The motion was seconded. Remarks encoached upon the rights of the committee.

Would Not Withdraw

Mr. McAllister insisted that he was within his rights and would not withdraw his remarks until convinced of his error even though it cost him his seat in the House. Until convinced that he was wrong he would withdraw nothing.

Mr. Blakeny regretted that a wrong impression had been given by Mr. McAllister and the press in the matter.

Mr. McNair sincerely regretted that Mr. McAllister felt the possibility of resignation and withdrew his motion rather than place Mr. McAllister in this position. This was seconded by Dr. Dyas of Charlotte Co.

Three Bills

The committee this morning considered three Dalhousie bills. A delegation from the Town attended on the meeting. The first was a bill to amend the Town of Dalhousie Assessment Act. The object of the bill was to alter the present practice of continuing the tax discount period up to September first, at two per cent, by making a shorter discount period at four per cent up to end of May 31st. After this date all balances remaining unpaid to be subject to interest at one-half of one per cent per month until full payment. The bill was reported with amendments.

Two other bills, one to authorize the Town of Dalhousie to issue debentures for the purpose of construction of pavements and sidewalks, and another to authorize the town to pay the Mayor and Aldermen for their services in semi-annual instalments were considered. These bills occasioned the reading of a petition from Dalhousie citizens protesting against authorization of these expenditures. The petition requested the right to vote on these borrowings. A counter petition signed by a group of merchants and ratepayers was read. This petition approved of proposed expenditures, on the grounds that the proposition was urgently needed in view of conditions. A delegate defended the financial condition of the town. The bill relating to payment of salaries had been brought up by ratepayers who approached various members of the Council. This bill was laid aside until 2:45 o'clock this afternoon in order that the Dalhousie delegation might obtain additional information from the town council with regard to their attitude toward certain clauses in the measure. The former bill, authorizing issue of debentures was reported with amendments.

outside. Adolf Hitler has announced his intention to protect these Germans.)

The Sudeten German party, said Fransk, "feels impelled to address the representatives of the Czechoslovak state."

Sudeten Germanism, he declared, refuses "to wither in the confined space allotted it." Its will to live is strong, he said, and the party organization is its weapon in political battle.

"The Czech Government should be under no delusions as to this fact," he added.

"At this hour all we wish to say is that it would be politically wiser to create voluntarily a situation which gives no cause for complaint (by the Sudeten Germans). The advisability to adopt such a new course is now patent to all."
